RESTING IN YOUR STORM

When the circumstances of my life are the way I like them, I can easily rest in God. But that kind of resting is really resting in circumstances, not resting in God. The hardest thing is to rest when the circumstances are anything but the way I'd like them to be. It's like trying to sleep in the middle of a hurricane.

Come to think about it, Jesus slept in a boat in the middle of a storm. It was on the sea of Galilee. Mat-

thew says that Jesus got into the boat and His disciples followed Him. Suddenly a furious storm came up on the lake, so that the waves swept over the boat. But Jesus was sleeping (Matthew 8:23-24). I've often wondered, how could He...sleep? Yes, I know Jesus was exhausted from speaking to the huge crowds and attending to their needs. But sleep in a storm? Although, I must admit some of my best sleep is during a storm.

I think the only reason Jesus could sleep was that He knew without a doubt that they were not going to sink. The disciples who were with Him were afraid because they didn't yet understand that the God who created the very water their boat sailed on was in the boat with them. They were just beginning to understand Jesus's full power.

Peter was one of the disciples in the boat that day. I think he learned a lesson, because four years later, when Peter was arrested by King Herod and put in prison, the night before his trial, Peter slept. No doubt Herod intended to put him to death the next day, because the Bible tells us that he had just had James the brother of John killed with the sword, and when he saw that it pleased the people, he arrested Peter. Here is Peter, in a prison cell the night before his trial. He's between two soldiers, bound with two chains, with centurions standing guard at the entrance and Peter is sleeping (Acts 12:1-6).

The only way you can sleep in a storm is by realizing that God is with you. Isaiah says: "He will keep you in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on Jesus because they trust in you" (Isaiah 26:3). The psalmist wrote: "in peace I will lie down and sleep, for you alone, Lord, make me dwell in safety" (Psalm 4:8).

Where can we find rest when we don't like what we see? "Yes, my soul, finds rest in God; My hope comes from Him" (Psalm 62:5). He who sees the end from the beginning knows what He is doing.

Reflection: How may you rest in your storm(s)? As you navigate your storm(s), know that I am praying for you.

John 10:11, 27-28 (NKJV) I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd gives His life for the sheep... My sheep hear my voice, and I know them... and they follow Me. And I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch them out of My hand.

As we prepare to celebrate Resurrection Sunday, our March Youth Ministry Bible

Study Sessions have explored Jesus' "I Am" statements. In our first lesson, we looked at what Jesus meant when He said, "I am the Light of the world." Most recently, we discussed how Jesus assessed His relationship to us when He proclaimed, "I am the **good** shepherd." This means as His followers, we are the sheep. *Ministry to Youth* notes "The English word 'good' doesn't do the Greek word 'kalos' any justice here. Kalos means beautiful or excellent, preeminent, lovely, honorable." Jesus is the consummate shepherd who would do anything for His sheep. Now we may not be excited about being likened to sheep but if we are honest, depicting our "spiritual" selves as sheep is fitting. In fact, in the Bible "Believers" are referred to as sheep over 200 times. Isaiah 53:6 notes, "All we like sheep have gone astray; We have turned, everyone to his own way." We can all probably remember several occasions when our words or actions have been contrary to what pleases God. These occasions can be considered time in which we have gone "astray." Yet when we "wander off," we do not have to be lost forever. Jesus reminds us in the parable told in Matthew and Luke that a "good shepherd," will leave his other sheep to seek the one that is lost. The shepherd will not be angry the sheep strayed but will rejoice that it was found. Jesus ends the parable by saying it is not the will of your Father who is in heaven that one of these little ones should perish (Matt 18:14).

This Lenten season, I hope we embrace being sheep and rejoice knowing that we belong to the "good" Shepherd who did, in fact, lay down His life for us. Let us seek to grow closer to Him so we can "hear His voice." Our shepherd, Jesus, promises to "give [us] eternal life, and [we] shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch [us] out of My hand (John 10:28).

