

While we could not celebrate our Pastor's 25th Anniversary in a manner befitting his stature because of COVID-19 and social distancing, the Pastor's Anniversary Committee consisting of Dr. Sandra K. James, Trustee James Simpson, Trustee Oscar Dailey, Deacon Vannie Parker, Deacon Lloyd Cox, Deacon Michell Clark, Deaconess Tina Coates, Deaconess Cynthia Brown, Sis. Pamela Sessoms and Sis. Oonagh Bell, found a way during the month of May, to still celebrate him on each Sunday, first by lifting him up in prayer, and then by sharing with him and the congregation a little bit of how we felt about his **History**, his **Labor**, his **Life** and his **Legacy**. We culminated the Sunday acknowledgements on the fifth Sunday with a compilation of his accomplishments in Ministry, presenting him with a commemorative plaque as a token of our appreciation for his service.

We also celebrated his birthday, presenting him with gift cards and a personal gift from the Pastor's Aide Ministry, and we honored his elegant wife, Sister Clarice Torian, presenting her with a beautiful floral arrangement and recognized his daughter, Constance, with a lovely corsage. We forwarded an electronic greeting card bearing over 350 entries with well-wishes to our Pastor, shared comments made on social media #PT25, debuted our Virtual Choir and showcased our *Faces in the Pews* from over 400 members, all as a demonstration of our affection for our Pastor, and we culminated the celebration with a "drive-thru" with over 100 cars participating, all displaying our affection with gifts, cards, flowers, art works, balloons, and the like. It was an amazing success and we applaud all those who participated!

Our Church history details that on April 1, 1995, we called Dr. Luke E. Torian to serve as our Pastor. He accepted the call and took the reins on May 1, 1995 as the full-time Pastor-elect. On the first Sunday in June, 1995, 25 years ago, Dr. Luke E. Torian was officially installed as the Pastor and continues to serve in that capacity.

There were many accomplishments over the years. The Ministry flourished under his dynamic leadership as he melded both ministry and community activities. He implemented VISION-98 which included resuscitating former ministries, combining others, and creating new ones, and we recognize the role he plays in this Church to which he is divinely assigned.

First Mount Zion had already built two buildings in the preceding fifty years under the former leadership and now, the miracle assigned to his leadership allowed for the construction of the FMZBC Campus! Nobody but GOD could manifest that, and no man could do these things except GOD be with him.

So, enthusiastically we say . . . Thank you, Pastor Torian, for your commitment, your dedication, your love, your honesty, your transparency, and most importantly, your continued desire to live in God's assurance, being confident of this very thing, that **HE** who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ!

SOME OF THE SUCCESSES AND COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT PROJECTS INSTITUTED OR CONTINUED BY DR. LUKE E. TORIAN

- Over the past 25 years, 3,494 New Members joined the Ministry, 1,352 Baptisms and 177 Baby Dedications were performed; a true testament to what God is doing in this Ministry;
- Coordinated and participated in youth mission trips to Nassau, Bahamas and Montego Bay, Jamaica;
- Sponsored the Mary Elizabeth Ministry, mentoring local community teen mothers and fathers;
- Provides ministry and outreach to youth incarcerated in Juvenile Detention facilities in Prince William County;
- Served as a founding member of VOICE Virginians Organized for Interfaith Community Engagement. The goals are advocating for affordable housing, strengthening public education, and combating intolerance and injustices against immigrants;
- Serves as the host site and distribution center for SHARE, providing quality groceries for substantially reduced savings to participants;
- Provided food and shelter for Prince William County victims devastated by the 2012 Tropical Storm Lee;
- Provided on-the-ground relief in support of those affected by the 2010 Haitian earthquake;
- Sponsored the Feed My Starving Children program for three consecutive years resulting in the preparation of over 200,000 special meals each year for children living in Haiti;
- Implemented an intramural basketball league for high school boys;
- Continuing a faith-based, long-term relationship with the Rio Hondo Preparatory School, Arcadia, CA—a relationship that has extended over 40 years;
- Serves as active participant in Prince William County Ministerial Association participating in ecumenical services and bringing together pastors of all faiths to fellowship, support and pray for each other; and
- Participates in the Taste of Heaven at the Hylton Chapel with an estimated 45 churches and over 5,000 persons in attendance.

