CHRISTIAN LIVING IN A TECH-SHAPED WORLD

"Not that I speak in regards to need, for I have learned in whatever state I am, to be content: I know how to be abased, and I know how to abound. Everywhere and in all things I have learned both to be full and to be hungry, both to abound and to suffer need." Paul closes: "I can do all things with Christ who strengthens me." -- Philippians 4:11-13

A sociologist tried to put life in the 21st century into perspective saying, "We have shaped our technology; our technology has shaped us." "Technology has facilitated a new way of being ourselves, of being with one another and of being with God.", asserts *Grace and Gigabytes* author Panzer. Of course, technology is not all to life, but these statements contain profound truths. We live in what has been called the Digital Age or the Information Age, which has been defined as the time period starting in the 1970s with the introduction of the personal computer with subsequent technology introduced providing the ability to transfer information freely and quickly.

Listen to this: In a normal day, I will "Google" an idea, "Slack" my co-workers a meeting request, "Snap" my research findings before the meeting; CashApp enough for lunch; Zoom them from home; and Tweet to the world about my successful meeting. Before I offer a translation, let me offer a hint to solve what sounds like a riddle. The names of popular brands now function as a noun and a verb in this Digital age or Tech-shaped world. So, I researched an idea, scheduled a meeting, sent my document, contributed my lunch money, video chatted, and publicly announced the results.

Here's a little bit of background to put the range of Paul's experience into perspective. Paul was born to Jewish parents but he also laid claim to the privilege of Roman citizenship. Paul wrote to the members of the Church at Corinth that he had been in prison frequently, flogged severely, and exposed to death again and again. Paul faced many challenges, and the gathering of resources was not always easy or given. Hence, Paul developed a way of being that enabled him to be "content" through any circumstances. "Content" here does not mean that one lets anything go without a care, but one has an enduring resolve that relies on "Jesus Christ." Paul was not alone in life. Believers in Jesus Christ had Jesus, and were empowered by Christ in the first century world; believers in Jesus Christ have Jesus to empower them in a tech-shaped world.

What does this look like for you and I? When we wake in the morning, we have to express our love and devotion to our Creator, God, before touching any of our devices. When we are online, we engage others in a way that honors God. This means that we seek to respond to cyberbullying in a manner that brings glory to God.

Wisdom is so crucial to a believer's life that a whole book of the Bible is devoted to it. Proverbs reminds us to seek wisdom from God and that we are happy when we find true *wisdom*. Where do we find it? *Through Christ alone!!!* through the resources God has given us: His Holy and Living Word, Prayer, and Holy Spirit, Who dwells within us.

Talk it over

THE FEAR FACTOR

Fear is a natural response that every human being will experience, so where do you retreat when afraid? In times of trouble or distress, where do you turn? In Psalm 56: 3-4 (NLT), David says, "When I am afraid, I will put my trust in You. I praise God for what He has promised. I trust in God, so why should I be afraid?" David, the young man who killed a lion and a bear, who killed Goliath and was a successful military officer, did not deny the presence of fear. David confessed that he was afraid while hiding from King Saul and during his refuge in the Philistine's camp, yet somewhere between "When I am afraid" and "so why should I be afraid," he readjusts his thinking and makes a bold decision to not only trust in God's word, but to praise His word!

What is our response going to be when we are faced with fear? MARY CHURCH TERRELL (1863-1954)



Mary Eliza Church Terrell was a wellknown African American activist who championed racial equality and women's suffrage in the late 19th and early 20th century. An Oberlin College graduate, Terrell was part of the rising black middle and upper class who used their position to fight racial discrimination.

The daughter of former slaves, Terrell was born on September 23, 1863 in Memphis, Tennessee. Her father, Robert Reed Church, was a successful businessman who became one of the South's first African American millionaires. Her mother, Louisa Ayres Church, owned a hair salon. She had one brother. Terrell's parents divorced during her childhood. Their affluence and belief in the importance of education enabled Terrell to attend the Antioch College laboratory school in Ohio, and later Oberlin College, where she earned both Bachelor's and Master's degrees. Terrell spent two years teaching

at Wilburforce College before moving to Washington DC, in 1887 to teach at the M Street Colored High School. There she met, and in 1891, married, Heberton Terrell, also a teacher. The Terrells had one daughter and later adopted a second daughter.



Her activism was sparked in 1892, when an old friend, Thomas Moss, was lynched in Memphis by whites because his business competed with theirs. Terrell joined Ida B. Wells-Barnett in anti-lynching campaigns, but Terrell's life work focused on the notion of racial uplift, the belief that blacks would help end racial discrimination by advancing themselves and other members of the race through education, work, and community activism. It was a strategy based on the power of equal opportunities to advance the race and her belief that as one succeeds, the whole race would be elevated. Her words—"Lifting as we climb"—became the motto of the National Association of Colored Women (NACW), the group she helped found in 1896. She was NACW president from 1896 to 1901.

