





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"Keeping God in Our Daily Schedule"

"O God, You are my God; early will I seek You... Because Your loving kindness is better than life, my lips shall praise You. Thus I will bless You while I live; I will lift up my hands in Your name"

Psalms 63:1a, 3-4

Making time in our schedules for God is essential for every Christian! If you slacked off spending time daily with the Lord during the summer months, it's time to get back on schedule or start a new life-giving habit.

Autumn is here, and sometimes the hardest part of making the transition from summer to fall is the reality that we have to let go of our relaxed summer schedule! Schools, colleges and church ministries are back in full swing; and so are our individual schedules. Most of us try to exercise regularly and eat healthy, but for the Christian, the most important habit we should never neglect is to spend time daily with our Lord and Savior.

One of Pastor Torian's recent sermons, based on Psalm 63:1-5 challenged and reminded us to seek the Lord early by starting our day in prayer. When we start our day in prayer to God (whether short or long) it changes our perspective of God, others and the situations we face every day! Taking time to reflect on who God is in our lives gives us renewed strength to face the challenges of life in His strength and not our own.

Deaconess Chaplain Terry Davis in one of her inspirational devotions from "Crosswalk.com," entitled "Mary or Martha?" by Jamy Whitaker, also reminded us of what happened to Martha in Luke 10:38-42. Martha was focused solely on the preparations and was missing out on time with Jesus. The devotion reminded us that "you and I need to be intentional with our daily time with God. It is so easy to become caught up in the day-to-day and to-do lists that we lose sight of what is most important – our relationship with God. Like any relationship, you must spend quality time together for it to grow."

"Make time for God even if you have to schedule it. Cultivating this relationship needs to be a priority. Make the choice today." The "Mary or Martha?" devotion closed with the following prayer that we can all relate to and may want to post on our bathroom mirrors as a daily reminder.

"Dear heavenly Father, I come to You today with a heavy heart and a load too much for me to bear. I lay my todo list at Your feet. I know that my relationship with You is what needs to be first in my life and everything else will fall into place. Help me to daily remember to turn to You and Your Word instead of running to my schedule and lists. Teach me to discern the difference between what is necessary and what I can let go of. I lean on You and trust You to guide my steps as I long to draw closer to You. In Your Precious Name, Amen."

From the Sunday School Superintendent

We continue to study the Exodus in October, through the eyes of the African D diaspora. Our ancestors' involuntary relocation to the Americas has a commonality with the Israelites and their quest for liberation. The Israelites sought God's face for deliverance and our ancestors sought God's face for deliverance and God set both captives free.

The first lesson in October is about the first plague, the plague of blood. This is not just a plague; it is a demonstration of the power of the true and living God-Yahweh. Turning the Nile into blood was an attack and annihilation of Osiris, the river god-that's god with a little 'g.' The Nile was an important part of Egypt, it was used for food as well as commerce; it's hard to sell rotting fish. If this Egyptian god was as mighty as they believed, then God's command would not have been obeyed.

The Second lesson shows Pharaoh playing BLUFF with God. Pharaoh asked Moses, to ask his God to make the rain, hail and thunder stop; "and then Moses, you and your people can leave." Previously, God destroyed five other gods before destroying Nut, the Egyptian Sky goddess. Moses did as Pharaoh asked. Pharaoh did not even fake a yes. Pharaoh outright denied the Israelites an opportunity to leave. Little did Pharaoh understand or comprehend-he was running out of gods to call on. Maybe Pharaoh was hoping one of his gods was stronger than the God of the Israelites.

Pharaoh's predicament, Pharaoh continues to resist with prideful stubbornness. Have you ever met or seen someone who figuratively, continuously banged their head against a wall? That is what came to mind, as I read the text. Imagine Pharaoh's contempt for God. He continues to bang his head. While he is head-banging, God completely turns out the lights-darkness is upon the land. Another Egyptian god bites the dust. Ra, the sun god, is defeated. Pharaoh tries to bargain with Moses and keep Israel's livestock. Moses would not have it. "Nope! We need them for the sacrifices we will make." Exodus 10:21-22, sums it up; in today's verbiage —Pharaoh said, "get out of my face, if I see you again, I'll kill you!" Moses's reply, "you have spoken well, you won't see me anymore." Was this a prophecy of Pharaoh's death in the Red Sea?

