In Oswald Chambers' daily devotional, My Utmost for His Highest, he says the following: "A spiritually-minded person will never come to you with the demand -"Believe this and that;" a spirituallyminded person will demand that you align your life with the standards of Jesus. We are not asked to believe the Bible, but to believe the One whom the Bible reveals (see John 5:39-40). We are called to present liberty for the conscience of others, not to bring them liberty for their thoughts and opinions. 
You search the Scriptures, for in them you think you have eternal life; and these are they which testify of Me. But you are not willing to come to Me that you may have life.

LEADERSHIP CHAPTAINS CORNER

The Discipline of Simplicity Cont'd - (Part 3) July 2019

Eight Discipline of Simplicity nuggets for living a Simplistic Life!!

1 of 8: Buy things for their usefulness rather than their status. Cars should be bought for their utility, not their prestige. Consider riding a bicycle. When you are considering an apartment, a condominium, or a house, thought should be given to livability rather than how much it will impress others. Don't have more living space than is reasonable. After all, who needs seven rooms for two people?

Consider your clothes. Most people have no need for more clothes. They buy more not because they need clothes, but because they want to keep up with the fashions. Hang the fashions! Buy what you need. Wear your clothes until they are worn out. Stop trying to impress people with your clothes and impress them with your life. OUCH!!!!! If it is practical in your situation, learn the joy of making clothes.

2 of 8: Reject anything that is producing an addiction in you. Learn to distinguish between a real psychological need, like cheerful surroundings, and an addiction. Eliminate or cut down on the use of addictive, non-nutritional drinks: alcohol, coffee, tea, Coca-Cola, and so on. Chocolate has become a serious addiction for many people. OUCH!!! If you have become addicted to television, by all means sell your set or give it away. WHAT!!?? Any of the media that you find you cannot do without, get rid of: radios, stereos, magazines, videos, newspapers, books. If money has a grip on your heart, give some away and feel the inner release. Simplicity is freedom, not slavery. Refuse to be a slave to anything or anyone but God!! Adonai!!!

3 of 8: Develop a habit of giving things away. If you find that you are becoming attached to some possession, consider giving it to someone who needs it. I still remember the Christmas I decided that rather than buying or even making an item, I would give away something that meant a lot to me. My motive was selfish: I wanted to know the liberation that comes from even this simple act of voluntary poverty. The gift was a ten-speed bike. As I went to the person's home to deliver the present, I remember singing with new meaning the worship chorus, "Freely, freely you have received; freely, freely give." When my son Nathan was six years old, he heard of a classmate who needed a lunch pail and asked me if he could give him his own lunch pail. Hallelujah!

De-accumulate! Masses of things that are not needed complicate life. They must be sorted and stored and dusted and re-sorted and re-stored ad nauseam. Most of us could get rid of half our possessions without any serious sacrifice.

Scripture: Prov 15:16 - Better to have little, with fear for the Lord, than to have great treasure and inner turmoil (NLT).

Building Partnerships to Help Women in Local Communities

On Saturday, June 8th, leaders from the Deaconess Ministry, Daughters of the King, and Professional Women's Small Groups banded together and volunteered to support the 2019 "Go With the Flow" effort by helping to pack over 6,400 feminine hygiene products (i.e., tampons and pads) for both under sheltered and homeless women throughout Prince William County and Fredericksburg, VA.

The products, donated by FMZBC members voluntarily over an eight-week period from April 7th through May 30th, were taken to six designated sites for distri-

bution: Brisbane Homeless Shelter in Fredericksburg, VA; Serve and Entrusted Connections Life House in Manassas, VA; Acts in Dumfries, VA; Hilda Barg Homeless Shelter and Woodbridge Hugs in Woodbridge, VA.

The Go With the Flow effort started in 2017 as an annual community project for the FMZBC Professional Women's Small Group led by Sister Pamela Sessoms. "Thank you to all of the Deaconess who partnered with the Professional Women Small Group to donate, pack and deliver tampons and sanitary napkins," said Sis. Sessoms.

"The idea for the Go With the Flow project stemmed from recognizing that basic needs for both under sheltered and homeless women were not only clothes and food but also included feminine hygiene products such as sanitary napkins and tampons," said Sister Sessoms. "Women, regardless of economic status, must have affordable access to these items on a monthly basis for the majority of their adult lives. We are so very fortunate in the US to have many choices in what products fit our unique needs. But even in the US, there are many women who are in desperate need of tampons and sanitary napkins. Did you know that women cannot use government supported programs such as SNAP to purchase tampons or sanitary napkins? There are women who miss work and teens who miss school because they lack products. This effort allows for several women throughout Northern Virginia to have these items freely available to them while being shown the love of Christ through the kind donations from others.'

Since 2017, over 20,500 items have been donated, collected and distributed to women in local communities. This past March, the Deaconess Ministry voted to support FMZBC ministries targeting church and community outreach for the remainder of 2019 in lieu of hosting the Annual FMZBC Community Giveaway event; normally scheduled for October annually. The next Community Giveaway event will be held in 2020. "We are so happy to have this opportunity to help the Go With the Flow project's "packing party," said Deaconess Chair Sister Claudia Woolfolk. "This is a wonderful project overall and we know that many in the communities will be blessed to have these items freely available to them."

On behalf of the Professional Women's Small Group and the Deaconess Ministry, "thank you to all FMZBC members who donated feminine hygiene items in 2019 and for going with the flow that shows the love of Christ to our sisters! The 2020 goal for collection is 8,000 feminine hygiene items. If FMZBC members are interested in helping our church meet this goal, consider participating in Spring 2020 by donating feminine tampons or pads or joining the Professional Women's Small Group.

Seeing The Need, Delivering Hope!



Have you ever had an opportunity to volunteer at an event that you thought would be just an 'OK' event? Have you ever wondered how your contributions would be received, perceived, or even if you would be able to give your all while doing your very best? Well, all of those questions and others were going through my mind as I mentally prepared myself to volunteer at the Convoy of Hope Woodbridge community event on June 1.

Health Ministry

Physically, I was up for the challenge. I am passionate about this area within the healthcare arena—assisting Virginia residents in the Medicaid and FAMIS programs. While undergoing doctoral studies several years ago, I wanted my dissertation to focus on people who were uninsured and/or under-insured. This volunteer experience was my opportunity to learn more. As an Ambassador of the statewide Health Care Hope initiative, I had completed the required research and the face-to-face mandatory training that equipped me to assist applicants.

Where I failed to prepare myself was understanding the number of people, many of whom looked like me, that fell into this category. As a healthcare provider, I thought I aware of all the populations of people who were uninsured and under-insured. But I was dumbfounded that it was not just immigrants. It was truly an eye-opener to see the number of U.S citizens and working-class Americans who are in need. I was ignorant to the ramifications exposed to all residents.

On June 1, the Prince William County Health Care Hope team helped more than 75 people, providing them with information about the new income eligibility levels for Medicaid and local healthcare resources for those who did not meet the requirements and helping complete applications for those who did.

My goal is to continue heightening the awareness of those who may not be aware. I thought I was informed but I was far removed. What about you? Where do you stand when it comes to your thoughts and views about healthcare and Medicaid? What are you willing to do to assist man-kind regardless of age, color or creed? God demands this of all of us.

So, if you are looking to serve quietly, The Health Ministry needs volunteers who are lay persons, health professionals, and nurses to serve the congregation during 8am and 11am services as well as other church events.