As NACW president, Terrell campaigned tirelessly among black organizations and mainstream white organizations, writing and speaking extensively. She also actively embraced women's suffrage, which she saw as essential to elevating the status of black women, and consequently, the entire race. She actively campaigned for black women's suffrage. She even picketed the Wilson White House with members of the National Woman's Party in her zeal for woman suffrage.

Terrell fought for woman suffrage and civil rights because she realized that she belonged "to the only group in this country that has two such huge obstacles to surmount...both sex and race."

In 1909, Terrell was among the founders and charter members of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. Then in 1910, she co-founded the College Alumnae Club, later renamed the National Association of University Women.

Following the passage of the 19th amendment, Terrell focused on broader civil rights. In 1940, she published her autobiography, *A Colored Woman in a White World*, outlining her experi-ences with discrimination. In 1948, Terrell became the first black member of the American Association of University Women, after winning an anti-discrimination lawsuit. In 1950, at age 86, she challenged segregation in public places by protesting the John R. Thompson Restaurant in Washington, DC. She was victori-ous when, in 1953, the Supreme Court ruled that segregated eating facilities were unconstitutional, a major breakthrough in the civil rights movement. Terrell died in 1954 in Highland Beach, Maryland.

OUR FIRST MOUNT ZION HISTORY

Mount Zion Baptist Church was organized in 1867 in Stafford County, Virginia with 22 members. In 1873 the Church body separated into two congregations after a dispute over the location for a new site. Under court arbitration one congregation was named First Mount Zion and the other retained the name of Mount Zion.

In 1947 First Mount Zion relocated to its present location in Dumfries after the War Department incorporated the land (Quantico Marine Corps Base) upon which the Church occupied. Initially worship services were held only once a month, later twice a month and in 1965 services were held every Sunday.

In April 1962, Rev. Augustus Thomas Gaskins accepted the Church's call as Pastor and served for 33 years until June 1995 when he was elevated to Pastor Emeritus. In June 1995 the Church called the Rev. Dr. Luke E. Torian as her first full-time Pastor.

A later sanctuary was constructed in 1981 to accommodate the growing congregation. The present facility was completed in April 2001. FMZ hosted the Third Annual Prince William County Martin Luther King celebration and in March 1993 Prince William County's First Annual Women of Gospel Music Conference.

The movie "The Color of Fear" held at the Hylton Chapel on 1200 February 10. 1996, attended by over was co-sponsored by FMZ. In May 1996, FMZ co-sponsored a worship service, "A Taste Of Heaven", at the Hylton Chapel consisting of 33 churches who collectively closed their doors at 11:00 a.m. to demonstrate their commitment to the theme of unity and improved race relations. Over 4000 people distinction by attended this service. FMZ has gained the oldest and largest athletic fellowship of sponsoring churches in the county engaged in co-ed volleyball.

Vision 98 was a by-product of FMZ's long-term planning process toward becoming fully devoted followers of Jesus Christ. The Church acquired 11.4 acres of land adjacent to the church to build the current facility. With the completion of the new sanctuary in April 2001 and the Phase II Facility in October 2004, Vision "98" has now become a reality.

FMZ's strategic plan encourages ministry around the world. The Pastoral Vision: First Mount Zion Baptist Church Has a Purpose, a Plan and a Presence to Target Local, Regional and International Communities. The Vision is Sharing the Light From the Promise to the Pentecost to Points Around the World. In support of the Strategic Plan Vision and the Pastoral Vision, the Church has ministered around the world.

DID YOU KNOW THAT SEPTEMBER IS DEAF AWARENESS MONTH?

It started out as the International Day of the Deaf back in 1958 and was championed by the World Federation of the Deaf - the United Nations recognized representative of Deaf people worldwide. It has since been extended to being the Interna-tional Week of the Deaf, and comprises the entirety of the last full week of September, though a quick Google search will show that there is a lot of variation out there. Local, regional and national organizations often having different weeks, days or even the whole month as their period of recognition!

The purpose of Deaf Awareness Month is to increase public awareness of deaf issues, people, and culture. Sign language, subtitled shows, accessibility at events, noiseconsciousness, work safety, Deaf celebrities - there is so much we can share!

Activities and events throughout Deaf Awareness Weeks encourage individuals to come together as a community for both educational events and celebrations.

Some of the messages during Deaf Awareness Week include:

- Celebrate the culture, heritage, and language unique to deaf people of the world.
- Promote the rights of Deaf people throughout the world, including education for Deaf people, access to information and services, the use of sign languages, and human rights for Deaf people in developing countries.
- Recognize achievements of deaf people, including famous deaf individuals.
- Educate about the misconceptions of being deaf and the challenges the deaf population face during everyday life.
- Learn about types, degrees, and causes of hearing loss.
- Be exposed to sign language and other ways deaf and hard of hearing people communicate.



What are the four levels of deafness? The four different levels of hearing loss are defined as: Mild, Moderate, Severe and Profound. These definitions are useful to give a rough guide as to how bad your hearing loss is but it's by no means an exact science -- for example, someone could have a mild hearing loss for low-pitch sounds and a moderate loss for higher pitch sounds (this is actually very common).

