



Man of God . . . Answering to a Higher Calling!



While walking to work one morning in the District of Columbia, this former middle school teacher distinctly recalls hearing the voice of God saying "Feed My sheep!" He knew beyond the shadow of a doubt that it was God, because being a preacher was the furthest thing from his mind, although he grew up in a home with parents who were staunch believers. His focus was on playing sports and being with his friends; doing things that friends do . . .being a preacher was not one of those things. However, because he knew God had spoken, he was obedient, changing his life to the extent that his friends were amazed by the immediacy of the change and mentioned their observations to him.

John McNeill, Jr. was born in 1974 in Washington, D.C. to John, Sr. and Lula McNeill, who migrated from the Carolinas. His parents, a deacon and deaconess, later received their calling to preach, his father first and later his mother; she actually received her Call after John, Jr. received his Call.

A product of the D.C. school system, John obtained his B.S. in Health Science from Lincoln University in Pennsylvania. After teaching for a while, he went to work for a company in Maryland as a physical therapy aide. One morning, while walking to his office he distinctly heard the voice of God for the second time, saying "That's not the graduate school for you." The decision he was considering regarding physical therapy graduate school was not what He wanted him to do; within two weeks he had resigned his position. It was clear to him that God's hand was guiding him in a different direction. He was drawn to a small, but prestigious divinity school in Rochester, New York, known as Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School. As God would have it, his sister was attending a wedding in Rochester, New York, and he decided to "hitch a ride". He too attended the wedding, staying long enough to "grab a bite". and then he took off to explore what would later become the place where he would pursue his Master of Divinity degree. John said he felt a "quake in his spirit" upon entering the sacred grounds of that hallowed institution and knew that was where he needed to be. He graduated Cum Laude from Colgate Rochester Crozer. While there, he served as the President of the Black Student Caucus. He also received the prestigious Jansje Dinkerloo Carey (Full) Scholarship for Pastoral Promise and Academic Excellence while still finding time to serve as a Chaplain at the University of Rochester Medical Center for one year. He later earned his Certificate of Advanced Studies in Theology, graduating Summa Cum Laude from St. Mary's Seminary and University Ecumenical Institute of Theology in Baltimore, Maryland.

Over the years Rev. McNeill received many awards and commendations, taught workshops, facilitated retreats, spoke at conferences and developed curricula. He is well-published and has traveled near and far in over 15 years in Youth Ministry. He is a proponent of the Social Gospel, believing that God is for everyone, especially the poor.

Rev. McNeil's greatest satisfaction is his current position as the Youth Minister here at FMZBC. His introduction to FMZBC was happenstance, or so it seemed, but a closer look suggests that it was a part of God's plan for his life. He initially heard about First Mount Zion through a Conference for Equipping Leaders, which he attended, and actually sat in a group with his predecessor at FMZ, but had no idea. Three weeks later, he saw an announcement for a Youth Ministry leader on a job site, recognized the name and applied for the position. The rest is history, Rev. John McNeil, Jr. is the Youth Minister here at FMZ and, as such, an extension of his responsibility is to oversee and support youth programs that introduce young people to Christ, disciple them in spiritual growth, and train them in service to Christ. Overall, these responsibilities make him feel vulnerable, yet valuable, as he recognizes that he is responsible for the spiritual growth of young people who one day will become leaders in various ministries, hopefully worldwide, and will draw upon some of the things they have learned under his direction and care. Rev. McNeill believes he is a resource to support and equip parents and youth on their spiritual journey to fulfill God's plans for their lives.

This Man of God got his "title" from the "Children of God". The story is told that it started as a means of quietening the youth down while in Church or Youth Council, or wherever the gathering was taking place. Rather than say "be quiet" or "hush" to get their undivided attention and have some semblance of order, Rev. McNeill decided, in consultation with the youth, to ask what they would like to be called so he would use that term and it would be the indicator that silence was required. He suggested "Children of God" and they agreed. It worked; everyone responded when that term was used. Then one of the youth, a young lady named Aria, said to Rev. McNeill, "Well, if you are going to call us Children of God, then we will call you Man of God"; the kids all agreed, and the term "Man of God" was birthed. So, for all you inquiring minds who wanted to know how the term "Man of God" came about, there you have it!

Rev. McNeil's desire is that all Youth establish a sound relationship with Jesus Christ that will allow them to have wholesome discussions with their parents about any situation that may occur in their lives. However, he wants them to know that if they feel uncomfortable doing so they can always come to him at any time, for anything . . . he loves and cares about them, their well-being and their spiritual growth, and nothing can or will ever change that.

Mary-Elizabeth Ministry (MEM)

This a God-centered, non-judgmental Ministry. We serve to provide pregnancy and parenting education to adolescents and their families.

