




# KE FOREST



She also served as the EEO Director and subsequently the Deputy Director for the Office of Minority and Women Inclusion at the National Credit Union Administration (NCUA) and Deputy Assistant Director in the Office of Equal Employment Opportunity at the Department of Defense, Washington Headquarters Services. She joined GPO in May 2019.

Hendricks is a certified EEO Counselor and mediator. She graduated from Columbia College of Missouri, where she earned a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration and is currently working to complete a Master's of Science in Administration with a concentration in Leadership.

# YOU WERE MADE TO SPARKLE; YOU ARE GOD'S MASTERPIECE



We had a blessed time during our Women's Ministry May 14 fellowship. Led by the Women's Ministry Director, Sister Gwen Holland, the fellowship's theme was "You Were Made to Sparkle; YOU Are God's Masterpiece," taken from Proverbs 31:25-26, Zachariah 9:16, and Ephesians 2:10. How befitting for the month of May to have a mother-daughter preaching duo

in the persons of Reverend Carolyn Taylor and Reverend Kara Franklin-Taylor deliver exceptional sermons, which reminded us of our strength as women, why God created us, our contributions to the world, and why we sparkle.

Reverend Carolyn Taylor spoke from Psalm 31, explaining what it means for women to be "clothed with strength and dignity." In this familiarly known 'virtuous woman' passage, Rev. Carolyn Taylor reiterated the value that the woman has in the life of her husband, children, and community. Additionally, she shared how women play multiple roles in life; possess many skills and talents; and serve as an example to all. Reverend Carolyn Taylor then profoundly shared how the Father could have created a woman the same as He did man, but instead He choose to take a rib from the man. She added that the rib is a strong substance, whose purpose is to protect vital organs and to support the upper extremities. The rib is a symbol of strength. Therefore, women are symbols of strength, created to be equal to man and not secondary. Women should embrace who they are and shine the way God has created them to shine.

Reverend Kara Franklin-Taylor spoke from Ephesians 2:10, using the analogy of jewels in a crown to explain the many facets of a women's being. She reminded the women that they are made to sparkle because they have been made in God's image. Rev. Kara Franklin-Taylor said "women are uniquely different jewels, some are diamonds, be it blue, yellow, or white; some are like Jubilee Rubies with a pure, vibrant red. Some of us are like bluish-green emeralds, full of tone and saturation. Regardless of what kind of gem you are, make sure you shine and sparkle, as you are meant to bring change into the world." Rev. Kara Franklin-Taylor also profoundly shared that unlike plants and animals, we were created by God breathing the breath of life into us. We are God's workmanship, made in the very image of God. She added that we are a costly masterpiece, bought with a price, which is the blood of Jesus. She reminded the women that "our sparkle matters and our sparkle is meant to be on display, so Shine Bright – Masterpieces of God!"

We were graced with Words of Encouragement by Deaconesselect Demetria Cobb, and Words of Inspiration by Deaconess Andrea Bailey. They reminded us that in times like these we need an anchor, a Rock! We were made to be used by God and through our faith and belief in Jesus Christ, we are strengthened to shine.

Our very own Director, Sister Gwen Holland, blessed us with 7 truths about a Masterpiece:

Takes a long time to create

Very detailed and intricate, meaning the conditions must be just right

One of a kind, no two jewels are the same

A culmination of an artist

Precious

Artist creates the masterpiece, we become more like the artist (God)

Points to the artist talents

Thank you to Sister Stacey Griggs and Sister Breh Stephens-Mitchell for gracing us with two powerful songs, Alabaster Box and Open my Heart, respectively; to Sister Veronica Hackett for opening in prayer; to Sister Oonagh Bell and Sister Annette Rivers for Scripture reading; to our media ladies, Sister Cynthia Wilson and Sister Michelle Washington-Barnes; and to every woman who attended and praised the Lord with us, without each of you the program would not have sparkled! Remember, You are God's Masterpiece. Shine and Sparkle!

Greetings FMZ Family!!" Please see the FMZ Leadership First Friday Prayer and Fasting Devotional from May 2022. As we have entered the new year, we are committed to "Anchor our Souls!"

Prayer and Fasting Topic: Anchoring our Souls Sub-Topic: Corporate Prayer: What is it??

**Source:** Bible YouVersion Devotional: *Moorings - Anchor for the Soul /Soul Keeping -* John Ortberg

**Discussion:** We all should agree on the importance of prayer in our lives AND that consistency in prayer will unequivocally help "anchor our souls." To that end, let us explore a type of prayer called "corporate prayer".