Passover, also known as Pesach, is a Jewish holiday. It lasts for eight days to celebrate their liberation from the Egyptians. The first Passover was the beginning of being a free people. The final god was proven powerless-Pharaoh! Everyone in a blood covered dwelling was spared. It did not matter if they were Egyptian, Israelite or another. If they were covered by the blood of the lamb, they were covered by the blood of the lamb. This was a foretelling of what was to come-liberation for all who wanted it and sought God for it. As God said, "you will remember this day" and indeed, they have. What do you consider the equivalent of Passover in the African American community?

Amen! Amen! Amen!

Rev. Cherry is an unassuming Woman of God who stands on the Word of God to **BE-LIEVE**.




Encouragement and Assurance for the Soul

LEADERSHIP THE CHAPMANS CORNER

The Spiritual Discipline of Submission

Let us continue our study of the book *Celebration of Discipline* by Richard J. Foster, with the 3rd of 4 "Outward" Disciplines...**Submission**. In quick review, The Outward Disciplines reveal what people need to do to improve the world around them and they are 1. Simplicity, 2. Solitude, 3. **Submission** and 4. Service.

In **Submission**, we recognize the legitimate authority of others over us. It is nothing more than the simple understanding that "no man is an island." Life in community is our rightful home: relationships with other human beings is our inheritance. To confess our commitment to community means to confess our commitment to mutual subordination. Peter crystallized this principle in the simple phrase, "Honor all men" (1 Peter 2:17a), and Paul set forth the idea in what must be considered the most memorable sentence on the subject, "Be subject to one another out of reverence for Christ" (Eph. 5:21).

Submission is a concept as broad as life itself and a Discipline found throughout Scripture. It raises issues that are deep and difficult: issues of submission to the "ways of God, issues of submission to the state, issues of submission to the Christian fellowship, issues of submission in the Christian household and much more. As we hammer out our understanding of these matters, we will always want to hold before us the life and death of Christ as the divine paradigm by which all the verbs of Christian submission are to be conjugated.

In our day, however, we tend to terribly garble and abuse the Biblical guidance on **Submission**. We tend to take the best teaching and use it for the worst ends.

Next Issue we will describe some of the **Submission** character descriptions and see if you can identify.




COMMUNITY Teachers Teading and Serving










Back-to-School Blessing

On third Sunday, September 15, 2019, FMZ had a special worship service where Pastor Torian engaged the students of our congregation to share their thoughts and to pray for blessings for the new school year. Our students and educators from kindergarten through college gathered in and around the pulpit and altar to engage directly with Pastor Torian. At the 11 AM service FMZ members of Jack and Jill of America, Inc. participated in the Back to School Blessing worship. The students answered Pastor's questions and expressed their faith and expectations for the new school year. One of our educators, Brother Mario Vernon Watson, provided the congregation with his perspectives as

a history and special needs teacher. Brother Watson discussed the challenging nature of teaching and how God has enabled him to exceed the average longevity of three years as a special needs teacher. He has been teaching special needs students for over 20 years. He encouraged students to be respectful of teachers, trust in Christ, be courageous, let their light shine, whisper short prayers through the day, and call on the name of Christ. He also encouraged parents to pray with their children daily and take responsibility to raise their children in a Godly manner. Sister Dominique Johnson (Zone M2), Forest Park High School Class of 2020, shared a personal testimony, which is shared below in its entirety.

Dominique's Testimony

I have written several speeches and papers in my life and I have never had issues writing them. The words usually just come to me, but for some reason, this one was the most difficult of all. I have never written one for church and for whatever reason that scared me. I put off writing this for a while because I was subconsciously scared to write it and I wasn't ready to face that fear yet. When the time came to write it, I still wasn't ready but I had to. I still didn't know what I wanted to share so I would write a little and erase then write and erase, eventually I had to stop erasing and just go with what I felt.

A few years ago I wrote a speech about dreams and was going to use that to help me form this and as I went back to read one of the easiest speeches I had ever written it made me wonder why was that so easy but this one was so hard. After some thought and prayer, I came to the conclusion that my previous writings were written to inspire ME, and I now needed to inspire other people.

You may be thinking she could just write this to herself and it would be fine and that's what I thought too so I tried it and that didn't work. What I finally realized is that I was limiting myself without even knowing it. I wasn't allowing God to step in.

