SHOW ME!

"Now Thomas, called the Twin, one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. The other disciples therefore said to him, "We have seen the Lord." So he said to them, "Unless I see His hands with the print of the nails, and put my hand into His side, I will not believe." John 20:24-25

The Show Me State...this most widely recognized nickname for Missouri was in use in the late 1890s. It's not known exactly where or how this nickname originated. The most popular story regarding this nickname revolves around remarks

made by United States Congressman Willard Duncan Vandiver who served as a member of the U.S. House Committee on Naval Affairs. Mr. Vandiver, a scholar, writer and lecturer with a passing resemblance to Mark Twain, was speaking to Philadelphia's Five O'Clock Club. Questioning the accuracy of an earlier speaker's remarks, he concluded, "I come from a state that raises corn and cotton and cockleburs and Democrats, and frothy eloquence neither convinces nor satisfies me. I am from Missouri. You have got to show me."

Another story is that the nickname originated as a derogatory reference to Missouri miners working in Leadville, Colorado. During the Colorado miner's strike, men from Joplin, Missouri were brought in to work the mines. It is said that the Missouri workers, unfamiliar with Colorado mining methods, required frequent instructions from the pit bosses. "That man is from Missouri. You'll have to show him."

Regardless of the stories, Missourians are known for "show me - seeing is believing." So it was for the disciple Thomas, one of the 12 disciples in the Bible. Jesus appears to some of the disciples, but Thomas was not with them the first time. John 20:25 says, "So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!" But he [Thomas] said to them, 'Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe it.""

Eight days later, Jesus appears before His disciples again: "A week later his disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you!' Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe.' Thomas said to him, 'My Lord and my God!' Then Jesus told him, 'Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed' (John 20:26-29).

Like Thomas, I am sure that we all have faced challenges in our lives that may cause us to question the truth that Jesus lives. The fact is I have not seen Jesus in person but in faith I believe Jesus lives, because Jesus has "shown up" time and time again in my life. Through answered prayers and the blessed assurance that He "will never leave me or forsake me and that He is with me always!" I am from North Carolina and

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I don't have to "see" because I believed...when He "showed up" in my heart! What about you? Do you believe?

THE SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINE OF STUDY

"All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17 NIV).

Let us continue with Study, the last discipline examined in Inward Spiritual Disciplines, following Meditation, Prayer and Fasting.

The purpose of Spiritual Disciplines is the total transformation of the person. They aim to replace destructive habits of thought with new life-giving habits. Nowhere is this purpose more clearly seen than in the Discipline of Study. The Apostle Paul tells us that we are transformed through the renewal of the mind (Rom. 12:2). The mind is renewed by applying to it to those things that will transform it. "Finally, brethren, whatever it true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things" (Phil. 4:8). The Discipline of Study is the primary vehicle to bring us to "think about these things." Therefore, we should rejoice that we are not left to our own devices but have been given this means of God's grace for the changing of our inner spirit.

Many Christians remain in bondage to fears and anxieties simply because they do not avail themselves of the *Discipline of Study*. They may be faithful in church attendance and earnest in fulfilling their religious duties, and still they are not changed. We are not here speaking only of those who are going through mere religious forms, but of those who are genuinely seeking to worship and obey Jesus Christ as Lord and Master. They may sing with gusto, pray in the Spirit, live as obediently as they know, even receive divine visions and revelations,

and yet the tenor of their lives remains unchanged. Why? Because they have never taken up one of the central ways God uses to change us—study. Jesus made it unmistakably clear that the knowledge of the truth will set us free. "You will know the truth, and the truth will make you free" (John 8:32). Good feelings will not free us; ecstatic experiences will not free us.

Let us therefore apply ourselves to learning what constitutes the *Discipline of Study*, identifying its pitfalls, practicing it with joy, and experiencing the liberation it brings. Study is a specific kind of experience, through careful attention to reality, wherein the mind is enabled to move in a certain direction.

Study involves four steps:

- 1. **Repetition**. Repetition regularly channels the mind in a specific direction, thus ingraining habits of thought.
- 2. **Concentration**. When a person concentrates on what is being studied, learning is vastly increased.
- 3. **Reflection**. While comprehension defines what we are studying, reflection defines the significance of what we are studying. Reflection brings us to see things from God's perspective.
- 4. **Humility**. Study simply cannot happen until we are willing to be subject to the subject matter. We must submit to the system. We must come as student, not teacher. Not only is study directly dependent upon humility, but it is conducive to it. Arrogance and a teachable spirit are mutually exclusive.

"Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." 2 Timothy 2:15 (KJV).

Out with the old, in with the New!

Church operations are no different than other building operations. It can be a government building, school facility, a home, or other managed structures, they all require standard maintenance provisions, equipment maintenance schedules & unlimited repairs, based on their various mechanical or electrical functions. In many cases, equipment and other building deficiencies may happen simultaneously.

From HVAC systems to plumbing, from electrical power requirements and infrastructure stability, everything has to be maintained consistently to support standard operations. As the old saying goes, "Nothing lasts forever." And correctly so, you can be assured various equipment components are going to need to be repaired or replaced within the life of the building.

First Mount Zion has come to that period. A 50-ton air-cooled condensing unit was removed on January 8th and a "NEW" unit installed the same day. Contractors remained on-site for several weeks completing all electrical and installation procedures. The new unit was tested and the system start-up was performed by Carrier Corporation. We give all the Glory and Thanksgiving to God for providing the resources for such a replacement. Believe me, this is not the last of equipment failures. It will happen again and again during the life of the building.

