Family, please give Jamir your heartfelt congratulations and continue to encourage and support him in his personal growth.



"EMOTIONAL INTELLIGENCE"



Emotional Intelligence or EQ is the ability to understand, use, and manage your own emotions in positive ways to relieve stress, communicate effectively, empathize with others, overcome challenges and defuse conflict. Emotional intelligence helps you build stronger relationships, succeed at school and work, and achieve your career and personal goals. It can also help you to connect with your feelings, turn intention into

action, and make informed decisions about what matters most to you.

Have you ever allowed yourself to get worked up and then regretted yelling at a coworker or saying a rude or snarky comment to your boss or leader? Have you had a heated argument with your spouse, romantic partner, or a family member, and later wonder why you ever let the small issue you were having blow up into something huge? Have you ever made a rash decision while mad, afraid, or upset, only to regret it later? These are all issues of low or poor emotional intelligence. If you are unable to manage your emotions, you are probably not managing your stress either. This can lead to serious physical and mental health problems (high blood pressure, anxiety and depression). If you are unable to understand, get comfortable with, or mange your emotions, you'll struggle to form strong relations. This in turn can leave you feeling lonely and isolated and further exacerbate any physical and mental health problems.

Emotional Regulation Skills

When you experience an emotion, a behavior usually comes with it. If you are angry, you might fight or argue. If you are sad, you might withdraw from your friends. Doing the opposite action will help you change your emotion. If you're angry, instead of fighting, yelling and arguing, talk quietly and behave politely. When you are sad, talk to a friend or family member who will listen, support, and help you cope, watch a funny movie.

Ask yourself questions to check the facts: What event triggered my emotion? What interpretations am I making about the event? Does my emotion and its intensity match the facts of the situation? Or does it just match my assumptions of the situation?

Make Self-care a Priority - Engage in activities that you find relaxing, fun, or energizing. This can be as simple as reading a book or as big as taking a vacation.

Pay attention to the positive events. Most people give more attention to the bad things than the good. If you hear ten compliments, and a single criticism, you'll probably focus on the criticism. Journal or meditate on things you are grateful for.

Know what works best to calm you down. Is it going for a run? Taking a walk around the block? Calling a Friend? Running through some yoga sequences? Spending 10 minutes meditating with your office door closed? Figure out what works best, and then actually put it into practice.

RETHINK NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS

Do you want to lose weight, lower your blood pressure, reverse your type 2 diabetes, increase your bone density and muscle mass, or just improve your overall health?

This New Year be encouraged to focus on process resolutions rather than product resolutions. A process resolution is something you do to achieve the product resolution. For example, "I will play pickleball two times per week," is my process resolution and my product resolution is to lose 10 pounds. You can control your process resolutions, but you cannot control your product resolutions. You can't mandate that your body lose 10 pounds, but you can control the action steps you take to get there. Process resolutions are behavioral objectives. By focusing on these behavioral objectives rather than the outcome, you become empowered to take action toward healthy behavior change.

Challenge: Set an exercise behavior or process resolution that keeps you on track towards your product resolution. Examples include "I will walk 3 times per week" or "I will do toning exercises 2 times per week". These exercise behaviors are best if they are enjoyable, fit into your schedule and help you reach your product resolution.



IT Department Church Management Software Administrator

Under the direction of the Church Business Administrator, the Church Management Software (CMS) Administrator (CMSA) will be responsible for all aspects of CMS. The CMSA will play an integral role in rolling out, onboarding, maintaining, and providing end user support of the CMS and will be responsible for growing utilization of the platform through ongoing training and education on the use of the platform. The CMSA will also maintain the Church's CMS systems to include the performance, scalability, and integration with other platforms and integrity of information across FMZ. This role will include managing day-to-day functions and usage of the Church's CMS and supporting platforms, involvement in the planning and development of data structures, and troubleshooting any issues on behalf of members, employees, volunteers, and other users.