DELEGATE LUKE E. TORIAN'S LEGISLATIVE EFFORTS AND SUCCESSES

Delegate Torian was elected to represent the 52nd District in the Virginia House of Delegates in 2009 and has championed causes in a myriad of areas, working tirelessly especially in those areas that affect our community-at-large. This year, Dr. Torian was appointed the first African American to Chair Virginia's Appropriation Committee. Some of his past accomplishments focused on:

- Higher education institutions
- Staffing ratios for school nurses and school personnel
- Administration of Epi Pens to youth in outdoor educational programs
- Virginia Military Survivors and Dependents Education Program
- Medical assistance services (long-term care eligibility, screening, reporting)
- Nursing homes and assisted living facilities
- Crisis and emergency management
- Personal Property Tax Relief Act
- Providing regulatory flexibility to Defense contractors
- Review approval or denial of application by local government for family day homes
- Mandated that VRS convene a work group to encourage and facilitate retirement savings
- Instituted policies prohibiting abusive work environment
- Requested Christopher Newport University to lead a study on state-run retirement savings plans for people without employer provided plans
- Prohibiting use of handheld personal communication devices while driving
- Voted to pass a constitutional amendment to restore civil rights if person has served full sentence
- He was also instrumental in setting up community forums dealing with Town Hall on Police and Community Relations; Clergy and Law Enforcement Community Dialogue; Second Chance/Restorative Justice Community Forum; Department of Veterans Affairs Town Hall

We are sure there are nights you don't sleep because your husband is tossing and turning and sweating in agony over unresolved Church conflicts; we are sure there are times you have cried with him as you felt his pain; we are sure there were dark days, but you withstood the test of time because, in the midst of it all, you knew that God was right there, and we are also sure there were, and perhaps still are, times when you prayed for your daughter until you had no words left and God answered those prayers. We know that you, too, have troubles and sometimes might feel all alone, unable to share your heart with anyone, but yet you remain the constant in Pastor's life. You are the one on whom he lays his head at night after a long and disappointing day, or just needing some TLC, you know what we mean.

On the flip side, we cannot even fathom the joy you experience over a lost sheep being found when your husband preaches a life-saving message; what satisfaction you get in knowing God uses you and your husband to care for His Flock, to weep with those who weep and to rejoice with those who rejoice. Could anything be more meaningful than leading the lost to eternity? It's worth it. Please be assured that your life and your ministry matter. The Apostle Paul must have had you in mind when he said, "Not that we are adequate to think anything of ourselves, but our adequacy is of God". 
Happy 25th Anniversary, First Lady Clarice Torian, know that God is well-pleased with your service. We love you!

Message to Our Youth

Faithful Adaption

2 And again He entered Capernaum after some days, and it was heard that He was in the house. ² Immediately many gathered together, so that there was no longer room to receive them, not even near the door. And He preached the word to them. ³ Then they came to Him, bringing a paralytic who was carried by four men. ⁴ And when they could not come near Him because of the crowd, they uncovered the roof where He was. So when they had broken through, they let down the bed on which the paralytic was lying. ⁵ When Jesus saw their faith, He said to the paralytic, "Son, your sins are forgiven you." Mark 2:2-5

My favorite novel is Zora Neale Hurston's "Their Eyes Were Watching God." To me, it's a compelling and enjoyable story that doesn't get stale or grow old because its central character is on a life-long journey towards love, personal fulfilment and community development. Some would probably call me extreme or say, "I'm doing too much." Let me explain. I have read the book a few times; I've memorized the opening page and the story's plot. I've seen two live performance versions -- plays; I've seen a movie version and the-made-for-network-tv version that was produced by Oprah Winfrey and starred Hallie Berry. In other words, I have read the book so many times that I know when someone comes close to the original book -- a faithful adaption -- or makes any changes and takes director's privilege -- an unfaithful adaption -- to the Hurston's book.