Lesson: So, what is Corporate Prayer?????

Corporate prayer is the term used to describe *praying together* with other people - in small groups or larger gatherings of people.

Corporate prayer is an important part of the life of the church, we read in Acts 2:42 that the early church gathered to pray together: "42. They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer." (Now we are trying to pray and NOT "break bread!"). When we pray together with other believers, the effects can be incredibly positive. Corporate prayer edifies and unifies us as we share our common Faith. The same Holy Spirit Who dwells within each Believer causes our hearts to rejoice as we offer up praises to our Lord and Savior, knitting us together in a unique bond of fellowship found nowhere else in life."

There are numerous positive outcomes of God's people unifying in prayer as follows:

- ♦ Encouragement Praying corporately with others can bring encouragement to the members of the group. There may be people in the group who are struggling with trials. As they are upheld in prayer, the Holy Spirit brings them encouragement and reassurance.
- Unity Corporate prayer has the ability to connect people together, "a unity of purpose." People are built up and unified in the faith that they share together. As people pray together, they build a love and concern for others and the mission of God.

- **Worship** Corporate prayer brings about intimate communion with Jesus. The body of believers, praying in unity is an act of worship.
- Dependence on God As we cry out to God in prayer it demonstrates our reliance on God to do the work of God.

In closing, it has been said, "The one concern of the devil is to keep saints from prayer. He fears nothing from prayerless studies, prayerless work, prayerless religion. He laughs at our toil, mocks at our wisdom, but trembles when we pray."



# HEAR THE RIFFING ON PSALM 1

I want to recommend the reading of Psalm 1 as a riff for all the other psalms. Psalm 1 is the preamble to the Psalter, the Book of Psalms. As such it provides an orientation to the purpose of worship and declares that the worshiper is happy, will be prosperous, have community, and a future. This perspective on worship is repeatedly heard in the psalms of praise, laments, and thanksgiving. When the psalmist offers praise, it is because of the congruence between life and the promises of Psalm 1. When the psalmist offers a lament, or complaint, as worship; it is because the realities of life are not aligned with the hope that faith in God would have us live in expectation of. For example, when one reads in Psalm 5 wherein the Psalmist declares that daily she comes before God, you should hear the notes of Psalm 1 of meditating day and night on the law. It is only because of that constant and habitual mediation, that the Psalmist has hope in an implicitly distressful time of life. As one reads in Psalm 5 the petition of the Psalmist that God would make God's way straight before him, you can hear the declaration from Psalm 1 that God knows the way of the righteous ones. The expectations of the supplicant in Psalm 5 is shaped by the predications of Psalm 1. This is not limited to the psalms of praise, lament, or thanksgiving. For example, Psalm 133, a psalm of ascent, declares that in community is the blessings that God intends, community that Psalm 1 declares is not available to those who are disobedient. Psalm 19 is a wisdom psalm and functions as an explication of Psalm 1 neither a meditation on nature nor observation of the sun, moon, and stars will reveal the will of God, but the mediation on God's word keeps us from making grave mistakes, so that whatever we do will prosper.

I want to encourage a daily reading of the psalms and in that reading, see how reflecting on Psalm 1 deepens the meaning and understanding of the psalm you are reading.

Lord, we come before You, seeking Your wisdom and direction for our life, family, church, nation and this world. We trust in You Lord and not our own understanding. # SERVE DAYS June 5th and 11<sup>th</sup>

Women Giving Back supports women and children in crisis on a first step to stability by providing quality clothing FREE of charge assisted by a caring and committed community.

**Saturday, May 14**<sup>th</sup>, our Small Group servants above, along with other volunteers sorted and properly hung donated clothing by categories and size in preparation for the items to go inside the Women Giving Back Boutique Store so we could assist the women clients shop for **FREE clothing** (50 items - 4 times a year) and **FREE Diapers (100 monthly)** for their children.

- ⇒ Clients that shop receive a generous amount of clothing 50 pieces of clothing in addition to 5 pairs of shoes for them, 2 pairs of shoes for their children, 1 coat for themselves and each of their children, 2-5 bras, 2 purses, menstrual supplies, and snack packs, per visit.
- Clients who are pregnant receive another 50 pieces of infant clothing to prepare for their growing baby.

There are many different agencies that come across women and children in need. Women Giving Back rely on their referring partner agencies and their staff to determine the client's eligibility.