Requirements include having a clear understanding of relational database concepts and constructs, being able to "consult" with Ministry representatives to understand their data requirements, working with the managed service provider, audio visual and information technology staff to optimize the database structure and reporting capabilities to meet our needs, and championing the accuracy and integrity of our data.



DON'T TRY TO HANDLE GRIEF ALONE

Grief is a strong, sometimes overwhelming emotion that we experience when a loved one dies. It is not something that should be dealt with alone. There is no time limit to grief. Everyone must travel their own grief journey at their own pace. Because there are so many nuisances to grief that persons must learn what they are, how they affect you, and how to address them.

At First Mount Zion Baptist Church, the Journey to Joy Ministry hosts the GriefShare program. GriefShare is a 13- week program that provides a safe place each week for group participants to share their feelings and their grief stories. The 13-week, small group seminar is a Christ-centered and biblically based support program.

GriefShare is for people who have lost a spouse, child, other family member, or friend through death. Presently, Journey to Joy does not offer GriefShare seminars for children. Participants will learn about grief-related issues. A grieving person can join at any time during the 13 weeks. The lessons do not need to be attended consecutively. Participants can register for the 13 sessions as many times as they would like.

A video is shown each week featuring experts, ministers, and Christian Counselors discussing grief and recovery subjects helpful to people in grief. The video also features other people sharing their stories of what has helped them deal with the pain of losing a family member or friend through death. During the week between meetings, group members use their workbooks to complete a daily Bible study and practical exercises to help them heal from grief. Register at **grief-share.org** for the spring term that will be held on Mondays at 7 p.m. February 5 – April 29, 2024. We are here to support you on your grief journey. You are not alone. "TRIBUTE TO THE 10TH CALVARY" Art of Our Congregation: History and Creativity

Mike Sherman's painting, "Tribute to the 10th Calvary" is a watercolor depiction of the 10th Calvary US Colored Troops during a calvary charge. The **10th Cavalry Regiment** is a unit of the United States Army. Formed as a segregated African-American unit, it was one of the original "Buffalo Soldier" regiments in the post–Civil War Regular Army. It served in combat during the Indian Wars in the western United States, the Spanish-American War in Cuba, the Philippine–American War and Mexican Revolution.

Mike and his family are members of FMZBC. Mike's watercolor portrait art reflects a broad range of topics ranging from architecture and landscapes to African American diaspora and military history. He is influenced and inspired by a wide range of artists and architects to include Henry O. Tanner, John Singer Sargent, and Paul Goodnight. His work is rooted in history, commemoration, motion, and color. Mike's work was recently selected to be in the James Wise Gallery's "Crowns of Glory: Ceremony and Couture though Caps, Coiffures, and Coverings" at Norfolk State University and his portrait "Night Mission" was featured in the Ellington-White Contemporary Gallery (EWCG) 2023 National Drawing Competition at Fayetteville State University. He recently earned the Public Choice Award for his painting "Maasai Runner" during the Diversia 30th - UN Calendar and exhibition in December 2022. The same painting was also selected for exhibition in the Rhode Island Water Color Society (RIWS) 2023 National Watermedia Show.

Mike has been involved with art, architecture and urban design at some level for over 20 years. He is a graduate of both Hampton University and MIT's architecture and urban planning programs. Mike is also a retired US Army officer and combat veteran. He currently works full time with the federal agency responsible for reviewing and approving the urban design and site locations of congressionally legislated commemorative works, such as the Martin Luther King Memorial, World War II Memorial and National Museum of African American History and Culture, in Washington, DC. Mike is also a member of the Virginia and Transparent Watercolor Societies.



FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN TO SIT ON NATIONAL SECURITY COUNCIL

From an impoverished childhood in Tennessee, Carl T. Rowan would go on to become a nationally syndicated columnist and the first African American to sit in on National Security Council meetings. In 1962, President John F. Kennedy asked him to serve on the U.S. delegation to the United Nations, which according to his memoir, "Breaking Barriers" (HarperPerennial, 1992), he accepted "without much enthusiasm" because he was concerned about being tokenized as the only African American on the team. Despite initial misgivings about the role, Rowan became a key figure during the Cuban missile crisis, shuttling between Washington and New York to communicate the U.S. position. He was also vocal about the inequalities he saw between white and Black American diplomats in the UN delegation, and he brought the discrimination to the president's attention. Much of Rowan's writing focused on racial equality in America, and he would often say, "I am a crusader for racial justice, and I will be to the day I die."