The four men in our story have the clear mission to carry their companion who is paralyzed, who is in need to encounter Jesus. The four men reach the house where Jesus preached and noticed that the house was crowded. The four men could not get close to Jesus because the crowd obstructed their anticipated way or the path towards being with Jesus. Mark doesn't provide any details of the conversation between the four men, whether they were discouraged or encouraged. We just don't know. But what we do know is that the four men had to determine how to complete their mission and work together to accomplish it. The four men had to faithfully adapt to their current situation. Again, they had to remain focused on the mission of ensuring that their paralyzed companion would encounter Jesus.

We, young believers in Christ, can relate to the four men's experience and mission. In a way COVID-19 and all the responsible precautions obstructs our way to the house of worship, First Mount Zion. We can't meet with church family and friends to worship and for ministry occasions in our usual way. Consider your life and how can you encounter Jesus at home, at church, in our vehicles or through technology. We must faithfully adapt. We must discern how to live with and for Christ in this different and abnormal context caused by COVID-19.

What roof must you uncover to encounter Jesus now and as the pandemic fades? What creative ways can you use to encounter and please Jesus? Bible reading? Prayer? Helping others?

WE SEE YOU BROTHER! HAPPY FATHER'S DAY

"The righteous man walks in his integrity; His children are blessed after him." (Proverbs 20:7, NKJV)

Integrity is an important characteristic of being a father. Some of us have demonstrated integrity most of our lives. There are men who lacked integrity, honesty, uprightness, and strong moral principles that walked away. God's intent for creating a family begins with marriage between a man and a woman, then children, but marriage isn't necessary to become a father. It's not necessary to have biological offspring to be a father. Some of us have become fathers to the fatherless. Because we made a baby, it doesn't make us a father, we just reproduced! Being a father is a loving commitment; it is accepting or taking responsibility for that God-given life that looks back at you with love and adoration.

We see you brother! This Father's Day let's celebrate the fathers who walked a hard road. The ones who through much adversity maintained a presence and are present in their children's lives. You can be a father and see your child every day and not have a presence or be present in their lives. There are fathers who don't see their children daily but are present and have a presence in the lives of their children. We see you brother! All of us know at least one father in this category: The battle-worn, weary father who walks through briars and thickets for his children, hostile divorces, bitter ex-wives, ungracious children, humiliation, false accusations and overall ill-intent. Because of their integrity, they remind us of the old Timex commercial; "Takes a Licking and Keeps on Ticking." We do not celebrate meeting our requirements as a parent: providing food, clothing, shelter, and support. We are recognizing the fact that your journey as a father isn't as easy as some, but you are determined to hang in there.

We see you brother! On Father's Day, we seldom recognize the brothers who would love to see their children and cannot. They do the right things, they are present, they participate and have a presence in their children's lives. Let's recognize them for not giving up, for hanging tough, and representing God in their children's lives. Because they demonstrate to them through their integrity, no matter how hard it becomes; as David told Solomon, "Be strong and of good courage, and do it; do not fear nor be dismayed, for the Lord God, my God, will be with you. He will not leave you nor forsake you, until you have finished all the work for the service of the house of the Lord." (1 Chronicles 28:20, NKJV) Their children can believe two things; first, God will not leave them nor forsake them; second, neither will you!

We see you brother! More importantly, God sees you! Be blessed!

Greetings FMZ Family!



While each person could have skipped the call to watch Netflix and Hulu, we had a great time sharing with each other.

Now to the lesson Chapter 6, "Joining the Wood" by Pastor H. Michael Brewer. Jesus Promises the Holy Spirit: On that day you will realize that I am in my Father, and you are in Me, and I am in you. John 14:20.

Carpentry requires two fundamental skills: shaping wood and joining wood. Any carpenter who can't put two pieces of wood together and make them stay may be in the wrong business. While nails may be our first choice for joining boards, nailing isn't always the best option. Not only are nails unattractive for finished work, they sometimes spilt the wood and often work loose over time. A joint often works better than a nail, just as it does today. Jesus likely used some of the various joints that wood workers still employ such as: tongue and groove and dove tails. For two boards to interlock, they must be shaped to fit each other. This practice of interlocking boards in a joint explains how the Bible teaches that we dwell in Christ and that Christ also dwells in us. Our Lord shapes us so that we are fitted and fastened to Him. We are joined to Christ and Christ is to us. Connected form of interlocking and enduring joints. We are never again alone, never forsaken and never abandoned. Romans 8:38-39 For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

In closing, do not forget to realize that God is your Father, and you are in Him and He is in you. This is the time to get some work done in your life, join some pieces in your life together. Now is the time to be productive in the time of this pandemic. When your identity is in question, trust in God's assurance to see your through.

