STAFF'S RETURN TO WORK AND NEW OPERATIONAL HOURS

Tuesday and Thursday, 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m.

Staff will be in the office on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Hours of operation are from 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. Outside of onsite office hours, the staff works remotely. The Fitness Center is open to members only on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The Beauty and Barber Shops continue to be open during this time by appointment only. Please note that you will NOT be allowed entrance into the building unless you are in possession of your verification of vaccination (either electronically or actual vaccination card).

CHANGE IN CHECK-IN PROCEDURES (Rev. 9/12/21)

For anyone 12 years and older, proof of being fully vaccinated is required only ONCE. When proof is shown, your name will be entered into a database. At subsequent check-ins you need only to provide your name. Wearing a mask, having temperature taken, and social distancing are still required.

Am I still required to pre-register for Sunday service or to enter the building during the week?

No, providing verification of being fully vaccinated eliminates the need to pre-register.

What forms of proof of vaccination are accepted?

A legible vaccination card showing your name and date(s) of vaccination; a copy of your card; or a picture on your electronic device are acceptable forms of proof.

Are children required to show proof of vaccination?

Children 12 years and older are required to show proof of vaccination. Children under the age of 12 are not.

PLEASE NOTE: If you have a medical reason which precludes you from being vaccinated, YOU MUST provide a letter from your physician to that effect.

Thank you for your cooperation and understanding. It is our desire to keep us all protected!

Lesson/Discussion:

As was stated in the September article, there is much "unknown" "such a time as this," particularly with the new COVID virus variant(s), Afghanistan Evacuation, catastrophic weather, California Fires, etc. etc. etc. !!! It is truly a time to seek God's Face AND petition our Father to "order our steps"!! Well, let's see what more the Bible tells us about God's Wisdom:

Paul's letter to the Ephesians is rich with love and instruction. One of his greatest desires for the church was to pay close attention to their actions so that they would *walk in wisdom*. As followers of Christ, we are called to be disciplined with the words we say, the ways we interact with others, and to make wise use of our time here on earth.

Paul warns us that "the days are evil" and that we must watch our steps closely, because some of those around us are eager to watch us slip. In 2021, we are surrounded by social media feeds of advice and opinions from every angle, telling us how we should live our lives. But Paul warns us to be watchful of every influence and to pay careful attention to how we are living our lives on a daily basis.

"See then that you walk circumspectly, not as fools but as wise, Therefore do not be unwise, but understand what the Will of the Lord is." *Ephesians 5:15, 17 NKJV*





The Bible speaks about generosity in many ways. For example, Isaiah 32:8 says, "But a generous man devises generous things, and by generosity he shall stand". Another example from Proverbs 11:25 says, "The generous soul will be made rich, And he who waters will also be watered himself".

William Neal Patterson served his country as a member of the United States Army during the War on Terror. In addition to documenting his service, Neal speaks of his recollec-


tions of the morning of September 11, 2001.

the rank of Master Gunnery Sergeant. John's bunk mate was killed during the war and he says that he thinks about his time in combat everyday. John says, you go to combat, and "you never come back the same."





FTTNESS-IN-PLACE STANDING QUAD STRETCH

When you sit for long periods of time, the hip flexor muscles become weak and short. When these muscle get weak and short due to inactivity, the hips can't move the way they are supposed to. The lumbar spine picks up the slack and is forced to bend and stay frozen in positions that cause problems with the connective tissue between the vertebrae. Stretching these muscle helps return it to its natural length and function so it can do what it is supposed to do.

- Stand upright and bring the heel of the foot toward the glute (if necessary, grab a desk or other stationary object for support).
- □ Using the hand, grasp the top of the foot near the ankle (if unable to grab the foot, use a towel or band to wrap around the foot).
- □ Squeezing the glute muscle, stand as upright as possible while bringing the knee in line with the other knee.
- □ Slightly push the hips forward while bringing the heel toward the glute.
- □ Maintain flexion of the glute muscle and tension of the hips pushing forward to prevent the lower back "bowing."
- □ Hold the stretch for 15-30 seconds and then switch sides (repeat twice on each leg).





Challenge: After a shower, a walk or any exercise, try this stretch! Hold the stretch for 15-30 seconds and repeat on the other side. Repeat two times on each side.

PLANNING TO WORKOUT SOMEDAY? THERE ARE SEVEN DAYS A WEEK, SOMEDAY IS NOT ONE OF THEM! **Dr. Levi Watkins Jr. was a cardiac surgeon** who, in 1980, performed the first implantation of an automatic defibrillator into a human heart. He was also a Professor of Cardiac Surgery and Associate Dean at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine in Baltimore, Maryland.

Watkins was born in Parsons, Kansas, but grew up in Montgomery, Alabama. He attended the First

Baptist Church, and became close friends with the Pastor, Dr. Ralph David Abernathy. He later attended the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church, where he met Dr. Martin Luther King, who had recently begun preaching there. Inspired by King, and dismayed at the prejudices of Jim Crow Alabama, Watkins became involved in the Civil Rights movement. He joined the King-supervised Crusaders youth group and drove parishioners to the church in a station wagon so they could boycott the city's segregated bus system in 1956.

POSITIVES FROM THE

Watkins entered Tennessee State University in 1962. He eventually became President of the Student Body, majored in biology, and graduated with honors in 1966. That May, he became the first African American admitted to the Vanderbilt School of Medicine in Nashville. Studying at Vanderbilt was a lonely, isolating experience, and when King was murdered in 1968, Watkins was still the only black student at the school. Despite the prejudice he encountered there, In 1970 he became the first African American to graduate from Vanderbilt.

Later that year Watkins moved to Baltimore, where he became the first black intern at Johns Hopkins University Medical School. Between 1973 and 1975, he studied at Harvard Medical School's Department of Physiology, performing breakthrough research into the role of the renin angiotensin system in congestive heart failure. When he returned to Johns Hopkins in 1975, he became the first black Chief Resident in Heart Surgery at the University.

Watkins performed the first implantation of an automatic defibrillator in February 1980. Joining a team working on the device that included Michel Mirowksi, Morton Mower, and William Staewen, and assisted by Dr. Vincent Gott, the Chief of Cardiac Surgery, Watkins performed the operation on a 57-year-old woman from California at Johns Hopkins Hospital. The defibrillator is a small, batterypowered device that detects arrhythmia in the heart and emits an electric shock to correct it. Since that operation, it has saved more than one million lives.

Watkins had also been selected to join the Medical School's Admissions Committee, where he focused on correcting racial inequality in the student body. He was so successful that by 1983, black students in the Hopkins Medical School had increased fivefold to 40 compared to the eight students there in 1978.

Watkins was promoted to full Professor of Cardiac Surgery in 1990. He was awarded a medal of honor as an outstanding alumnus by the Vanderbilt school, and has been given honorary doctorates by Sojourner–Douglass College, Meharry Medical College, Spelman College, and Morgan State University. In April 2010, he was awarded the Thurgood Marshall College Fund award for excellence in medicine.

Dr. Levi Watkins Jr., a member of Sigma Pi Phi and Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternities, died in Baltimore, Maryland on April 18, 2015. He was 70.