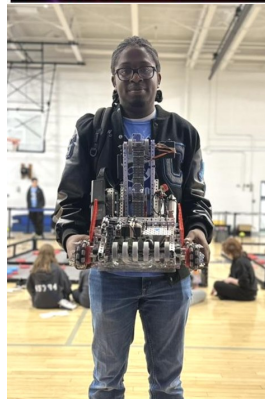

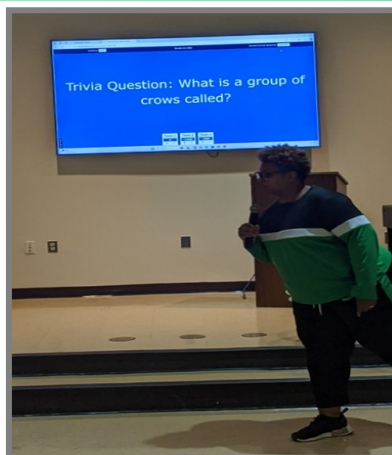

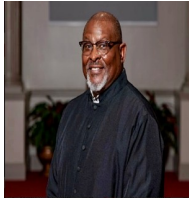

EASTER, A TIME FOR REFLECTION AND RENEWAL

"He is not here, but is risen: remember how He spoke to you when He was yet in Galilee" (Luke 24:6)



This month, we celebrate the joyous occasion of our risen Christ. Television networks and social media will broadcast the Vatican's Easter ceremony worldwide. Churches will hold sunrise services, and countries will host plays and pageants to echo the joy of His resurrection. In the Philippines and Oberammergau, Germany, individuals compete for the role of the crucified Jesus. The participants have nails hammered through their bodies. The elaborate and realistic reenactments of the crucifixion serve as reminders that joy follows pain.

What if we placed ourselves in the text? We were once dead in sin and now we have been resurrected in a new life. What does it look like to us? This is a time for reflection and renewal, a better opportunity than making a New Year's Resolution.

WHEN GOD CALLS . . . ALREADY PREDESTINATED

(Romans 8:30)



This statement holds true as evidenced by the Pastoral Installation Service, held on March 8, 2025, for one of the oldest sons in the Ministry here at First Mount Zion Baptist Church (FMZ). Over 50 years ago, a mother and her children joined FMZ and, like Hannah, she gave her children back to God, not knowing the outcome, but trusting God, believing every day that He had something bigger in store for her "boy". What a testimony Momma Woolfolk could share, but this story is not about her...it is about her "boy."

The Bible declares in Proverbs 22:6, "Train up a child in the way he should go, And when he is old he will not depart from it.", and the end result of what we witnessed on Saturday is a testimony to the fact that God's word is true and, when consistently taught and adhered to, bears fruit.

The FMZ Family experienced a moment of profound joy as we bore witness to, and participated in, the Installation Service of Reverend Brian D. Woolfolk as the new Pastor of Mount Zion Baptist Church (MZBC). Rev. Woolfolk, while a member here, was licensed, later ordained, and served as an Associate Minister for a period of over 30 years. God certainly has a sense of humor because He called him into Ministry as an Associate Minister from First Mount Zion Baptist Church in Dumfries, Virginia, to Pastor Mount Zion Baptist Church in our Nation's Capital, just across the river. One is "First" and the other, simply the "Mount."

The Service was a beautiful testament to the unity and dedication of both our congregations, and it was a moving ceremony that marked the beginning of a new chapter in Reverend Woolfolk's journey. Family, church members, visiting clergy, community leaders, and well-wishers filled the sanctuary, eager to witness this sacred transition. The Service included inspiring Worship, heartfelt prayers, and powerful messages from guest speakers who spoke about the significance of pastoral leadership and the responsibilities entrusted to a servant of God.

The Reverend Dr. Luke E. Torian delivered a poignant message about embodying the new direction and possibilities for Reverend Woolfolk's ministry. He encouraged them to embrace the Vision that God had given their new Pastor, and to commit to following his leadership. wherever God would direct him, whom, they said, was "chosen by God!" More importantly, Dr. Torian's instruction to Pastor Woolfolk was to love God's people in all circumstances, and in all situations, because of the One who loved us first. That is the first commandment, and there is NOTHING greater!

The Reverend Dr. James T. Murphy, Pastor of Greater Little Zion Baptist Church, then presented the "Charge" to Pastor-Elect Woolfolk, reminding him that a pastor is not just a leader, but a servant, walking alongside his/her flock, in faith and love. He also asked the members of MZBC to come together to support their newly installed pastor and his wife, to pray for his leadership, and to look forward with anticipation and embrace the opportunities ahead for them all.

