

# Message from the Pastor

"On your mark, get set, go!" is a phrase used to begin a competition. Originally, "on your mark, get set, go!" was used in the 1800s to begin foot races. 

As First Mount Zion students begin a new school year, let us reflect on the fun we had in Vacation Bible School (VBS), our summer program for children offered through the Christian Education Department the last week of June.

It would not be a great summer without VBS and VBS would not be complete without awesome students, volunteers, Bible stories, fun, games, and service to the community. VBS 2019 had all of these things and more.

This year, First Mount Zion welcomed 239 kids and 108 volunteers to Whoosh: Take Flight to Where God Leads You, a faith in culture curriculum celebrating the indelible link between faith and African American history.


Through this curriculum, students were "encouraged to allow God to lead them as they journey to places of freedom, fun, and opportunity, remembering God's miracles as they go." Each day, students and teachers prepared to "take flight with faith in Jesus Christ" and "touch down" on a historical African American site, with a Bible memory verse to guide the day. Some of the places that VBS touched down and learned more about included: The National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, DC; The National Underground Railroad and Freedom Center in Cincinnati, OH; The American Jazz Museum and the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum, both located in the same building in Kansas City, MO; Black Wall Street in Tulsa, OK; and Colonel Allensworth State Historical Park in Tulare County, CA. Not only were the students enlightened by our history and accomplishments, but the teachers also learned something new and in some cases

had a wonderful history refresher! Students had the opportunity to learn, play, praise God, and dream about the places they could go with Jesus in their lives. Their hearts and minds were open to experience the presence and love of God each day.

Light: From the Promise, to Pentecost, to Points Around the World

An important part of making VBS a welcoming environment has to do with the decorations that reflect the theme. The Decorations & Crafts Team did an outstanding job, with the help of our Facilities staff, turning the Chapel into the MLK Jr. Memorial with a gigantic depiction of the MLK statue at the entrance of the Chapel.

They also transformed the narthex into our very own history museum. With daily presentations in the Chapel from FMZBC members sharing nuggets from their own history, everyone learned how our community has always relied on Jesus to strengthen and encourage us through life's adversities. The other VBS teams that play a crucial role in the success of this ministry



are: Registration, Food Services, Music, Recreation, Teaching, and Teen Tabernacle. Each team works extremely hard weeks leading up to VBS to ensure the success of this program. Additionally, we were blessed to have FMZ Staff, Leadership, Security, and the Nurses on duty to help in their respective areas of expertise. As VBS seeks to use technology to its advantage, our first year of online registration was a huge success! It expanded our community outreach with a 34% increase in non-FMZBC member families. These students came from various churches and denominations, with 40% indicating no church affiliation. This fact allowed us, with the help of the Lord, to make a lasting impression on their hearts about who we are as the Body of Christ and who Jesus is as our Savior.

VBS was filled with inspiring lessons, great food, fun crafts, challenging games, and new friendships. As evidenced in our surveys, a major highlight of VBS for students and volunteers was Water Day, where the goal is to get yourself and everyone else as wet as possible. Mission accomplished...with the help of 6000 water balloons!

Yes, VBS was tons of fun, but we did not forget to share our blessings. We are especially proud with the results of our VBS Service Project, OPERATION WISHLIST.









We collected a total of 475 items and \$905 in gift cards! Our donation to the Loisann's Hope House, a homeless shelter located in Fredericksburg, included 36 beds-in-a-bag, 58 pillows, and \$510 in Walmart/grocery store gift cards.

Our second servant project was for the Fairfax Inova Children's Hospital. We collected 372 items comprised of dolls, cars, and coloring books, as well as \$395 in restaurant gift cards for children receiving care and their families. Thank you to the parents and members for your donations. May God bless each of you for your generosity.

THANK YOU First Mount Zion for making VBS possible and free, and for prioritizing outreach to children and teens. VBS 2020... here we come!

# THE CHAVE AVIN'S CORNER

## The Spiritual Discipline of Solitude

After an extensive and soul-searching study of the Discipline of Simplicity, let us continue with the second of four "Outward" Disciplines...**Solitude**. In quick review, the Outward Disciplines reveal what people need to do to improve the world around them, and they are: (1) Simplicity, (2) Solitude, (3) Submission, and (4) Service.

It has been noted that "without solitude it is virtually impossible to lead a spiritual life." Why is this so? Because, in solitude, we are freed from our bondage to people and our inner compulsions, and we are freed to love God and have compassion for others.

To enter solitude, we must disregard what others think of us. Who will understand this call to aloneness? Even our closest friends will see it as a terrible waste of precious time and as rather selfish and self-centered. But, oh, what liberty it releases in our hearts when we let go of the opinions of others! The less we are mesmerized by human voices, the more we can hear the Divine Voice. The less we are bound by others' expectations, the more we are open to God's expectations.