Carl Rowan was born in Ravenscroft, Tennessee, the son of Johnnie, a cook and cleaner, and Thomas Rowan, who stacked



lumber. He was raised in McMinnville, Tennessee, during the Great Depression. Rowan was determined to get a good education, graduating from Bernard High School in 1942 as class president and valedictorian. After graduating from high school, Rowan worked cleaning porches at a tuberculosis hospital in order to attend Tennessee

State College in Nashville. He studied at Tennessee State University and Washburn University. He was one of the first African Americans to serve as a commissioned officer in the United States Navy. Rowan was also a member of Omega Psi Phi fraternity, graduating from Oberlin College. He was awarded a master's degree in journalism from the University of Minnesota and began his career in journalism writing for the African-American newspapers *Minneapolis Spokesman* and *St. Paul Recorder* (now the *Minnesota Spokesman-Recorder*). He went on to be a copywriter for *The Minneapolis Tribune* and later became a staff writer for 11 years, reporting extensively on the Civil Rights Movement.

In 1960, Rowan was denied membership to a club on the grounds that it was racially segregated; this subsequently inspired Joe Glazer to write the song "I Belong to a Private Club". In a 1964 interview with Robert Penn Warren for the book *Who Speaks for the Negro?*, Rowan reflected on his reporting of the civil rights movement, as well as his opinions on the distinctions between the North and the South, prejudices and persecution, and African Americans' political power.

In 1961, he was appointed Deputy Assistant Secretary of State by President John F. Kennedy. The following year, he served as a delegate to the United Nations during the Cuban Missile Crisis. Rowan became the U.S. Ambassador to Finland in 1963. In 1964, Rowan was appointed director of the United States Information Agency (USIA) by President Lyndon B. Johnson. In serving as director of the USIA, Rowan became the first African American to hold a seat on the National Security Council and the highest level African American in the United States government.

Rowan was a 1995 Pulitzer Prize finalist for his commentaries. He is the only journalist in history to win the Sigma Delta Chi medallion for journalistic excellence in three successive years.

Carl Rowan was a well-known and highly decorated journalist whose columns were published in more than one hundred newspapers across the United States. In 1968 he received the Elijah Parish Lovejoy Award as well as an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Colby College. In 1997, he was awarded the Spingarn Medal from the NAACP.

Thurgood Marshall's only interview while serving on the Supreme Court of the United States was for Carl Rowan's 1988 documentary. The National Press Club gave Rowan its 1999 Fourth Estate Award for lifetime achievement. ^[8] On January 9, 2001, United States Secretary of State Madeleine Albright dedicated the press briefing room at the State Department as the Carl T. Rowan Briefing room.

In 1987, Rowan founded Project Excellence, a college scholarship program for black high-school seniors who displayed outstanding writing and speaking skills, in an effort to combat negative peer pressure felt by black students, and to reward students who rose above stereotypes and negative peer influence and excelled academically. Chaired by Rowan, a committee of journalists, community leaders, and school officials oversaw the program. Participants were African-American students in their senior year of high school from public, private, and parochial schools in the metropolitan Washington area, including Virginia and Maryland suburbs. By 2000 the program had given out \$26 million in scholarship money to over 1150 students.

Rowan died in Washington on September 23, 2000 and was survived by his wife, Vivien, and the three children they shared: two sons and one daughter. Rowan's two sons are Carl Jr., a lawyer; and Jeffrey, a clinical psychologist. His daughter, Barbara Rowan Jones, is a formal journalist like her father. Carl Rowan also is survived by four grandchildren.