Our History:

Mary-Elizabeth started in Richmond, Va. approximately 25 years ago under the inspiration of the biblical story of Elizabeth mentoring her cousin Mary, mother of Christ (Luke 1:37-42). The story depicts the importance of supportive inter-



actions and the celebration of human life. Adult female ("Elizabeth") and male ("Zacharias") servants are assigned to mentor the adolescent expecting mother ("Mary") and expecting father ("Joseph"), respectively. Additionally, servants provide personal testimonies, facilitate sessions and lead training workshops.

Our Programs:

New Beginnings:

MEM hosts two 8-10 week programs annually for expecting teens and members of their support system.

Session topics include:

- Labor, Delivery, Pain Management
- Bottle & Breast Feeding
- Birth Control/Postpartum
- Hospital Tour / Baby Care 101
- Parental Rights & Virginia Laws
- Continuing Your Education

Peer-to-Peer:

One-day sessions are held during

each New Beginnings program. The purpose of these sessions are to allow past participants to share their personal experiences and stories to help guide and encourage current participants.

Life Skills:

Two 1-day sessions are held bi-annually to allow past participants to reconnect and further enrich themselves through additional training and development workshops. Sample topics include "Self Esteem" and "Healthy Relationships."

The MEM Donation Room is stocked but always in need of:

- Disposable Wipes/Diapers (Sizes Newborn to 4)
- Boys & Girls Clothing including Coats, Socks and Shoes (Sizes Newborn to 2T)
- Bassinets/Strollers/Changing Tables/Miscellaneous Items (<u>i.e.</u>, bottles, bibs, etc.)
- Toiletry Items for Expecting Parents

NOTE: We cannot accept car seats or cribs due to safety regulations!

Journey To Joy and GriefShare: discussing questions and comments from

"There is always an open chair for you!"



Journey To Joy is our grief support ministry and the host for the weekly GriefShare meeting currently held every Monday evening from 7- 9pm now through December 17, 2018

How GriefShare works: It may be hard for you to feel optimistic about the future right now. If you've lost a spouse, child, family member or friend, you've probably found there are not many people who understand the deep hurt you feel. This can be a confusing time, when you feel isolated and have many questions about things you've never faced before.

"Going to GriefShare feels like having warm arms wrapped around you when you're shivering."

GriefShare meets weekly to help you face these challenges and move toward rebuilding your life. Each GriefShare session has three distinct elements:

- Video seminar with experts: Each week your GriefShare group will watch a video seminar featuring top experts on grief and recovery subjects. These videos are produced in an interesting television magazine format featuring expert interviews, real-life case studies. dramatic reenactments and on-location video.
- Support group discussion with focus: After viewing the video, you and other group members will spend time as a support group, discussing what was presented in the video seminar and what is going on in your lives.
- Personal study and reflection: During the week, you will have the opportunity to use your workbook for further personal study of the grieving process and to help sort out your emotions through journaling. Your group will spend time

the workbook study.

When to join a GriefShare group: You are welcome to begin attending the Grief-Share group at any session. Each is "self -contained," so you do not have to attend in sequence. You will find encouragement and help whenever you begin. You will be able to continue with GriefShare through the next 13-week cycle and view any of the videos you have not seen.

Who should come, who should not: GriefShare is for people grieving the death of a family member or friend. We understand that there are other losses in life that create feelings of grief. You might be experiencing a job loss, a divorce, estrangement from a child or the loss of friends because of a move. This grief is real, but it is not the kind of grief discussed in GriefShare sessions. We encourage you to ask a pastor, counselor or church leader for guidance in finding resources to help in your specific situa-

Duty and Grace --

Deacon Emeritus John W. Jones, Jr. Reflects on His Service as a Marine

Eighty-eight. That was the number of soldiers killed in action on the first day of John W. Jones, Jr.'s deployment to Vietnam — a figure that still looms at the forefront of his service in the U.S. Marine Corps. "That's a lot of young boys. This affects my mind. Every day I think about how good God has been to me to let me walk around after seeing all of that," he shares. That number also happens to be his age as we observe Veterans Day 2018.

This son of a Baptist minister grew up in Memphis, Tenn. and signed up to become a Marine in 1956 while living in St. Louis, Mo. From serving one-and-a-half tours in the Vietnam War and becoming a veteran of the 1958 Lebanon Crisis, he began serving in his twenties in the infantry, then moved to logistics, and eventually retired as a Master Gunnery Sergeant in 1987. He continues to be an active member of the National Montford Point Marine Association, Quantico Chapter.

Before his deployment to Vietnam, he often thought about his potential role in war. He was assigned to the First Battalion 9th Marines, a fleet of five ships, each fully dressed to handle everything needed for war, along with doctors and medical supplies to treat the wounded. However, he remembers the continuous whirring of the copter blades as the helicopter landed to drop off the wounded, and the long wait they endured to see the

surgical team who worked 24 hours around the clock; so many soldiers did not survive their injuries. He also remembers the bodies stacked in the fantail refrigerator, which often fell out when you opened the door.