MUSIC AS A MEANS OF WORSHIP

Agape Gospel Choir, a fairly new club on campus, hopes to provide a welcoming environment for all.

The Office of Student Activities (OSA) offers over 200 organizations on campus for CNU students. Fairly recently, a new organization the Agape Gospel Choir.

Founder and Choir Director, Jonelle Brown, stated she created the Agape Gospel Choir when she got to CNU her freshman year and saw all of the religious organizations on campus but could not find one that matched the experiences she was used to at home.

"I grew up in a traditionally Black Baptist Church and I love music, so I decided to bring a Gospel Choir to campus. I've been in choir since I was little but professionally since high school. I [thought], "I have a little experience and I can get started." I just really wanted to bring that atmosphere of Gospel music here and introduce people to what it is," Brown said.

The Agape Gospel Choir is a nondenominational choir who strives to share and spread the love and message of God to all who are willing to listen. They perform Gospel Music, which is a genre within Christian Music.

"The Agape Gospel Choir is a ministry, a community. Our theme is sharing God's love through music so that's really what we try to do. It's more than just singing; it's a little family we have," Brown said.

Although the group is somewhat new to CNU, they have already had a few performances. Last spring, the Agape Gospel Choir performed at a retirement home. Early this semester, members performed at the United Campus Ministries (UCM) Festival of Church Music, which Brown considers their first real performance.

"We didn't even start [rehearsals] officially until October. We had two weeks to get everything together. I think it went really well. It was a new experience," Brown said. "I want people in our choir to not just visit the churches I'm familiar with; I want them to visit other types of churches. We're starting to do church hopping together. This [performance] was a way for everyone to see different kinds of services. They had Lutheran churches and Presbyterian churches there."

It took approximately one year for the choir to become an official organization on campus. Brown began the process of creating the organization Spring 2016 and it was finally established in Fall 2017. There are currently around ten active members in the choir. They meet every Tuesday from 9-11 p.m. in the Ferguson Center room A208, although this changes each semester.

"We're non-denominational and non-discriminatory, so we accept everyone. You just have to be willing to serve and praise God through music," Brown said. "I often get, 'Oh, well I can't sing,' or, 'I can hold a note but I'm not that good." To me, I feel like if you can hold a note then I can teach you. We can work together and I'll be willing to help you out. I welcome everybody that wants to learn."

Brown mentioned that her favorite part about running and being involved in the Agape Gospel Choir is the friendships and community they have built.

"We're all friends, we all hang out and we've gotten dinner before. I really like that we're bonding together," Brown said. "I don't want anyone to feel like I'm telling them what to do. I want it to be their choir because it's their club too; it's not just mine."

"I just want people to feel comfortable and grow in this community in Christ; to fellowship with us and feel like they have gotten something out of the experience. It doesn't matter if you're a certain type of Christian. We accept everyone and want everyone to feel welcomed and like they can find a place on campus they belong to."

The choir is currently looking to find more singers and musicians who can preferably play by ear. Prior training is not necessary. Students interested in joining the choir can email Brown at agapegospelcnu@gmail.com.

Biography of Reverend Deloris Brown

A federal government employee with a career spanning over 30 years, Reverend Brown completed her college education, having graduated with honors from Strayer University in Washington, D.C., with Associate of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees in Business Administration. Today, Reverend Brown is blessed to have been licensed and ordained to the Ministry of Jesus Christ by her Pastor, the Reverend Dr. Luke E. Torian of First Mount Zion Baptist Church in Dumfries, Virginia, where she serves as an Associate Minister in addition to her continuing career within the federal government.

In Celebration of Women -Women Who Preach!

There is a rise in women preachers! Data reported by DBG (Delivered By Grace), a theology blog focused on theology, states that there are more women preachers and pastors today - and we celebrate that trend! We celebrate the increased numbers although it may not be celebrated by everyone. The Barna Research Group reports, "One of every 11 Protestant pastors is a woman—triple as many as 25 years ago." In a new statistical analysis, "State of Clergywomen in the U.S.: A Statistical Update" the numbers indicate that within "most Mainline denominations, the percentage of clergywomen has doubled or tripled since 1994."

Since the late 1990s, women called to ministry at First Mount Zion (FMZ) have enrolled and graduated from seminary, become licensed and, in most cases, been ordained. In 2019, FMZ has 20 clergywomen who are ordained/licensed or Ministers—in-Training; this number has increased in the last 10 years.

Here are a few more insights from the "<u>State of Clergywomen in the U.S.</u>: A <u>Statistical Update</u>":

- In 1960, women were 2.3% of U.S. clergy. In 2016, women are 20.7% of U.S. clergy.
- Since 2015, Roman Catholic lay ministers outnumber priests in the U.S., and 80% of them are women.
- In 2017 women remain fewer than 25% of seminary faculty and deans, and just 11% of the presidents.
- In most Mainline denominations, the percentage of clergywomen has doubled or tripled since 1994.
- Unitarian Universalist and United Church of Christ clergywomen have reached numerical equity with clergymen.
- More women of color and fewer white women are going to seminary to earn Master of Divinity degrees since 2008.

We are proud of our legacy here at FMZ and the number of women who choose to serve out their call to ministry here. Our group of clergy both women and men are warm and welcoming as well as committed and dedicated to serve this congregation. In this Women's History Month, we celebrate the **Women Who Preach!**