Finally, the now "Pastor" Woolfolk was officially presented to the waiting congregants and charged with the mission of leading the

Church with faith, wisdom, compassion and love, followed by the laying on of hands from the Elders and fellow clergy, with prayers lifted for strength, guidance, and blessings upon this, the new Shepherd of Mount Zion Baptist Church, Washington DC.

Pastor Woolfolk was gifted with the symbols of pastoral ministry, including a Bible, a hymnal, a robe, the keys to the new church, and a Communion kit, each representing the responsibilities and blessings of his calling. One of the presenters shared that they believed that God has sent Pastor Woolfolk to them, and he also believed that the new pastor comes to them with a wealth of experience, a deep love for ministry, and a vision to lead them with wisdom and compassion; that he will guide them in worship, provide spiritual support, and help them grow in faith as they serve both the Church and the wider community. MZBC members stood, filled with hope and anticipation, and they are convinced that, with Pastor Woolfolk at the helm, MZBC will continue to flourish as a beacon of light and love.

During Pastor Woolfolk's remarks, he gave all glory to God and lauded his mother for living a life before him, pointing him to Christ, never wavering, and reminding him at every turn who God is and what He can do in one's life. Won't **HE** do it? He also thanked his wife and children profusely for sticking with him through the good and the bad times, and gave a blanket "thank you" to all family members present. He then shared some of his vision for MZBC, including his desire that it not be just a church in the community, but it being a community church, with spiritual growth and intergenerational connection. It was obvious that his words resonated deeply with the members of MZBC, as they praised God with resounding hope and excitement for the future.

The Installation was a collaborative effort, with participation from both churches, the Ushers and the Parking Ministries, the Men's Choir, and the Grain of Heaven. Their contributions created a truly memorable and uplifting experience for all who attended.

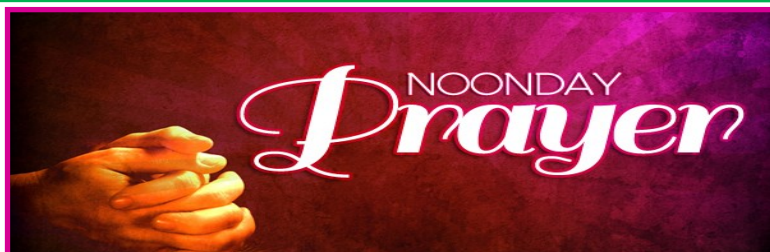

Woolfolk, had the opportunity to personally greet and welcome Pastor Woolfolk and his family. 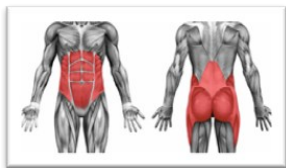

FITNESS-IN-PLACE

CORE BRACING: ESTABLISH STABILITY!

Developing core strength is essential for everyday health and well-being, as a strong core protects the spine, reduces back pain, enhances movement patterns, and improves balance, stability and posture.



Core bracing teaches you how to strengthen and stabilize your core. It is the process of contracting the muscles around your spine to create a rigid midsection.

Stand Tall: Feet hip-distance apart and your arms by your sides with palms facing forward.

Engage Your Core: Think about drawing your belly button towards your spine. Focus on tightening all the muscles surrounding the abdomen. Imagine you're about to be punched in the stomach and tighten your abdominal muscles as if to protect yourself.

Maintain a Neutral Spine: Keep your back straight and avoid arching or rounding your spine.

Breathe Naturally: Continue breathing normally while bracing your core.

Hold the Contraction: Hold the braced position for a few seconds, then release and repeat.

Practice Regularly: Make it a habit to brace your core during daily activities and exercises.



You can progress this exercise by bracing the core and slowly lifting a leg in front of the body, alternate legs. The goal is to brace the core so that you are only moving the hip joint. You do not want to compensate with the torso or swing the leg with momentum. The slower the movement, the deeper you will brace the core.

Challenge: When working at a desk, set an alarm every 2 hours and do six sets of core bracing, 10 seconds each (when lifting a leg, do three sets on each leg). Only takes one minute!