"My real mission was supporting the fighting units by making sure they had everything they needed, like water, rations and ammunition. They needed me to support them and that was a blessing. But, eventually, they sent us all out in the field," he recounts. "When your body was needed, you went where the action was. I didn't get the comfort of lying around on the ship. They always needed me."

Despite seeing combat every week in Vietnam, he was never wounded while most of his friends were killed. Combat came with the territory for battalion landing teams, yet he still faced surprise from enemy attacks and shock whenever mortar exploded or tanks ran near him. He was equipped with an M14 rifle and .45 pistol.

Initially, his battalion was issued M16 rifles—a superior weapon to the M14. But they kept blowing up with sand, so troops lost confidence in them and would lay them down, and either fight without it or pick up AK-47s from the enemy.

"On the ground, you make the best out of wherever you are. Whether living in the mud or sand, we did the best we could. All we could do was try to keep ourselves alive and support the ones upfront," he reveals. "The only thing I could think about then was praying."

Returning Home

"Those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength." Isaiah 40:31

Two days before his bunkmate was scheduled to head home for Christmas, he was killed in action. This was just one of the memories Deacon Jones has tried to bury from his mind, but

it just never goes away, much like the unnerving sound of dripping water or gunshots. "You never come back the same after a tour, whether it's six months, one year or two years," he admits.

Eventually, these memories balanced out with those of preparing food for hungry children, sending love letters back to the U.S. and spending his one-week of downtime in Okinawa, Japan. Coming home also allowed him to settle into joyful service at First Mount Zion Baptist Church, which he had made his Home Church during the sixties. He sang in various choirs and served as an Usher and Sunday School teacher. But his longest service has been in the Deacon Ministry, where he served for more than 30 years.

"It is a wonderful commitment to be a deacon. You are a partner with Pastor to take care of the members," he firmly declares, as he reflects on his life of service. "And my partner is Jeannette," he adds, referring to his wife. "She is my partner in everything. She takes care of me like no other. My life would not work without her love," he proudly proclaims. "I am able to do the things I am able to do and be the man I am today because of her."

Looking back on the young man who joined the Marines, he credits his time of service with shaping him to become the best, despite the war protests he witnessed, the horrors of war he experienced and the chilling Asian monsoon season he endured. "It was my duty to serve. The Marine Corps did a lot for me. I always desired to improve myself and it taught me how to make good judgments in my life."

Ultimately, it is his relationship with God that is the foundation of his life. "I try to move closer to God every day of my life," he concludes with gratitude. "All that I have and all that I am, I owe it to Him."

Ever need help with completing your stewardship envelopes? Below is a brief tutorial for accurately completing your envelopes. Writing clearly and following these simple steps help the Trustees to help you with accuracy of your stewardship records.

- -Non-Member: Check this box if you are not a member of FMZBC (i.e., you do not have a member number assigned).
- -Membership Number: <u>Insert your assigned member number</u>. If you have forgotten this number, please contact the Church office for assistance.
- -Name and Address: Insert your personal data in this section. If your name or address has changed, please contact the Church office with your updated information. Keeping this data current helps to ensure receipt of your annual contribution summary via the U.S. Postal Service.
- -Date: Insert the date on which you complete the envelope.
- -Document the amount of your enclosed funds to be allocated within each category of Offering, Tithes, Benevolence, Sunday School, Building Fund and Scholarship. Write your entry clearly on the line corresponding to the desired category.



There are separate envelopes for your stewardship associated with the "Mortgage Elimination Campaign." For this envelope:

- -Date: Insert the date on which you complete the envelope.
- -Name and Address: Insert your personal data in this section. Again, if your name or address has changed, please contact the Church office with your updated information.
- -Membership Number: <u>Insert your assigned member number</u>. If you have forgotten this number, please contact the Church office for assistance. If you are not a member write "Non-Member."
- -Amount Enclosed: Document the amount of your enclosed funds. All of these funds are credited toward your Mortgage Elimination Pledge(s).

Please do not hesitate to contact the Church Office or Trustee Ministry for help as needed. We are here to serve you!

REMINDER: Please remember to check your health coverage or have a family member or trusted friend check it for you to be sure it is still in effect!!



People can apply beginning in **November** for Medicaid coverage starting on **January 1, 2019**. To be eligible, recipients must:

- Be Virginia residents, aged 19-64
- Not be currently enrolled in or eligible for Medicare
- Meet income requirements, which vary by household (single adult making up to \$16,754 or a family of three making up to \$28,677)

n Virginia, low-income workers in retail, construction, childcare, landscaping and food service are often not provided health insurance. More than
40 percent of adults eligible for coverage under Medicaid expansion are people of color. Many who may have been denied