# GLORIA JANE HARVEY FOUNDATION CORPORATION

One of the organizations supported this year by the First Mount Zion Baptist Church was The Gloria Jane Harvey Foundation Corporation ("Foundation"), a 501 (c)(3) non-profit organization, which was established in April 2018 by one of our faithful members, Sister Winiford Harvey. The main focus of this Foundation is to educate, elevate, enrich, and encourage our most valuable resources--our youths, by giving to economically challenged youths in her hometown of Alexandria, Louisiana, and surrounding cities, through educational and recreational field trip opportunities. The Foundation allows economically disadvantaged youths an opportunity to travel outside of their local communities, for the very first time, to colleges and universities, historical landmarks, recreational parks, museums, military bases, and other educational sites, as well as special events. These educational trips, which are free of charge to youths and parents, serve to increase their knowledge and awareness, enhance their educational experience, augment their education, expose them to significant places beyond their local neighborhoods and, more importantly, broaden their perspectives on life in general.

Sister Winiford has been an active member of First Mount Zion Baptist Church since 2004. She serves as the Vice Chair of the Pastor's Aide Ministry and is a hardworking member of Zone M3. Her commitment to service within the congregation is matched by her commitment to ministry outside the walls through the Foundation. A native of Alexandria, Louisiana, Sis. Harvey is the President/Founder of the Foundation. She is a retired Lieutenant Colonel from the United States Air Force (USAF); a graduate of Grambling State University, and currently serves in the Federal Government in the Northern Virginia area as a Government Civilian Employee.

In April 2022, the Foundation sponsored an educational/recreational field trip for two deserving high school students who were selected to participate in the program: Darrius Davidson, graduating senior in May 2022 from Peabody High School in Alexandria, LA and De'Shaun Veal, freshman from Bolton High School in Alexandria, LA. This experience took them to Prairie View A&M University and historical sites in both Houston and San Antonio, Texas. It was a very exciting and informative field trip for the students, affording them the opportunity to visit other college campuses and interact with university academic, student, military personnel. They also interacted with business leaders, one of whom was Turner Construction which is building a 192unit apartment complex in San Antonio, TX. This exposure will go a long way towards educating, empowering, and encouraging them to strive to be all that they can be.

While touring Prairie View A&M University campus, the students were oriented to the various areas of studies at the university. Darrius is interested in studying Software Engineering and De'Shaun is interested in studying Electrical Engineering. They met directly with the head of the Computer Science Department, learned about Computer Science, Computer Engineering Programs and Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) partnerships and intern programs in STEM career fields with leading edge technology companies, i.e., Apple, Google, Microsoft, Amazon, etc.

The group traveled from Houston to San Antonio, and the students were treated to dinner at a restaurant on the Riverwalk. The next day they were invited to tour Turner Construction site and were delighted to meet with electrical engineers and other staff on the job. They later attended a Basic Military Training Graduation Ceremony at Lackland Air Force Base and interacted with the drill sergeants and were able to ask questions about the military and its operations. They also toured the University of Texas at San Antonio and met one-on-one with a Chemical Engineering student, who is a member of the National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE). We were also able to incorporate other historical sites like the Alamo, the Wax Museum, just to name a few.

# FITNESS-IN-PLACE

# STRETCH FOR SUCCESS:

Some people are naturally more flexible. Flexibility is primarily due to one's genetics, gender, age, body shape and level of physical activity. As people grow older, they tend to lose flexibility, usually because of inactivity, but partially because of the aging process itself. However, the good news, the more active you are, the more flexible you are likely to be. Flexibility will improve with regular training!

### Benefits of flexibility training include:

- Allows greater freedom of movement and improved posture
- Increases physical and mental relaxation
- Releases muscle tension and soreness
- Reduces the risk of injury

Before stretching, take a few minutes to warm up, as stretching cold muscles may increase your chances for injury. Begin with a simple, low-intensity warm-up, such as easy walking while swinging the arms. Spend at least five minutes warming up prior to stretching.

# When performing a stretch:

- Take a deep breath and slowly exhale as you gently stretch the muscle to a point of tension
- Hold the stretch for 15 to 30 seconds, relax and then repeat the stretch two to four more times
- Avoid these stretching mistakes:
  - Don't bounce a stretch. Holding a stretch is more effective and there is less risk of injury.
  - o Don't stretch a muscle that is not warmed up.
  - Don't strain or push a muscle too far. If a stretch hurts, ease up.
  - o Don't hold your breath during the stretch. Continue to breathe normally.

# Fit stretching in:

If you don't have time to sufficiently warm-up before stretching, try doing a few stretches during or immediately after a shower. The hot water elevates body and muscle temperature enough to make them more receptive to stretching.
