DAVID'S CONFIDENCE IN GOD

In Youth Ministry Bible study, we have been studying "teenagers" in the Bible who exhibited their faith in various situations. One teen we studied was David, while reviewing the familiar story of "David and Goliath" in 1 Samuel chapter 17.

David was the youngest son of Jesse and the family shepherd. His duties included protecting the flock from various predators. His father sent him to the Israeli/Philistine battle to take his brothers food and see how they were doing. While there, David became angry after hearing the Philistine Goliath taunt the Israelites and God. He began to consider fighting Goliath himself. Upon learning of David's interest, his oldest brother, Eliab, becomes angry with David and accuses him of being conceited and having an "evil" heart (vs 28).

King Saul also learns of David's intentions and has David brought to him so he can meet him. He is initially skeptical of David's ability to fight and defeat Goliath but once David explains his experience as a shepherd and his strong faith in God, King Saul supports him in fighting Goliath. David subsequently kills Goliath with his shepherd's slingshot and one smooth stone.

From this story and David's actions, we learn several valuable lessons:

- Because David took his duties as a shepherd seriously and had been in situations
 where he had to defend himself and the sheep, he was "prepared" to fight Goliath.
- Because he was an obedient son, by taking food to his brother in battle, he ended up being in the right "place" at the right "time" to fight Goliath.
- As was the case with Eliab, sometimes, even people who are close to us can misunderstand our "faith-led" motivation.
- David understood it was not his skill alone that had protected him as a shepherd, but rather God's faithful protection.
- David understood the importance of giving God credit for victory over the "Goliaths" in our lives.

big updates. This includes a new and improved FAFSA experience for students and families.



- Start searching for scholarships and apply to all that you are eligible for.
- Continue to visit schools on your list.
- ◆ Finalize your list to include reach, target and safety schools. (4-8 colleges)
- Determine application deadlines and decide if you will be applying early action/decision or regular.
- Ask for teacher recommendations in person and formally request through Naviance (at least 2-3 weeks PRIOR to the deadline).
- Take the SAT and/or ACT, and request that your scores be sent to schools on your list.
- Complete and submit your applications prior to the dead line.
- Fill out the FAFSA. New and updated FAFSA available in December. Be sure to check your schools priority filing deadline.

Request transcripts through Naviance for the schools that you applied to (at least 2-3 weeks PRIOR to the deadline).

Marc Morial himself shared, "As Mayor of New Orleans, we built a strong Black, White, Hispanic, and Asian community that I call the Gumbo Coalition." This documentary also features pivotal historical moments and societal issues, including the Black Lives Matter movement, the rise of anti-immigration policies, the tragic death of George Floyd, criminal justice reform, and the ongoing struggle for voting rights, among others. Morial aptly reminds us, "This is a moment not of politics, this is a moment of morality."

We extend our heartfelt thanks to Lena and Carter for their active engagement and for sharing this inspirational and educational moment with our congregation. Carter's journey and his involvement in such significant events serve as a source of inspiration for us all. In Zone M2, we celebrate the bright future ahead of young leaders like Carter B. Hall.

TIME MANAGEMENT

Time management is a process of organizing and planning how to divide your time between specific activities. The demands of daily life pull us in all different directions, requiring time and energy that we don't always have. According to a National Institute of Health (NIH) clinical research report on Time Management, failing to manage your time damages your effectiveness and causes stress.

Time management skills can reduce the mental burden of juggling tasks, and increase the likelihood that everything gets done. You gain more time through organization, you're motivated to complete tasks, it reduces avoidance of work to be done, and reduces anxiety.

Time Management Tips

Use a to-do list or an appointment book. Writing down your responsibilities will ensure you don't forget anything and reduces stress by allowing you to drop your mental checklist.

Prioritize your tasks. Focus on completing the most important, and quickest tasks, first. If you have a few "to-dos" that will take five minutes, knock them out quickly for the peace of mind.

Break large tasks into smaller pieces. It's easy to feel overwhelmed when you have a really big task before you.

Breaking big tasks into small pieces will help you get started, which is often the hardest part. For example, writing a paper can be reduced to pieces such as doing research, preparing an outline, and writing an introductory paragraph.

Limit distractions. Spend a few days recording how much time you spend on distractions such as social media or TV. Then cut out the distractions you don't actually enjoy, and schedule time for the ones you do enjoy. Always set an alarm so you know when to get back to work. If you can't limit distractions, get away from them. Get away from distractions that you know you will succumb to.

Create clear boundaries between work and play by putting up "Do not disturb" sign on your door, turning off your phone, or going to the public library. Everyone is different in this regard—make the changes you need to focus.

Give yourself time between tasks. Plan on arriving to appointments 15 minutes early and bring something to do in case you find yourself waiting. Scheduling some buffer time will help to reduce your stress when things inevitably run long.