"But, in solitude, we die not only to others but also to ourselves. To be sure, at first, we thought solitude was a way to recharge our batteries in order to enter life's many competitions with new vigor and strength. In time, however, we find that solitude did not give us power to win the rat race; on the contrary, it taught us to ignore the "rat race!". Slowly, we found ourselves letting go of our inner compulsions to win and our frantic effort to attain. In the stillness, our false, busy selves are unmasked and seen for the imposters they truly are.

It is out of our liberation from others and self that our ears become open to hear and our eyes unveiled to see the goodness of God. We can love God because we do not have to love the world. Through our solitude, an open inner space has been created through which God finds us. In a deeper more profound way, we turn from the idols of the marketplace to the Glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. God takes this "useless" Discipline, this "wasted time," to make us His friend."

Revival 2019 was a week jam-packed with powerful, inspiring and rejuvenating messages from three anointed guest preachers. It was evident that our speakers were on assignment from God for this Body of Believers. While the consistent message throughout was in line with our theme, "Living in God's Assurance", each speaker encouraged us not to be weary in well-doing but to continue to trust God and live in His assurances as He is a God who never goes back on His Word and whose promises are true.

Dr. Dorothy Watson Tatem opened the floodgates of revival at our Sunday 8:00 and 11 a.m. services with the message titled: *"Living in God's Assurance: Go Back and Rebuild",* reminding us that the distinctive mark of a Christian is to be obedient to what God is instructing us and His instructions for us are to GO BACK AND REBUILD. There are various things that each of us need to go back and rebuild. Whatever that "thing" may be in our life that requires rebuilding, we must, clean up the mess or unfinished work we have made and left behind, otherwise we cannot keep moving forward effectively and with purpose.

On Monday and Tuesday, Rev. Canon Leonard Hamlin stirred up the conscience of those in attendance with his message titled "God Is Able". He emphatically challenged worshippers to strive to be different. He encouraged us to look for God and earnestly seek change and renewal of our minds, so that our lives will reflect the pattern that Christ has left for us to follow. He reminded us that there is nothing we can have need of that the Lord has not already provided. In order to be the recipient of His provisions, we must be looking for Him with the trust and assurance that He has already put things in place for us to utilize.

His encouragement on Tuesday night was a stirring message titled" "Can These Bones Live?" What a Word! The challenge to us was simply this: Are we ornaments or instruments? Are we waiting around watching who is doing what or are we, ourselves, participating in the process? He encouraged us to be willing vessels for God.

Rev. William H. Lamar III was the third revivalist. On Wednesday night, he encouraged us to be authentic in our worship, praise, and prayer life to God with the simple yet powerful message from the red letter teachings of Jesus from Matthew 6:9-13, *"The Lord's Prayer".* He said we are to approach God, "Our Father" as we would our earthly father. He then asked the question? Can Jesus be found in the sanctuary?

He stirred us up even the more on Thursday night with a message titled "*Give us this Day*" from John 21:1-12. He asked us to use our imagination as he reminded us of the Disciples fishing, catching nothing, yet Jesus as a servant on the shore cooking the fish. Give us this day our daily bread. He brought the Revival to a powerful conclusion on Friday night with the message titled: *"For Thine Is the Kingdom."* He gave us the statistics on sugar and how many pounds we consume each year and cautioned us to beware of churches that smell like a bakery... we should smell like sheep! Sprinkling sugar on our prayers can be dangerous. We should pray "Deliver us from evil." Whatever comes our way, we should always remember "For thine is the Kingdom and the power and the Glory forever." Amen.

God used these three Instruments to revive, refresh, rejuvenate, encourage and strengthen us in our Christian walk as there is much work left to do. They reminded us that GOD is sovereign and whatever is going on in our lives and in the world around us, God has it in control and we only need to trust Him in all things, for all things, and through all things, and He will work it out!

#### Did you know that September is Deaf Awareness Month?

It started out as the International Day of the Deaf back in 1958 and was championed by the World Federation of the Deaf – the UN-recognized representative of Deaf people worldwide. It has since been extended to being the International Week of the Deaf, and comprises the entirety of the last full week of September, though a quick Google search will show that there is a lot of variation out there. Local, regional and national organizations often having different weeks, days or even the whole month as their period of recognition!

The purpose of Deaf Awareness Month is to increase public awareness of deaf issues, people, and culture. Sign language, subtitled shows, accessibility at events, noise-consciousness, work safety, Deaf celebrities – there is so much we can share!

Activities and events throughout Deaf Awareness Weeks encourage individuals to come together as a community for both educational events and celebrations.

Some of the messages during Deaf Awareness Week include:

- Celebrate the culture, heritage, and language unique to deaf people of the world.
- Promote the rights of Deaf people throughout the world, including education for Deaf people, access to information and services, the use of sign languages, and human rights for Deaf people in developing countries.
- Recognize achievements of deaf people, including famous deaf individuals.

- Educate about the misconceptions of being deaf and the challenges the deaf population face during everyday life.
- Learn about types, degrees, and causes of hearing loss.
- Be exposed to sign language and other ways deaf and hard-of-hearing people communicate.

