

EMOTIONAL HEALTH AND THE PSALMS

When we're mentally distressed, going through sorrow, grief, consumed by anguish and years of groan-



Ann Weems included, in her book, fifty lament psalms she wrote over a period of time after the death of her son. She said about the pattern of the Psalms of Lament: "When the need, hurt, the demand, and venom are fully voiced, something unexpected happens." She said, "the mood and tone change." The Psalmist's/Israel's anger and protest appear to be spent and moves to a positive resolution. The Psalmist is confident of being heard and dealt with bountifully, and the Psalm ends in rejoicing and praise. It may be that the long protest is cathartic. Or it may be, as many scholarly readers think, that there was in the middle of the utterance a communal, liturgical or divine intervention of assurance that permitted a new posture of confidence, well-being, faith, hope and assurance of God's love.

Psalm 13 is a great model and example for expressing your emotions before God.

- **I. David's Complaint (13:1-2):** Four times David asks the Lord, "How Long Lord?":
 - A. "How long will you forget me?" (13:1)
 - B. "How long will you hide your face from me?" (13:1)
 - C. "How long will I wrestle with my thoughts and have anguish in my soul?" (13:2)
 - D. "How long will my enemy triumph over me?" (13:2)
- II. David's Petition (13:3-4): David makes two requests of the Lord:
 - A. Restore me "Give light to my eyes" (13:3).
 - B. Do not let my enemies gloat over me (13:4).
- **III.** Assurance/Praise (13:5-6): David trusts in the Lord's unfailing love and rejoices because the LORD is good to him.

When we avoid our emotions and don't reveal them, we're actually making them stronger. This can create many maladies in the body and in the mind, causing a myriad of health issues. God can heal what you reveal. Praying through Anxiety/Fear (Psalm 3); Praying through pain (Psalm 22); Praying through doubt (Psalm 73); Praying through Deep Distress (Psalm 31); and Praying through feeling Abandoned by God (Psalm 22).



MESSAGE FROM PULPIT COMMITTEE:

are aware, we are currently in "Phase II" of the Pastoral Search for the next Under-Shepherd for First Mount Zion Baptist Church. As we continue, in earnestness and humility, to delve deeper into the heart of the search, we are asking for each of your continued prayers and patience as we continue to define the pastoral search requirements and expectations.

When Christ was ministering to the crowds, His response was compassion and teaching. He did not tell the disciples to pray for those people. Instead, He said to pray for laborers (Matthew 9:38). We should never forget that looking for a pastor is, first of all, a spiritual exercise. Everyone in our congregation has a part in this process. The most significant way for our Church family to participate is to commit to prayer. We would like to suggest three areas that you might put at the top of your prayer list regarding our pastoral search.



NEVER GIVE UP ON YOUR DREAMS!!!

She became a mom at 15 but didn't give up on her dreams. To-day, she's a doctor!!!

A Howard University graduate achieved her dream of becoming a doctor after becoming a mom at just 15.

"Growing up, I didn't see Black doctors," Dr. Kathryn Kelly said. "I really got into this to take care of my community and to take care of patients, and I feel like I'm able to do that."

Kelly traveled a long way to get to this point in her medical career. Along the way, her dream of becoming a doctor never wavered, even after she discovered motherhood would begin for her much earlier than most.

"Even as being a teen parent — like, people in school knew, everybody knew," Kelly said, "but I also was still the person who was doing what I needed to do, and also being encouraging to others." The motivation of providing for her daughter kept her laser-focused on her dreams. "I was still trying to go to school and still trying to get good grades and that kind of thing," she said.

Kelly credits her own mom for encouraging her to work toward her goals and go to Howard University. Kelly did just that, double

-majoring in anthropology and biology, all while juggling motherhood. Her determination paid off in 2001, when she graduated from Howard University with not one, but two degrees. She later also graduated from Howard's College of Medicine.



"Having gone through what I've gone through, it allows me to be humble when I'm talking with/to my patients, and allows me to be a better doctor, a better wife, a better human being," Kelly said. One of her patients, Bernice Bass-Abner, said she appreciates Kelly's life story and her attention to patients' needs. "She feels like a friend taking care of a friend," Bass-Abner said. "I always feel like she's got my very best interest at heart."

Common courtesy and kindness are two major components of Kelly's private practice, Kelly Collaborative Medicine, in Silver Spring, Maryland. "Most of my patients, I think they come in just to hear my stories and to have some fun and talk, in addition to healing," Kelly said, "because healing is more than the medicine you give. Healing is about how you make people feel in your space and the energy that you give out."

FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN TO RECEIVE A PH.D. FROM HARVARD UNIVERSITY

In 1895, history was made when a man named William Edward Burghardt Du Bois became the first African American man to receive a Ph.D. from Harvard University. This amazing accomplishment went on to open the door for hundreds of future Black American students and even led to a series of lectures, aptly named *The W. E. B. Du Bois*

Lectures which, as Harvard University Press. Stated, was proudly given in recognition to "persons of outstanding achievement who have contributed to our better understanding of African American life, history, and culture."