Grace & Peace! The Women's Ministry hosted its March Fellowship on March 8th, with the theme, "The Lord is Your Shepherd in Every Season of Your Life!" The presence of the Lord was evident through the powerful words spoken by each guest speaker, the beautiful songs of praise, and the praise dance.

We opened the fellowship with a Praise & Worship song, "That's My King," by CeCe Winans, followed by our first speaker, Evangelist Beverly Johnson. Evangelist Johnson recited Isaiah 54:17 NKJV & NLT reminding us of our theme and that no weapon formed against you shall prosper. She shared that no matter what season you are in, whether one of joy, grief, or struggles, God is with you, guiding and protecting you every step of the way. She spoke on how God is our Refuge and our Stronghold, and that we should not look to our circumstances and think that we are alone but hold on to God's unchanging hands and trust in His word. He will guide you through the still waters and restore your souls. His love is consistent, and it never fails. We were reminded that God holds the world in His hands, and He will see us through. Evangelist Johnson also shared Romans 8:38-39 NLT, "And I am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from God's love. Neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither our fears for today nor our worries about tomorrow — not even the powers of hell can separate us from God's love." This was a powerful Word that had the ladies raising their hands and praising God. Glory Hallelujah! After Evangelist Johnson shared, Sister Stacy Griggs sang "Better Days," which provided a strong feeling of serenity knowing that Better Days are coming. We just have to believe it!

Deaconess Debbie Tribble encouraged everyone as well with her words. She reminded us that God is our Great Shepherd. He is in control, and He is our strength. We can go to God about ever situation in our lives. Because the Lord is our Shepherd, and because God is a God who keeps His promise, we can be assured that we will lack nothing. Deaconess Tribble reminded us that God restores our souls and leads us into the path of righteousness. Trusting God leads to our contentment as He supplies all our needs and leads us down the right path. She reminded us that when the Lord is your Shepherd you have all that you need! Deaconess Tribble also referenced John 10:11 "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd gives His life for the sheep." What an anointed Word it was, that had the ladies praising God! Thank You Lord!

Associate Minister Cheryl Manning's focus was on Psalm 23 NKJV. Before she started with the word that God gave to her for the women, she acknowledged Women's History Month and Women's International Day. She thanked each one for the contributions of education and inspiring generations past, present and in the future. Rev. Manning shared powerful words that reminded us that the Lord is our Shepherd. She reminded the women that each season serves a specific purpose during our walk with God, and that we should depend on God to provide for us/his daughters. Rev. Manning read Psalm 23, after which she broke it down as follows:

I Shall Not Want – We shall not want because we have all we need. We are content, satisfied, free, and we lack for nothing because the Shepherd is providing for all our needs.

He Makes Me Lie Down in Green Pastures, He Leads Me Beside the Still Waters, He restores my Soul – The perfect place to rest; Faith, Feed and Trust are all found in Jesus. We must find safety in our Shepherd and not in our situation.

He Leads Me in The Path of Righteousness for His Name Sake – As sheep at times we are directly challenged and the Shepherd lovingly leads the way. Who we follow is who we trust most. We do not need to know the path in advance, we just need to trust the Shepherd. When we rely on the Shepherd then God is honored, because God is the main character in our lives.

Yea Though I Walk Through The Valley of The Shadow of Death I Will Fear No Evil For You Are With Me Your Rod and Your Staff They Comfort Me – There will be times that we have to walk through the valley but take heart and be encouraged, we are walking through. We are not setting up camp in the valley. If we are walking through the valley, it means there is a beginning and an end. God will use our temporary valleys to create everlasting good for us. 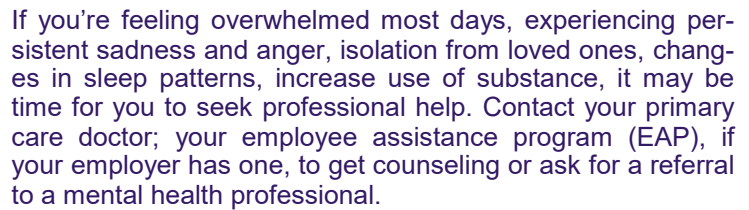

A Life of Service:

Retired Army Major General Turned Ministry Leader In a life marked by service, discipline, and dedication, Retired Army Major General James E. Simpson has seamlessly transitioned from a distinguished military career to a deeply impactful role in ministry. With over 33 years of service in the U.S. Army, culminating in the rank of Major General, his leadership on the battlefield was matched only by his commitment to

the men and women under his command. However, it is his post-military journey that has truly defined his legacy.

