In the Spotlight

JORDYN FLOYD: “THIS IS ME!”



As she steps into her senior year at Colgan High School's Center for Fine and Performing Arts, **Jordyn Floyd** continues to shine as a bright and gifted young performer. This summer, Jordyn was one of a select group of students across the Commonwealth chosen for the **2025 Virginia Governor's School for the Arts**, an intensive three-week program hosted at Radford University in Radford, Virginia.

The Journey to Governor's School

Acceptance into the Governor's School is no small achievement. Students must compete regionally and statewide, demonstrating talent, creativity, and commitment. Jordyn prepared a two-minute audition video—a dramatic monologue—that helped secure her place among Virginia's most promising young theater artists. Her portfolio stood out not only for her performances at Colgan but also for a production in her community, reflecting her versatility and leadership in the arts.

For three weeks, Jordyn immersed herself in the world of theater alongside students from diverse schools and backgrounds. The Governor's School program, designed to stretch artistic boundaries, offered classes in **theater, voice, instrumental performance, and the humanities**. Students also engaged in **devising theater, improvisational skits, and collaborative workshops**, all guided by university professors and professional artists.

Though budget cuts shortened the program from its usual length, Jordyn still found the experience transformative. She describes it as **“refreshing and low pressure”**, a space where she could explore her craft without fear and where her professors offered constructive, encouraging feedback. The counselors planned meaningful workshops, and Jordyn says her favorite part was not an event or a performance, but **the people**—the friendships she built with students from across Virginia.

Lessons Learned and Confidence Gained

From the program, Jordyn took away life lessons that reach far beyond the stage: the importance of **flexibility**, the strength of **confidence**, and the power of embracing

and **manifesting her own individuality**. Asked to capture her experience in one phrase, Jordyn declared: **“This is me!”**

Her time at Radford reinforced what so many already see in Jordyn: a beautiful, blooming performing arts star who radiates confidence, positivity, and joy.

Looking Ahead: Senior Year and Beyond

Now back at Colgan, Jordyn is rehearsing for the fall production, *Zombie Prom*, and eagerly anticipating the opportunities her senior year holds. Beyond the stage, she faithfully serves in the **choirs, youth ministry, and audio/visual ministry** at church, where she also shares the role of announcer alongside her father, **Brother Mark Floyd**. Together, they uplift the congregation with warmth, enthusiasm, and professionalism.

Her journey through the Center for Fine and Performing Arts, her selection for Governor's School, and her growing leadership in ministry point to a future filled with purpose and possibility. Jordyn is an example of how talent, faith, and determination can open doors to new experiences and platforms to shine.

As we celebrate Jordyn's accomplishments, we also look forward with excitement to how God will continue to lead and guide her—not only in her senior year, but in the path He has prepared for her life.

CELEBRATING FORMER PASTOR, DR. LUKE E. TORIAN & SISTER CLARICE TORIAN'S LASTING IMPACT ON DUMFRIES

The Town of Dumfries has chosen to honor our former pastor, Rev. Dr. Luke E. Torian, and his wife, Sister Clarice Torian, by naming its new overlook park in their honor. The park, being built atop the closed landfill next to The Rose gaming resort, will feature a ballfield, dog park, tot lot, playground, restroom, and picnic area, with an expected opening later this summer or early fall.

During his 16 years representing Dumfries in the Virginia House of Delegates, Dr. Torian played a key role in securing legislation to allow the town to retain more of its gaming tax revenue—bringing in an estimated \$1 million annually to strengthen the local economy. Sister Clarice Torian served the community for decades as an educator, counselor, and administrator in Prince William County Schools, championing youth wellness, school safety, and equity initiatives, while organizing school supply and winter coat drives.

Both have served faithfully through their ministry at First Mount Zion Baptist Church, shaping lives spiritually, economically, and socially. As Dumfries Town Council Chair Pro Tem Selonia Miles shared, "They have not only poured into us economically as a town, they've also taken their time to mentor us...to help lead us through the way."

We celebrate this well-deserved honor and give thanks for the continuing legacy of service, leadership, and love the Torians bring to our community.

REVIVAL WEEK SUMMARY REFLECTION – THEME: “STAY CONNECTED TO GOD”

This year's Revival was a transformative and Spirit-filled journey under the leadership of Acting Pastor, Rev. Dr. Sandra K. James. Each night was marked by powerful preaching, heartfelt worship, and a deep calling for spiritual renewal, connection, and restoration. Below is a summary reflection of each night's message and movement:

Revival began on Sunday with the Sermon titled: “*The Connection That Makes You Fruitful*” using John 15:1–8 as its base. Rev. Shomari Hughes was our speaker. His message was vibrant and powerful on the importance of remaining in Christ to bear fruit. He reminded the congregation that true fruitfulness is not based on works alone, but on a spiritual connection to the Vine, Jesus Christ, adding that “Fruitfulness is a byproduct of closeness to Christ.” He challenged believers to examine whether they were producing leaves or bearing lasting fruit for the Kingdom. His message was a clarion call to remain rooted, pruned, and purposeful.