Do not be a perfectionist. If you try to complete everything to perfection, some of your other responsibilities won't get done at all. Focus on completing everything to an acceptable level, and then go back to improve upon your work if you have time.

Keep in mind, that it will take time to develop and implement time management skills. So don't get distracted. Remember time management skills can reduce the mental burden of juggling tasks and reduce the levels of stress and anxiety.





was read by Sis. Marcia McCain from Deuteronomy 28:1-12.





Who was Garrett Morgan???

He was an African American inventor with his patents, including those for a hair-straightening product, a breathing device, a revamped sewing machine and an improved traffic signal.

With only an elementary school education, Garrett Morgan began his career as a sewing-machine mechanic. He went on to patent several inventions, including an improved sewing machine and traffic signal, a hair-straightening product, and a respiratory device that would later provide the blueprint for WWI gas masks.

Born in Paris, Kentucky, on March 4, 1877, Garrett Morgan was the seventh of 11 children. His mother, Elizabeth Reed, was of Indian and African descent, and the daughter of a Baptist minister. His father, Sydney, a formerly enslaved person freed in 1863, was the son of John Hunt Morgan, a Confederate colonel. Morgan's mixed-race heritage would play a part in his business dealings as an adult.

When Morgan was in his mid-teens, he moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, to look for work, and found it as a handyman to a wealthy landowner. Although he only completed an elementary school education, Morgan was able to pay for more lessons from a private tutor. But jobs at several sewing-machine factories were to soon capture his imagination and determine his future. Learning the inner workings of the machines and how to fix them, Morgan obtained a patent for an improved sewing machine and opened his own repair business.

In 1914, Morgan patented a breathing device, or "safety hood," providing its wearers with a safer breathing experience in the presence of smoke, gases and other pollutants. Morgan worked hard to market the device, especially to fire departments, often personally demonstrating its reliability in fires. Morgan's breathing device became the prototype and precursor for the gas masks used during World War I, protecting soldiers from toxic gas used in warfare. The invention earned him the first prize at the Second International Exposition of Safety and Sanitation in New York City.

In 1916, the city of Cleveland was drilling a new tunnel under Lake Erie for a fresh water supply. Workers hit a pocket of natural gas, which resulted in a huge explosion and trapped workers underground amidst suffocating noxious fumes and dust. When Morgan heard about the explosion, he and his brother put on breathing devices, made their way to the tunnel and entered as quickly as possible. The brothers managed to save two lives and recover four bodies before the rescue effort was shut down. Despite his heroic efforts, the publicity that Morgan garnered from the incident hurt sales; the public was now fully aware that Morgan was an African American, and many refused to purchase his products. Adding to the detriment, neither the inventor nor his brother were fully recognized for their heroic efforts at Lake Erie — possibly another effect of racial discrimination. Morgan was nominated for a Carnegie Medal for his efforts, but ultimately wasn't chosen to receive the award. Additionally, some reports of the explosion named others as the rescuers.

While the public's lack of acknowledgment for Morgan's and his brother's roles at the Cleveland explosion was undoubtedly disheartening, Morgan was a voracious inventor and observer who focused on fixing problems and soon turned his attention to all kinds of things, from hats to belt fasteners to car parts.

The first Black man in Cleveland to own a car, Morgan worked on his mechanical skills and developed a friction drive clutch. Then, in 1923, he created a new kind of traffic signal, one with a warning light to alert drivers that they would need to stop, after witnessing a carriage accident at a particularly problematic intersection in the city. Morgan quickly acquired patents for his traffic signal—a rudimentary version of the modern three-way traffic light—in the United States, Britain and Canada, but eventually sold the rights to General Electric for \$40,000.

Outside of his inventing career, Morgan diligently supported the African American community throughout his lifetime. He was a member of the newly formed National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, was active in the Cleveland Association of Colored Men, donated to Negro colleges and opened an all-Black country club. Additionally, in 1920, he launched the African American newspaper the Cleveland Call (later named the Call and Post).

Morgan began developing glaucoma in 1943 and lost most of his sight as a result. The accomplished inventor died in Cleveland, Ohio, on July 27, 1963, shortly before the celebration of the Emancipation Proclamation centennial, an event he had been awaiting. Just before his death, Morgan was honored by the U.S. government for his traffic signal invention, and he was eventually restored to his place in history as a hero of the Lake Erie rescue.

Morgan improved and saved countless lives worldwide, including those of firefighters, soldiers and vehicle operators, with his profound inventions. His work provided the blueprint for many important advancements that came later and continues to inspire and serve as a basis for research conducted by modern-day inventors and engineers.

Dr. Velma Scantlebury-White

is a Barbadian-born American transplant surgeon. She was the first Black woman transplant surgeon of the United States.