Personal Tidbits

Major General Simpson hails from Clinton, South Carolina, a community called Oakdale Acres, where his family moved in 1972. Some of his friends still live in the old community and he credits it for helping him as a child to understand the importance of working hard, and having families/friends taking care of each other. He recalls that families killed hogs and planted gardens together and shared with their neighbors and other families. He has been blessed to travel all over the world; however, as he puts it, there is no place like HOME. His mother still lives in Oakdale Acres and it is evident that his heart will always be there. He shares that many of the people with whom he grew up, have no college education; they are hard-working people that truly are thankful to God for what He had done for them and their families. You can sense the pride in General Simpson in having been reared in that community.

Inspiration

General Simpson shared that he was inspired to pursue this career while he was attending Lander University in Greenwood, SC. His love for History propelled him in this direction and he recalls that one of his professors saw potential in him and suggested that he look into an ROTC scholarship, which he was later awarded, leading to the beginning of his military journey which lasted 33 years until he retired in 2018.

From Combat to Calling

During his military career, Major General Simpson held various high-ranking positions. His first tour was in Iraq (2005-2006) during which he commanded a contracting unit, providing contracting support to over 100,000 plus troops. He shares that it was long hours, and they made mistakes every day, but he learned some valuable lessons by communicating

with God, acknowledging that God showed him ways to solve contracting and personnel problems. His leadership was instrumental in shaping military strategy and fostering resilience among soldiers. Known for his strategic thinking and personal integrity, he earned the respect of both his peers and subordinates. He currently works as a Consultant with Defense Contractors.

However, as his military career came to a close, General Simpson felt a new calling—a divine purpose that would guide him toward a second chapter in life. With a deep-seated faith that had always been a part of him, he began to explore how he could serve others in a new way, this time through ministry.

Ministry and Mentorship

Today, Major General Simpson serves as the Trustee Chair at First Mount Zion Baptist Church. He was asked to join the Trustee Ministry in 2010. He says he prayed about it because he was truly concerned about the commitment of his time; he wanted to be committed to the Ministry. After numerous calls with his good friend, Trustee Juan McPhail, who prayed with him and listened to his concerns, General Simpson joined the Ministry while Trustee McPhail mentored him, helping him to understand the role of the Trustees, and his relationship with the Deaconesses and Deacons.

The Trustees play a vital role managing the Church's finances and ensuring that the Church is well-maintained. As the Chair (for the last 5 years), his goal is to ensure that the funds are being spent to support FMZBC's activities that impact the community and Prince William County. He opined that there is a great need in the county and our financial resources should be used to help support the needs of members and non-members. He reports that his contracting skills and eye for details have benefited him in this role as a part of the Team. His leadership in the Ministry reflects the same values that guided his military career: integrity, accountability, and service. As a mentor to younger leaders, he shares his experiences of discipline, leadership, and the power of faith.

His ministry work is not limited to the Trustee Ministry; it extends to the community, where he is actively involved in veteran organizations. He assists Veterans as they transition into civilian life, guiding them to people/programs and other resources, particularly those with concerns about benefits. General Simpson also provides mentorship for acquisition/contracting professionals in government and the private sector. He believes in the power of transformation - both of individuals

and entire communities - and works tirelessly to bring that vision to fruition.

Faith and Spiritual Journey

General Simpson credits the excellent preaching along with the Sunday School teachers and the constant words of encouragement he receives from his friends at FMZBC, that have helped to bolster his faith. He shares that his faith also played a significant role in his life and describes three challenging assignments he had while in the United States Army, stating that he made it through those assignments by consistent prayer and asking God to expand his leadership skills. He acknowledges that he made mistakes but God helped him to learn from those mistakes, and he became a better leader. "God will do it", he said, "just ask Him to help you". "Turn it all over to God and keep working hard. If you are knocked down seven times, get up eight times". He encourages everyone to get engaged in activities/ministries at their church, stay in the Word, and in prayer. Be committed and watch what the Lord will do for you.