Not only was Du Bois the first to achieve this step, but he's also recognized as the first to receive an A.M degree, according to the Harvard Library. Du Bois is recognized for being an American historian, sociologist, and civil rights activist. According to the Harvard Library, "after



receiving a bachelor's degree from Fisk University in 1888, Du Bois entered Harvard College as a junior and received his second bachelor's degree in 1890."

Born three years after the end of the Civil War, Du Bois grew up in predominately white Great Barrington, Massachusetts, a small, rural town with an even smaller Black population. His childhood in Great Barrington was a central influence in his life, as was his mother, Mary, who cultivated a young Du Bois's understanding of what it meant to be Black in America.

W. E. B. Du Bois was a scholar, public intellectual, author, orator, and activist who used his powerful voice and influence to illuminate issues of race, racism, and Black consciousness. He is also one of Harvard's best-known graduates. Co-founder of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and editor of its magazine, the *Crisis*, Du Bois authored dozens of books examining the Black experience in the United States, including his seminal collection of sociological essays, *Souls of Black Folk*.

Du Bois taught at Atlanta University (now Clark Atlanta University), was active in the Pan-Africanism movement, and used various platforms to challenge Jim Crow segregation and racial oppression. He also engaged in fierce debates with prominent contemporaries like Frederick Douglass and Booker T. Washington on the best way to achieve racial equity and empowerment.

In 1885, Du Bois left home for Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee where, for the first time in his life, he felt the embrace of a large Black community. He also witnessed firsthand a level of overt racism he had not encountered before. "It was to me an extraordinary experience. I was thrilled to be for the first time among so many people of my own color or rather of such various and such extraordinary colors, which I had not seen before, but who seemed close bound to me by new and exciting ties," he recalled decades later in a convocation address at Atlanta University. "The three years here were years of growth, strength and expanding ambition. I learned new things about the world. I came in contact for the first time with a sort of violence that I had never realized in New England."

Upon graduation from Fisk and with financial assistance from his family and supporters as well as Harvard, Du Bois headed to Cambridge in 1888 with the goal of earning a PhD in philosophy.

"To make my own attitude toward the Harvard of that day clear, it must be remembered that I went to Harvard as a Negro, not simply by birth, but recognizing myself as a member of a segregated caste whose situation I accepted. But I was determined to work from within that caste to find my way out." He famously reflected that he was "in Harvard but not of it." He was deliberate in his choice not to pursue close relationships with many of his white fellow students, whom Du Bois believed had little desire to befriend him. It was in Berlin, Du Bois wrote, "where I first met white folk who treated me as a human being."



FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN WOMAN TO RECEIVE A PH.D. FROM HARVARD UNIVERSITY



In 1926, Otelia Cromwell became the first black woman to receive a degree [Ph.D.] from Yale University. She had previously been the first black graduate of Smith College. She was the eldest child of Lucy McGuinn and Republican John Wesley Cromwell, a lawyer, educator, and journalist, who was active in the reconstruction of Virginia. Otelia was born in Washington, D.C. in 1874, and her mother died when she was 12, leaving her responsible for her

five younger siblings. After graduating from high school, Otelia taught in the D.C. public schools while taking college courses at Howard University. In 1897 she transferred to Smith College, graduating with a BA in 1900, becoming the College's first African-American graduate.

Cromwell returned to teaching in D.C.'s segregated public schools where she taught English, German, and Latin at the M Street High School and the Armstrong Manual Training School. While remaining in her teaching positions, she continued to pursue her own educational advancement. After attending summer sessions at Columbia University, she received her MA in 1910. She then took summer courses at the University of Chicago in 1915 and continued taking courses at Columbia University until 1920. Competent in French, German, and Latin, Cromwell sought out courses such as "Goethe's Faust," "The Medieval Drama," and "Cicero." With far more credits in her pocket than the average applicant, in 1922 Cromwell entered Yale's PhD program in English at age 48. Yale was pleased to offer Cromwell an academic scholarship, and she reportedly "made a very favorable impression" while at Yale.

In 1926, Cromwell earned her Doctorate in English from Yale. Yale University Press published her dissertation, *Thomas Heywood, Dramatist, A Study in the Elizabethan Drama of Everyday Life*, in 1928. She went on to become a professor of English Language and Literature at Miner Teachers College in Washington, D.C., where she remained until 1944 when she retired.

Throughout her academic career, Cromwell worked to advance the cause of civil rights and racial and gender equality. In 1931 she was an editor of the pioneering text *Readings From Negro Authors for Schools and Colleges*, and in 1932 served on the board of directors of *The Encyclopedia of the Negro* as the only woman alongside W.E.B. DuBois. Her most significant scholarly work was a biography of the suffragist and abolitionist Lucretia Mott, titled *The Life of Lucretia Mott* (Harvard University Press, 1958).

Her niece Adelaide Cromwell recalls that although Otelia Cromwell was "soft-spoken," she "was headstrong and abided by a strict code of ethics and principles." She was a lifelong member of the NAACP, refused to patronize stores that treated black customers poorly, and did not use public transportation because of segregated employment practices.

She received an honorary degree from Smith College in 1950. Cromwell passed away in her family home in 1972 at the age of 98.