Dr. Scantlebury earned her medical degree from Columbia University in New York City. She was an intern and resi-

dent in general surgery at Harlem Hospital Center in New York City. She completed her fellowship training in transplantation surgery at the University of Pittsburgh and then joined the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine as an assistant professor of surgery in 1989.

Between 1988 and 2002, she worked as a transplant surgeon at the Pitt School of Medicine, earning her Doctor of Surgery in 1989, as the first African-American woman transplant surgeon. That same year, she married Dr. Harvey White, and began teaching as an assistant professor at Pitt. In 1996.. Dr. Scantlebury worked her way up to associate professor by 2002 and was recruited by the University of South Alabama (USA) as a surgical professor and as director of the USA's Gulf Coast Regional Transplant Centre.

Dr. Scantlebury accepted an offer from the Christiana Care Health System of Delaware in 2008 to serve as director of their kidney transplant program and the family relocated. In her career, Dr. Scantlebury estimates she has completed over 2,000 transplants, and has published more than 85 peer-reviewed research papers, as well as 10 monographs and several book chapters. She retired in 2020.

In 2003, she and then in 2006 she began working with other transplant surgeons, the Coalition on Donation, and the National Minority Organ and Tissue Transplant Education Program in an endeavor called Linkages to Life to educate the black community and dispel myths regarding transplants.

Dr. Scantlebury was honored as one of the "Best Doctors in America" and inducted into the Achievers Hall of Fame of the United Negro College Fund. In 2004 and 2006, she was listed as one of the "Top Doctors in America", has been awarded the Carlow University Woman of Spirit Award for inspiring others and the "Gift of Life Award" from the National Kidney Foundation. In addition to recognition by the Caribbean American Medical and Scientific Association, she received the Order of Barbados Gold Crown of Merit, for her efforts to educate minorities about organ transplant. She has performed over 2,000 transplants and published many peer-reviewed papers.

Dr. Scantlebury's special interests include: researching the end results of donation and transplantation in African Americans, increasing organ donation in the African-American community through education and awareness, increasing the incidence of living donor transplantation by education, and treating viral infections in kidneys.

Today she is a professor of surgery at Texas Christian University and the University of North Texas Health Science Center and Medical School, in Forth Worth, Texas.

to SaRee Grimes for being featured in the 2022-2023 School Year Braven Impact Report for winning the Capstone Challenge project in her Braven Career and Leadership Accelerator course at Spelman College. Braven partners with incredible organizations each semester on the Capstone Challenge, the final project in the Career and Leadership Accelerator course where Fellows use design thinking skills to develop real-world solutions to existing challenges the companies are facing. This past semester, the Braven Atlanta Team at Spelman College partnered with Fintech in Action. SaRee was featured in the 2022-2023 Braven Impact Report for leading a team to solve the Capstone Challenge question "How can the Fintech (Financial Technology) industry help more black women become more confident investors?" SaRee was selected as Project Manager and led a team of 6 teammates in designing a website to encourage black women to become more confident investors. The team developed initiatives such as Financial Literacy Mastery Classes, HBCU Conference Tours, and a Mentor Program. Several First Mount Zion Baptist Church (FMZBC) members assisted in answering a 5-question survey on their investment history and strategies. SaRee also conducted a personal interview with FMZBC member Cherry Wilcoxon Anderson, Executive Director, Financial Business Operations and Comptroller for the Defense Contract Management Agency where she received invaluable insight from a working professional in the financial industry. The results of the survey and the personal interview were instrumental in developing the metrics needed to create the prototype for the website. She is extremely grateful to Mrs. Anderson and her entire FMZBC family for their continued support.

When asked to describe her experience as a 2023 Fellow, SaRee replied "My experience as project manager for this year's Capstone Challenge was rewarding and it allowed me to shine as a leader. Throughout the process, I've learned the importance of teamwork, communication, and how to properly lead a group of individuals with integrity and an open mind. Going into this project, I knew nothing about investing, but thanks to FinTech in Action, they have provided me with resources and an investment grant with Stackwell to start my investment journey."

As the Capstone Challenge Winners, SaRee and her team were presented with an investment grant with Stackwell to start their investment journeys. SaRee is currently a Junior at Spelman College majoring in Theater and Performance with a minor in Entrepreneurship and Innovation. She enjoys acting and public speaking. SaRee's goal is to become a professional actress and to create and own an online streaming production company promoting quality television and movie programming. SaRee is the daughter of Derrick and Sandra Grimes and has been a part of the FMZBC family since 2009.

Consider this Hip Bridge with Abduction:



Lie face up on a mat, with knees bent and feet flat on the floor. Place a band around your legs, just above the knees. Lift your hips up off the floor to create a straight line from your neck to your knees. Resist the inward pull of the band to strengthen the outside of the hip. Bring your hips back down to the floor and repeat.

Challenge: Begin with a 5-minute walk to warm up, then perform three sets of 10-12 reps, three days a week.