Inspirations and Vision

General Simpson says that his mother inspires him most in his faith and personal journey because she has a heart for helping those in need. She always tells him and his siblings to do what is right and stay connected to God. His favorite Bible verse is Psalms 23 – "The Lord is my shepherd,"

Excellence and Encouragement

This is what General Simpson had to say when reflecting on what does "excellence" mean to him. His answer, though simple, is a powerful reminder of how we all can impact the lives of others in the smallest ways. He responded: "Excellence means getting up every day with the mindset that I am going to make a difference. We all must thrive to make a positive impact each day".

General Simpson, who has been a member of First Mount Zion for the past 24 years, is married to Zelda and has two daughters: Alexis Simpson McGee and Devin Simpson. They are his pride and joy. He says he loves to spend time with his family, making building/maintaining relationships a priority, and staying healthy (physically). He enjoys reading (he confesses that he reads the Washington Post every morning) and watching CNN. A few of his most memorable moments were graduating from college; earning the rank of Major General (the first and only African American to Command the Army Contracting Command (ACC)); and his 33 plus years of service in the United States Army. On a professional level, his desire is to continue to mentor others and help them achieve their goals; while spiritually, he wants to continue to improve in his spiritual growth – by becoming a better person every day.

Closing Thoughts

When questioned about whether or not there was anything else he would like to share with the FMZBC family, he simply, yet eloquently stated, "The decisions we make will determine our path in life. Always ask for God's help in making decisions; He will never leave you".

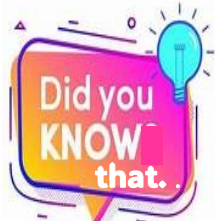
A Legacy of Service

BLACK HISTORY

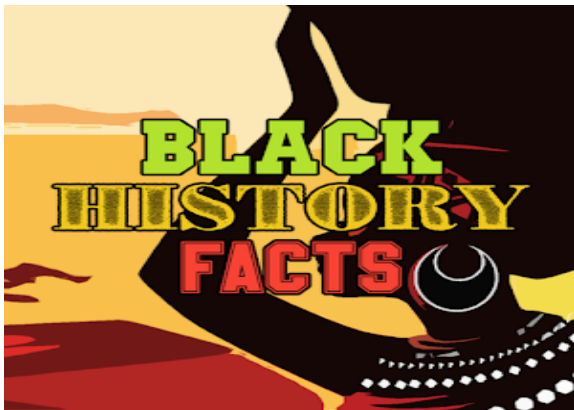


Reverend Dr. Dorothy Ann White was the first female Assistant Pastor here at **First Mount Zion Baptist Church**? The Rev. Dr. White is the fourth of five children born to Oscar and Dorothy White of Knoxville, Tennessee. She earned a B.A. degree in Sociology from the University of Tennessee at Knoxville. She went on to earn a M.A. in Theology from Oral Roberts University and, in 1995, was ordained as a Baptist minister and later served here at First Mount Zion Baptist Church in Dumfries, Virginia, as the Assistant Pastor. She subsequently relocated from the area, moving to Richmond in 2001 to work on her Doctor of Ministry degree at the Samuel Dewitt Proctor School of Theology at Virginia Union University, graduating in 2005. During that time, she served at St. Catherine's Episcopal School, and was ordained first, as a Transitional Deacon in 2014 and, in 2015, as an Episcopal priest. In July 2022, Dorothy relocated to Minneapolis to serve as the Interim Chaplain and Religion Department Chair at Breck School in Golden Valley. She currently serves as Interim Rector at St. George's Episcopal Church in Germantown, Tennessee.

... AND THAT

General Dennis L. Via, one of our long-standing members, is a retired United States Army four-star general? He was born in 1958 in Martinsville, Virginia to Curtis and Margaret Via. He is the first Signal Corps officer since General Henry H. Arnold to achieve four-star rank. He retired from the Army on 30 September 2016 after over 36 years of service. He received his B.A. degree in 1980 from Virginia State University in Petersburg, Virginia and his M.A. degree in management in 1988 from the Boston University Wheelock College of Education and Human Development in Boston, Massachusetts. Via graduated from the United States Army Command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas in 1991, and from the United States Army War College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania in 1999. His last tour of duty was serving as the 18th Commanding General of the United States Army Materiel Command from 7 August 2012 to 30 September 2016.





