TIDBITS OF IMPORTANT EVENTS WHICH TRANSPIRED DURING THE MONTH OF MARCH

March 3, 1913 - A women's suffrage march in Washington D.C. was attacked by angry onlookers while police stood by. The march occurred the day before Woodrow Wilson's inauguration. Many of the 5,000 women participating were spat upon and struck in the face as a near riot ensued. Secretary of War Henry Stimson then ordered soldiers from Fort Myer to restore order.

March 22, 1972 - The Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was passed by the U.S. Senate and then sent to the states for ratification. The ERA, as it became known, prohibited discrimination on the basis of gender, stating, "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex," and that "the Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article." Although 22 of the required 38 states quickly ratified the Amendment, opposition arose over concerns that women would be subject to the draft and combat duty, along with other legal concerns. The ERA eventually failed (by 3 states) to achieve ratification despite an extension of the deadline to June 1982.



FMZBC YOUTH INSTRUMENTAL IN SCPS POLICY CHANGE



This month's **YOUTH ON BLAST** is **Ms. Zamari Holley**, a senior at Stafford High School in Fredericksburg, VA.

After working on her high school publication, *The Smoke Signal*, since sophomore year, Zamari was selected by a panel of Stafford County Public School (SCPS) staff to be Editor-in-Chief of the publication for the 2021-22 school year. This selection makes Zamari the first known African-American Editor-in-Chief in this publication's history. Mr. Denlinger, the Journalism teacher and publication



advisor said, "in almost 20 years of advising student publications, [Zamari] easily lands among the top five journalists I've mentored."



In addition to this historic position, Zamari was also selected to be the County's student representative on the "District Publication Committee responsible for revising policy that guides our district's student publications," said Mr. Denlinger. "Her work won rave reviews by the adults involved. They showed their respect by choosing her to present the final Publication Policy to the School Board," he concluded. After presenting before the School Board three consecutive months, on December 14, 2021, the Board voted unanimously to approve the policy revision. The Chair of the Board commented that it was one of the best written policy revisions they had ever received and that the student's parents should be proud. Indeed, they are!

Zamari graduates in May and plans to attend college this Fall, preferably an HBCU, and study Journalism.

WOMEN'S MINISTRY FELLOWSHIP

The Women's Ministry was blessed by all the beautiful women who adorned themselves in red or African attire to celebrate our theme, "Reflecting on God's Love," and

to pay tribute to our ancestors during this month of Black History. We pray that all were touched by the Spirit of God through our anointed speakers, the Rev. Beverly Waddell-Jiggetts and Rev. Sharon Wallace, both FMZ Associate Ministers.

Reverend Waddell-Jiggetts' sermonette, "Casting All Your Cares Upon Him," was taken from 1 Peter 5:6-7. Using a fishing analogy, she reminded us that casting is "purposeful throwing." In fishing, one must cast the line a good distance away from oneself. She profoundly proclaimed that once the line is cast, then our job is done; we must now rely on the line and the bait to do its part. This is the same with God. We must cast our cares away from us and then rely on God to do His part. Rev. Waddell-Jiggets' sermon reminded us that our Father welcomes us to come before His throne for whatever we need. He tells us to cast our cares upon Him, whether we use a fishing line or net, and He will take care of us. Be anxious for nothing; be still and know that He is God and that we are loved by Him.

Reverend Wallace's sermonette challenged us to truly reflect on God's love, as recorded in 1 Corinthians 13: 4-7. She reminded us that "love is an emotion with vastly different degrees of intensity," and that true love should be shown toward others, just as God shows His love towards us. Some questions we should ask ourselves are: Is our love in vain? Does our love achieve unity? Does our love build up or tear down? And, does our love create kindness? She challenged us to not just say we love God or each other, but to "be about it!" We have to walk in love; be about love; live, show, share, and spread love! As sisters in Christ, we must be intentional in sharing love, lifting one another up, encouraging one another, and being there for one another. For this is the love that the Lord desires us to have between us.

A warm thank you to Deaconess Boone for her sharing moment. She asked us to use our imagination to do the things God has called us to do. She reminded us that if it can be imagined, then it can be done! An additional warm "Thank You" to Reverend Tarra Taylor for gracing us with her lovely song of "Oh How God Loves Us." We pray it resonated with each lady throughout the day and week.

Truly hearts and spirits were touched during the fellowship. The Holy Spirit was so evident that Dr. Holley recommended a moment of pause to allow the Holy Spirit to take control and to minister to our souls. such as these: "Thank you Reverend Wallace and Reverend Jiggetts for the powerful words you delivered today and allowing God to use you in spirit." "Praise the Lord!" "Thank you Reverend Jiggetts and Reverend Wallace for sharing your hearts through the Word of God and the reminder to cast away and be intentional in our love for God and others." "To God be the Glory!" "Thank you!"