People come to support groups looking for something: anything that can help relieve their burdens. We typically talk about looking for people who "really understand what they are going through" because many are experiencing similar circumstances. The groups are designed to provide emotional, educational, and social support for caregivers through regularly scheduled meetings. They help participants develop coping methods and encourage caregivers to maintain their personal, physical, and emotional health, as well as optimally care for the person requiring caregiver support. We have five outstanding and caring Certified Alzheimer's Caregiver Support Group Facilitators:

Group 1 and 3 facilitators are Deacon Andy Walker and Deaconess Bella Fetters. They meet twice a month on the second and fourth Wednesday at 11 a.m. in Stafford, Virginia.

Group 2 facilitators are Deaconess Carol Roney and Les Young. They meet twice a month on the second and fourth Tuesday at 7 p.m. at First Mount Zion. Our Small Groups Director also serves as a Certified Alzheimer's Caregiver Support Group Facilitator. These support groups serve our church members, their families and the community. As certified support group facilitators, we have been blessed, along with other support group members, to help many caregivers and families become knowledgeable in various aspects of dealing with loved ones with Alzheimer's, and other related dementia's, along with other debilitating illnesses requiring caregiver support to include coping skills, sharing similar experiences, monetary benefits and entitlements, resources and aid that may be available.

Presently, our meetings are held via teleconferences and ZOOM due to COVID 19. Our time for caring and sharing is very important to us and those we serve. We look forward to our time together and are anchors for one another when things are rough, especially now while many cannot see or hug their loved ones in assisted living facilities or nursing homes. This is due to visitors being limited to only essential healthcare providers, which is for everyone's safety. If you're interested in joining one of our support groups, we are here for you.



EAGLES HEALTH AND NUTRITION

The Eagles Health and Nutrition Small Group serves as a tool to help empower each to play an active role in maintaining his or her own overall health status. We demonstrate this concept by emphasizing that this type of engagement will have a major impact on overall health. First and foremost, unless one is actively engaged, he or she will only, at best, be below true potential. So, we emphasize reaching maximum potential in a realistic fashion, while at the same time having fun with it. It's not all doom and gloom, but each person must develop commitment in order to attain true health benefits.

Nutrient classes (Carbs, Proteins, Fats, Vitamins, Minerals) are first discussed to allow one to have a better understanding of the impact of various food groups on the body and how the body uses them. All Carbs are not bad as they include our many fruits and vegetables packed with essential nutrients. We mention the important roles of proteins (producing enzymes needed to carry on cellular processes, helping build immune cells, helping with muscle mass, etc.). And healthier fats are important even for brain function and a host of other benefits. We discuss the importance of dietary fiber on gut health and overall health. Many dietary plans are discussed (Keto, Atkins, South Beach, Mediterranean, etc.). Many such diets are low carb and we discuss their true worth as well as compare low carb vs low fat. I also provide my own opinion from a biochemical viewpoint on the two plans, but each person is empowered to adopt his or her own plan.

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maintaining weight control, increasing metabolism, increasing lung capacity and heart function, and increasing circulating endorphins to help produce a more relaxed state.


We also touch on the importance of getting proper sleep and rest. We discuss basic biology of DNA repair and that is done best with adequate rest. Chronic fatigue and lack of rest can lead to a more weakened immune system, which can cascade into a host of disease states, including various cancers, all of which may be avoided from occurring with proper care.

Finally, we look at understanding some of the basics on your annual physical medical report (A1C, Fasting Blood Sugar, HDL, LDL, Blood Pressure, GFR-Glomerular Filtration Rate, etc). These all play an important role in empowering each of us to play an active role in maintaining our own health status.