Now, I could speak to you about studying and getting a good night's rest so that you are more alert in school...But, I chose to encourage you not to limit yourself in what you do or allow others to turn you into someone you shouldn't be. Each day we face many obstacles. Whether you're dealing with people, writing a paper, having issues at school or work. One of the many things I have learned in high school that can apply to anyone is, don't let your peers cause you to become fake PERIOD.

So let out your little quirks, your not so normal laugh, your ugly cry, or your funny dance moves because you are you and no one else can be you!

God blessed each of us with our own uniqueness. Don't give into peer pressure or the pressures of the world, be respectful to others and be the you. God created you to be you. You can be the inspiration that someone needs to be encouraged to do the right thing.

Pastor Torian's encouragement to the students included the challenge to take advantage of the opportunities they have to fulfill their dreams and aspirations, don't let anyone hold you back, and fill their minds with meaningful knowledge. He encouraged parents, educators, administrators and staff to continue to be the unique people who have our students best interests at heart and to keep Christ in their hearts.

We thank all of our students for participating in the special service and we continue to pray for a fantastic year of learning, discovery, and academic blessings. We also pray for every soul linked to our schools and their safe learning environments. Thank you to our educators, administrators, and parents. May God's grace and mercy inspire and strengthen you through this 2019-2020 academic year.

What is Celebrate Recovery?

Celebrate Recovery is a Christ-centered recovery program using the biblical principles found in the Sermon on the Mount, in the Gospel of Matthew, chapter 5.

Celebrate Recovery is about addressing and experiencing freedom from our **hang ups, hurts and habits.** Celebrate Recovery is a safe and confidential space for everyone to share freely without judgement.

What is a hang up?

Hang ups are negative mental attitudes that are used to cope with people or adversity (anger, depression, fear, unforgiveness, etc.).

Celebrate Recovery is a place where we encourage one another's growth and restoration by sharing our experiences and strengths with one another. Through prayer, study, fellowship and sharing, we support one another along our individual journeys with God towards spiritual maturity, wholeness and healing. The truth and freedom we'll gain from this program will foster peace, serenity and joy in our lives as we strengthen our relationship with God and others.

Celebrate Recovery can be complementary to professional therapy, counseling or medical treatment. It is not a replacement.

What is a hurt?

The feeling of being **hurt** is an emotional reaction to another person's behavior or to a disturbing situation, (abuse, abandonment, co-dependency, divorce, relationship issues, etc.).

What is a habit?

A **habit** is an addiction or compulsion for someone or something (alcohol, drugs, food, gambling, shopping, inappropriate television viewing, shoplifting, etc.).

You are not alone. History of the Mass Choir

The First Mount Zion Baptist Church Mass Choir was formed in November of 1989 to bring unity among the choirs of the church. This Choir is primarily made up of members of all church choral auxiliaries. The Mass Choir sings at worship services the first Sunday of each month, and performs at the Pastor's request or upon the recommendation of the Minister of Music.

Some highlights in the Choir's background include the making of its first recording entitled "We Sing Praises" in 1992, the Choir traveled to Pensacola, Florida, to be in concert at the Greater Little Rock Baptist Church. In 1995, the Choir accepted an invitation to sing at the 32nd Church Anniversary of New Rising Star Missionary Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama. In 1996, the choir also traveled to First Baptist Church, Washington Park, Richmond, Virginia. In 1997, the choir traveled to New York to take part in Youth Day services at Berean Missionary Baptist Church. Locally, First Mount Zion's Mass Choir is also popular, and has accepted invitations to sing at various community functions including the "Annual Black History Program" in 2001 sponsored by the Prince William Symphony Orchestra. In 1996, 1998 and 2000, the choir participated in the "Taste of Heaven" programs at Hylton Memorial Chapel along with other area churches.

In October 2009, the Music & Arts Ministry celebrated the 20th Anniversary of Sylstea C. Sledge as Minister of Music with a gala program. The Mass Choir was the featured choir at the National Gallery of Arts "Christmas Celebration" in Washington, D.C. "Caroling in the Rotunda" was held December 16, 2000. The Choir performed excerpts from Glenn E. Burleigh's Christmas Cantata, and lead a selected holiday music sing-a-long.

We welcome all those who are committed to providing an environment that is pleasing to the Lord and want to volunteer to serve Him together with us.