SARAH RECTOR: MEET THE FIRST BLACK WOMAN LEGALLY DECLARED WHITE FOR BEING TOO RICH



SARAH RECTOR, also known as **Sarah Rector Campbell** and **Sarah Campbell Crawford**, was an American oil magnate since childhood. Born in 1902 to African descendants of the Muscogee Nation, Rector was granted 160 acres of barren land in Indian Territory by the Federal Government at the age of 12 as a result of the Dawes Allotment Act of 1887. Rector's land was located in Glenpool, Oklahoma, about 60 miles from her family's home and was considered inferior soil that was not suitable for farming. Under the Treaty of 1866, due to birthright as a Black grandchild of Creek Indians born before the American Civil War, she inherited land because of her status as a "freedman". No one expected it to make her one of the richest Black children in America. She was only 11 years old. However, in 1913, an oil well on her property began producing 2,500 barrels a day, earning her over \$300 daily—it was surprisingly discovered oil-rich and produced over US\$300. This allotment would soon prove highly profitable, resulting in Rector becoming known as "The Richest Colored Girl in the World" because of the royalties she collected from the Prairie Oil and Gas Company. Due to Rector's status as a minor, guardianship of this land and its royalties were overseen by Rector's father; however, once the royalties grew to a certain size, it was deemed necessary for a white man to "oversee the girl's finances." Under Oklahoma law, wealthy Native Americans and Freedmen were assigned white guardians. Rector's parents appointed T.J. Porter, a family associate, though suspicions of financial mismanagement promoted an NAACP investigation.

Rector and her family became burdened with paying land taxes on the property, and in 1911, the family leased the parcel to the Standard Oil Company. In February of 1913, an independent oil driller named B.B. Jones drilled a well on the Rector property which produced more than 2,000 barrels of oil a day. Rector began receiving an income of \$300 (equivalent to \$10,100 in 2024) per day from this oil strike. In October 1913, the property became part of the Cushing-Drumright Oil Field, and as a result Rector began receiving royalties of over \$11,000, making her the richest 12-year-old Black woman in the United States.

Rector's sudden wealth drew national attention. Newspapers sensationalized her story with racist headlines, referring to her as a "pickaninny" who had become a millionaire. She also became a target for opportunists, receiving marriage proposals and financial requests despite being a child. Like many wealthy Black landowners, she faced the threat of exploitation and violence, mirroring the deadly schemes against the oil-rich Osage people.

Sarah was born in 1902 near the all-black town of Taft, located in Indian Territory, which became the eastern portion of Oklahoma. She had five siblings. Her parents were Rose McQueen and husband Joseph Rector (both born 1881), who were the Black grandchildren of Creek Indians before the Civil War, and were descendants of the Muscogee Creek Nation after the Treaty of 1866. As such, they and their descendants were listed as Freedmen on the Dawes Rolls, by which they were entitled to land allotments under the Treaty of 1866 made by the United States with the Five Civilized Tribes. Sarah's father, Joseph, was the son of John Rector, a Creek Freedman. John Rector's father, Benjamin McQueen, was enslaved by Reilly Grayson, who was a Creek Indian. John Rector's mother, Mollie McQueen was enslaved by the Muscogee Opothleyahola, who fought in the Seminole Wars and split the tribe, moving his followers to Kansas. Sarah Rector was allotted 159.14 acres (64 hectares). This was a mandatory step in the process of integration of the Indian Territory with Oklahoma Territory to form what is now the State of Oklahoma.

By the time Rector turned 18, her net worth was already over \$1 million (about \$11 million today). Rector and her family relocated to Kansas City, Missouri, and settled in a large stone American foursquare home located at 2000 East 12th Street that still stands today.

At age 20, Rector married Kansas City businessman Kenneth Campbell and had three sons. She and her family were recognized as local celebrities and entertained guests such as Duke Ellington and Count Basie in the home. Unfortunately, Rector lost a majority of her wealth during The Great Depression and moved out of her mansion on 12th Street to 2440 Brooklyn Avenue.

Sarah Rector died on July 22, 1967, from a stroke at the age of 65. She is interred in Blackjack Cemetery in her childhood hometown of Taft, Oklahoma.