### Deaf Awareness Facts

What are the four levels of deafness? The four different levels of hearing loss are defined as: Mild, Moderate, Severe and Profound. These definitions are useful to give a rough guide as to how bad your hearing loss is but it's by no means an exact science -- for example, someone could have a mild hearing loss for low-pitch sounds and a moderate loss for higher pitch sounds (this is actually very common).

 Mild Hearing Loss. Someone with a mild hearing loss will not be able to hear sounds that are quieter than 25 - 45 dB. This means they will struggle to hear people whispering, won't hear the clock ticking, leaves rustling or the hum of electrical equipment. Normal everyday conversations may still be OK to hear in quiet environments but people may start to struggle more when there is more than one person talking or where there is background noise. Moderate Hearing Loss. Sounds in the range of 40 - 75 dB are the quietest someone with a moderate loss will be able to hear, this level of hearing loss is going to have a major impact on your ability to hear in day-to-day environments as it is likely you will now struggle to follow conversation, even in quiet environments, you'll probably still pick up some words, or parts of words, but it is going to be hard work.

- Severe Hearing Loss. Things are really going south now, someone with a severe loss will not be able to hear much below the 75 - 90 dB range. This means you won't be able to hear the TV, people talking, the phone ringing or most other everyday sounds. Again, as before, you may have a severe loss for some aspects of your hearing and a moderate or even mild in others.
- Profound Hearing Loss. 90 dB is the lowest sound you will be able to hear now. You would just about be able to hear a chainsaw, lawn mower or loud music.

September Focus is:

#### Our Call to Deliverance

This quarter is an exciting adventure in the Freedom narrative. I think we should invite friends to Sunday School just to have a different perspective. The lessons start in September with "*A Call for Deliverance*" and ends in November with "*Deliverance Accomplished*". We look forward to seeing everyone at Fifth Sunday Unity Sunday School!

First Sunday - *A Long Hard Oppression*. We can relate or empathize September's Focus for Sunday with the children of Israel during their enslavement. Our ancestors landed in this country in 1619. Ghana is celebrating the year of return 1619-2019, 400 years of African diaspora. If we look back over our own history, we can relate, understand and discuss the key words in the lesson. We find rigor, burden, bondage and infanticide; these are the same terms used to describe our ancestors' plight.

**The Birth of Moses** is on the Second Sunday. Here is a modern twist on the Moses story. Barack Hussein Obama-Yep! I said it. Let's look at President Obama's narrative. Because of the laws of this nation, he is considered Black. For the most part, the African American community accepted him. Here is the similarity - Moses was raised in Pharaoh's courts; President Obama was raised in a white culture. Moses and President Obama walked between two cultures. Moses learned Pharaoh's playbook and President Obama learned the white-middle class playbook from the inside.

Third Sunday; *A Comfortable Exile* - Moses is on the lam! Remember the infanticide mentioned on the first Sunday? Moses demonstrated exactly what the Pharaohs were afraid of - Hebrews who were not afraid to harm an Egyptian. Moses mother nursed him and she taught her son what it was to be Hebrew. Exodus 2:11 says, "When Moses was grown, he went out unto his brethren..." After seeing what the Egyptian was doing to 'his brethren;' he killed the Egyptian. Was this an angry act of love and empathy for the people he knew as his people?

On fourth Sunday we have that infamous **Burning Bush!** The lyrics of Earth Wind and Fire's - Burnin' Bush aptly describes Moses, the Hebrew people, our ancestors and the African American community situation. <u>https://</u> www.youtube.com/watch? <u>v=QXpWs4\_VWNw</u> - If you have a chance, listen to it.

In Exodus 3:1. Moses is tending sheep. developing the skills he would need to lead his people out of bondage to freedom. Notice the symbology in the text. The Angel-messenger of God, sent by God. There are some missions we takewe must know they are God given. The flame of fire-passion of God, pure power and control; another demonstration of the omnipotence of God. The burning bush - a people, a life, a living thing, (artistic license following) -- "Moses if I, YAHWEH, can stop a flame from consuming a bush, I can protect and provide for you and your people." The next time we see the phrase "Here am I" is in Isaiah 6:8. Moses removed his shoesintimacy, and relationship, he could not touch God. But! God placed him on holy ground. The turning of his face, demonstrated humility. God spoke to Moses and gave him the mission-up close and personal. Moses could not deny God's presence, nor doubt his mission.

Finally, Let My People Go, for fifth Sunday. Here is another modernization of this text: Pharaoh-southern slave owners; Israel-our ancestors; Moses and Aaron-the abolitionists and freedom fighters. Can you see the parallels? Pharaoh's rebuttal in Exodus 5:2 to Moses' request in Exodus 5:1, is akin to the chant slave owners made during slavery "States' rights." Because the Israelites wanted freedom, Pharaoh's demands became harsher. Because abolitionists supported our desire to be free, slave owners increased their cruelty upon our ancestors. Our ancestors received punishments and tortures that could be described as another Inquisition.

tion. Through it all our ancestors persevered, and we will too!