In commemoration of Black/Women's History Months, we are profiling the consummate woman of Faith, Educator, Statesperson & Civil Rights Activist, Mary McLeod Bethune. Who would have imagined that a young Black girl, born in 1875, who did not learn how to read until she was eleven years old, would become a college professor and eventually a college president? Ms. Mary McLeod Bethune was that young girl, and she imagined what would have seemed impossible for Black people at that time in the United States, but she believed that, with God, she could achieve the impossible. In fact, she once said, "Faith is the first factor in a life devoted to service. Without it, nothing is possible. With it, nothing is impossible." In the years following the Emancipation Proclamation, most African Americans did not have great access to the American Dream, and, in fact, for many their faith in God became the foundation for a lifelong journey toward spiritual wholeness and economic, educational, and social access, as Ms. Bethune demonstrates in a life of Christian service by caring for the most vulnerable in American society. Mary earned a scholarship to attend a boarding school, Scotia Seminary for Negro Girls in North Carolina (Now Barber-Scotia College, the first historically Black female institution of higher education). At the school, she learned the "HHH" approach; "Head": Study to build your intellect," "Heart": Grow your spiritual life with God; and "Hand": Acquire practical survival skills so that you can maintain your independence." Mrs. Mary McLeod Bethune's life is a *testament of service*, revealing the obedience of one little Black girl, born ten years after the Emancipation Proclamation, who believed the impossible and attained it with God's help (See link below for the full life's story of Sister Mary McLeod Bethune.) ACADEMIC EDUCATION MINISTRY (AEM)

Each year, FMZBC awards scholarships to members who are graduating High School seniors and plan to further their education at institutions of higher learning (university, college, community college, technical, etc.). The student must meet the following requirements in order to qualify for the FMZBC scholarship:

- been a member of FMZBC for at least one year prior to the deadline of April 15, 2022;
- been accepted by an institution of higher learning;
- and meet other requirements contained in the Scholarship Booklet.

The scholarship requirements have been changed from previous years to accommodate students who were unable to participate in a Church ministry due to COVID-19 restrictions and FMZBC closure during those restrictions. The major change is students who were unable to participate in a Church ministry can apply for, and receive, a scholarship. There will be three types of scholarships rather than two, and the type of scholarship awarded depends on whether or not the student participated in a Church ministry. Other changes include elimination of the points system and the optional community service. Also, students are not required to get in-person signatures or documents, but may get email verification and/or electronic signatures as required. These changes apply to 2022 graduating seniors only. Students can pick up a paper copy of the Scholarship Booklet at the Church or get a copy online at the Church's website:

Once on the website, you will see right and left arrows (< >); click on the arrows until you see the FMZBC Scholarship. Download and complete the scholarship application and follow the directions for forwarding the application to the Church. Students are required to complete the Student Checklist section on page 10 of the Scholarship Booklet prior to submitting it. Remember, the deadline for submitting the Scholarship Booklet, with attachments, by mailing, hand-carrying or emailing, is April 15, 2022. The Church Receptionist will date-stamp each Scholarship Booklet received by mail or hand-carried to the Church. The date on the emailed Scholarship Booklets must be no later than April 15, 2022, and sent to:

Recently, I visited my father in North Carolina. Every Monday he goes to the same local church where he picks up a box of meals for the week distributed through the "Meals on Wheels" program. The "pick up" time starts at 10 am. On the Monday I was there, we had financial business that took much longer than expected. I did not get to the church for "meal pick up" until almost 12:30. I had never done the pickup before. I went to the door marked "entrance" in hopes of getting assistance.

I rang the doorbell and told the woman who answered why I was there. She asked me to wait while she inquired of someone else. She did not invite me in. A second woman came to the door and said the meals were distributed in the morning and distributors were already gone. In a sarcastic tone, she added "and It's 12: 30." In the same tone, she repeated the meal distribution was at 10 am and that's when we needed to be there.

As I walked away, the first thing I thought was "WOW." Then I thought, they didn't know anything about me or what I might have gone through, or was going through. If I were truly in need or looking for a church home, after that encounter I would not have gone back. God, as He always does reminded me before I became too self-righteous, that I do not always represent Him in the loving way He would like. I am not always sensitive to the needs or situations of others. And yet, He still continues to give me opportunity to be a better reflection of Him. Our words and actions should welcome, not repel. Heal, not hurt. Uplift, not discourage.

So, to slightly change the lyrics of the popular gospel song, "I Won't Complain:" May all of our good days (representing Christ), outweigh our bad days. We won't "defame" Him by our negative attitudes, words or actions.

Join the Deaf Ministry in celebrating Deaf History Month which runs from March 13th thru April 15th. The National Association of the Deaf (NAD) introduced Deaf History Month in 1997. You may be wondering why these dates were chosen since they begin and end in the middle of these

months. They point to three important dates in the history of deaf education. Those dates are April 15, 1817, when the first public school for the deaf was opened in America, April 8, 1864, when Gallaudet University, the only school of higher education for the deaf, was founded, and March 13 1988, when Gallaudet University hired their first Deaf President.

We can add 2 more recent historic items to the history of Deaf communication. NAD continues to fight for increased communication for those who are deaf or hard of hearing (HOH) by filing a lawsuit over the Trump White House's failure to provide American Sign Language (ASL) interpreters during emergency press briefings related to the COVID-19 pandemic. A landmark court ruling in September 2020 ordered the White House to provide interpreters for all such briefings. As a result of a settlement, in November 2020, a White House press briefing was broadcast live with an ASL interpreter for the first time in history. The Biden-Harris Administration is to be commended for setting a new bar for full communication access for all deaf and hard of hearing people in the country," said Howard A. Rosenblum, Chief Executive Officer of NAD by expanding this access to all press briefings.

How often do you read your Bible? Have you thought about the fact that the deaf do not have a Bible written in their language. American Sign Language (ASL) is not a written language but a visual one. The translation of the Bible into ASL was begun in 1970 and finally completed in the fall of 2020. It is important now for deaf ministries across America to help provide those who are deaf with this new translation so they can better see and understand God's word.