THE GULLAH GEECHEE COMMUNITY

The Gullah Geechee people are the descendants of West and Central Africans who were enslaved and brought to the lower Atlantic states of North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, and Georgia to work on the coastal rice, Sea Island cotton and indigo plantations. Because their enslavement was on isolated coastal plantations, sea and barrier islands, they were able to retain many of their indigenous African traditions. These traditions are reflected in their foodways, arts and crafts, and spiritual traditions. They also created a new language, Gullah, a creole language spoken nowhere else in the world.



Sapelo Island, located 40 miles south of Savannah and 7 miles off the coast of Georgia, is home to the Gullah Geechee (Guale) community, who have lived there for over 400 years. Accessible only by ferry or private boat, the island is a cultural treasure, preserving the unique heritage and traditions of its inhabitants. The Gullah Geechee people have maintained a distinct way of life deeply connected to their history and the island's natural environment.

The Gullah Geechee culture is renowned for its rich oral traditions, music, cuisine, and language, which blends African, European, and Indigenous influences. Life on Sapelo Island is closely tied to the land and sea, with residents relying on fishing, farming, and craftsmanship to sustain their community. Despite challenges such as land encroachment and economic pressures, the Gullah Geechee people have worked tirelessly to preserve their heritage for future generations.

Today, Sapelo Island stands as a symbol of resilience and cultural preservation. Efforts by the Gullah Geechee community to protect their land and traditions have garnered support from historians, activists, and cultural organizations. Visitors to the island have the rare opportunity to engage with this vibrant culture, gaining insight into a legacy that is both historically significant and enduringly vital.

Cultural Context: The Gullah Geechee people (referred to in the text as Geechee) are an ethnic group who live on the Sea Islands of the Atlantic coast, also known as the South Carolina Lowcountry. The Gullah Geechee are descended from enslaved Central and West Africans who were brought to the Sea Islands to work on rice, cotton, and indigo plantations. These enslaved people brought with them a multitude of distinct languages and cultures, and the creole culture that arose from the mixture of these influences became known as Gullah Geechee.

Several circumstances encouraged the development and proliferation of a unique culture on the Sea Islands. Mosquito-borne illnesses proliferated in the hot and marshy region. While the enslaved Africans had already developed some immunity to these diseases, Europeans had not, and the rapid spread of yellow fever and malaria drove white enslavers away from the islands. Enslavers continued to

bring enslaved people to the islands to work on the profitable plantations; however, the enslaved people were then left largely to their own devices, leading to the development of a culture that had little interaction with white society.

After the Civil War, most free Black people in the South chose to forego working in the Sea Islands due to the dangerous terrain and the risk of illness.

What is the Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor?

The Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor, and the federal Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor Commission established to oversee it, were designated by an act of Congress on October 12, 2006 through the National Heritage Areas Act of 2006. The Corridor runs from Pender County North Carolina to St. John's County Florida. The Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor Commission is charged with helping to achieve the goals of the Corridor designation: to recognize, sustain, and celebrate the important contributions made to American culture and history by the Gullah Geechee; to assist state and local governments and public and private entities in South Carolina, Georgia, North Carolina, and Florida in interpreting the story of the Gullah Geechee and preserving Gullah Geechee folklore, arts, crafts, and music; and to assist in identifying and preserving sites, historical data, artifacts, and objects associated with Gullah Geechee people and culture for the benefit and education of the public.

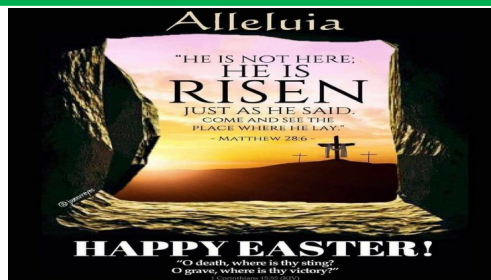

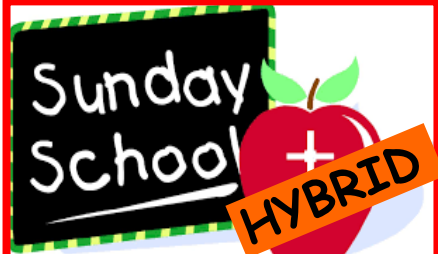