- Mild Hearing Loss. Someone with a mild hearing loss will not be able to hear sounds that are quieter than 25 - 45 db. This means they will struggle to hear people whispering, won't hear the clock ticking, leaves rustling or the hum of electrical equipment. Normal everyday conversations may still be OK to hear in quiet environments but people may start to struggle more when there is more than one person talking or where there is background noise.
- Moderate Hearing Loss. Sounds in the range of 40 75 dB are the quietest someone with a moderate loss will be able to hear, this level of hearing loss is going to have a major impact on your ability to hear in day-to-day environments as it is likely you will now struggle to follow conversation, even in quiet environments, you'll probably still pick up some words, or parts of words, but it is going to be hard work.
- Severe Hearing Loss. Things are really going south now, someone with a severe loss will not be able to hear much below the 75 - 90 dB range. This means you won't be able to hear the TV, people talking, the phone ringing or most other everyday sounds. Again, as before, you may have a severe loss for some aspects of your hearing and a moderate or even mild in others.
- Profound Hearing Loss. 90 dB is the lowest sound you will be able to hear now. You would just about be able to hear a chainsaw, lawn mower or loud music.

The lat muscles are the big "wing" muscles of the back. They attach on the inside of the arm bone and go down the length of the back, all the way to the hips, which are a major intersection of muscles and other interconnected tissue. When you sit hunched forward for long periods of time, the lat muscles shorten and become tight. Because it's such a large muscle, this causes quite a few problems with posture, flexibility and overall mobility. This stretch helps return the lat muscle to its proper length, allowing everything else to follow suit.

- Stand upright with the hands clasped behind the head and feet shoulder-width apart.
- Without bending forward, lean to the left side as if your back is up against a wall.
- Look up at your right elbow.
- Due to poor flexibility, many people will bend forward and twist slightly, almost as if doing a standing "crunch" motion. Avoid this by keeping the spine as tall as possible.





Challenge: After a shower, a walk or any exercise try this stretch! Hold the stretch for 15-30 seconds and repeat on the other side. Repeat two times on each side.

GriefShare is a thirteen-week seminar that will commence on Monday 13 September 2021 and proceed through to 13 December 2021. These sessions are available for the benefit of FMZBC members and individuals (non-members) residing in communities surrounding our church. These sessions are offered via Zoom and you must register for GriefShare support group at GriefShare.org and select First Mount Zion Baptist Church as the location. Once you have registered, you will receive information on how to access the Zoom meetings.

The support group provides (1) a safe place for participants to share their feelings and emotions with others who understand what they are going through, and (2) to offer the tools required to help them on their journey to healing from the pain of their loss.

- GriefShare is specifically designed for people who have experienced the loss of a loved one or friend through death. Other losses, such as the loss of a job, divorce, and similar major life events, while significant, are not the focus of Grief Share.
- GriefShare is designed to extend ministry into the long months that follow when people around the griever have returned to their normal, busy lives.

OUR IMPACT

Central Union Mission, founded in 1884, is a faith-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization and is the oldest private social service agency in Washington, DC. In addition to its emergency shelter the Mission is continually developing its programs to meet the changing needs of the community. Its programs serve homeless men, underprivileged women, families living in poverty, children from at-risk neighborhoods, seniors, veterans, the growing Hispanic population in the city, and helping people overcome addictions. The Mission has five locations throughout the Washington, DC, metropolitan area.

One life at a time, the Mission works to help transform the area's toughest rehabilitation cases—including drug addicts, gang members, criminal offenders and the chronically homeless. The Mission's programs have an extremely high success rate of transforming the lives of the people it serves to achieve independent living and to become godly, productive members of society.

Thanks to friends like you, last year Central Union Mission provided:

The Cultural Arts Center at Glen Allen offers residents and visitors in the metropolitan Richmond region an unparalleled opportunity to experience the arts, entertain new ideas, develop a new talent, and experience first-hand, all the best this community has to offer.



Artist, Hamilton Glass' (pictured below) mural project is only one example of how art is used to transform the lives of troubled youth. Mr. Glass was tasked by the Glen Allen Cultural Arts center to create a mural at a juvenile detention center that the youth would design, paint, and see through to the end of the project. He thought this





project would really be great for the youth -- something that would be freeing, push them further and lift their spirits!

He learned that many of them are and want to be creative, and art does not take much effort to get their attention. He stated, "creativity is an unspoken language in which we all appreciate and admire... being creative is innate to being human." He believes this project pushed that creativity out of all the youth, and you can tell by the end result.

"The mural represents the path [or range of emotions] the youth come in with-- regret, loneliness, pain, anger and unwillingness to succeed." "Then, they go through the stages of becoming successful and getting out and being inspired by the staff and others that interact with the program." Mr. Glass praised the staff of the Glen Allen Cultural Arts program for their dedication, appreciation, and year-round efforts to bring these therapeutic art programs to these kids. The Superintendent of the detention center stated, because of this program, many of the youth leave the facility with hope. Some go on to get their GEDs and enroll in college.