On Tuesday night, Rev. Dr. Danielle Bridgeforth challenged us to “*Stay Close to God*”, using Psalm 73:28 as her text. Dr. Bridgeforth reminded us that proximity to God is our place of power, peace, and preservation. In a world filled with distractions and detours, she taught that closeness to God is not just comfort but survival and that “You can't hear God from a distance. Stay close, stay covered, stay committed.” Her message stirred hearts to draw near, emphasizing personal devotion, consistent prayer, and discerning God's direction in every area of life.

Rev. Dr. Alfred Jones, Jr. encouraged us on Wednesday Night to “*Stay Connected to the Vine*” as recorded in John 15:5. Dr. Jones preached a soul-stirring message on spiritual dependence and divine connection. He boldly declared that disconnection leads to dryness, and that apart from the Vine, we can do nothing. He declared boldly that disconnection leads to dryness and that the fruit you bear proves who you're connected to.” He encouraged the Church to evaluate what's feeding their spirit, challenging us to cling to Christ even in seasons of pruning. The service ended with a heartfelt invitation for renewed faith and a deeper relationship.

On Thursday Night, Rev. Dr. Vernon Walton closed out our Revival with the sermon titled: “*Surviving the Silence of God*”. His text was taken from Matthew 15:21–23. His delivery was powerful as he shared an emotionally resonant word about remaining faithful even when heaven seems quiet. Using the story of the Canaanite woman, Dr. Walton urged us to:

Remain Faithful – Trust God even in silence.

Remain Focused – Worship even through rejection.

Remain Full – Stay filled with Spirit and hope.

“God's silence is not God's absence. Sometimes silence is a strategy.”

His message deeply resonated with the enduring seasons of waiting in the hearts of every believer present. The Revival served as a sacred reminder that to truly flourish in faith, we must stay connected to the Source. It reminded us that revival is not a moment, but a movement birthed in persistent faith.

Final Reflection: A Church Revived

Throughout the week, the messages were not only biblically sound but spiritually surgical, cutting deep into the hearts of every believer present. The Revival served as a sacred reminder that to truly flourish in faith, we must stay connected to the Source through prayer, worship, obedience, and trust. Our hearts are full, our spirits are renewed, and our Church is revived.

To God be the Glory for the great things He has done.



SPIRITUAL LIFE MAP




A spiritual life map is a visual representation of your spiritual journey. It includes key life events, experiences, and people that influenced your spiritual growth and development. It's a life story of your past, your present, and your future. It can lead to discovering your strengths and purpose for the present and future.

the most powerful skills to acquire in life. Life mapping is a great self-awareness tool.

A life map can be presented in various forms, such as a timeline, a collage, or pictures using clip-art. Start by meditating or journaling about significant life events and the lessons they've taught you. Recognize patterns that have shaped your beliefs and consider how you can align your daily practices with your spiritual goals.

Ray, a male in his late forties, used clip-art to present his life map. His reflection and introspection started at the age of 17 years old when he left home and separated himself from his family. He reflects on his ups and downs. He left school in the 10th grade, worked various menial jobs until he began selling and using drugs. He endured a two-year prison sentence at age 26. His spiritual awakening through studying God's Word led to a significant life-change. He began a relationship with a woman; they had a son. Things went well until they broke up and he lost his son. Ray hit bottom when he started drinking more and using drugs, He documented his years from the age of 37 years old to the age of 45 years old as the lost years—he was homeless. He was court-ordered to go to therapy. He found solace in studying God's Word and through therapy.

Ray returned to school, studied to be a health care assistant and found steady work at the age of 46. He moved back home. He bonded with his family of origin just at the time when his father had a stroke and needed nursing care. Ray recognized his strengths were his love for God and his love for family. He recognized and believed his meaning and purpose in life were to care for his family and for others through the helping profession of nursing. Ray became a registered nurse. He continues to help his family and others through his profession as a registered nurse.

On August 10, 2025, some members from both the GrowSome-GiveSome and Eagles Health and Nutrition Small Groups, completed their SERVE Small Groups Spring Project by having a private tour of "Area2farms" in Arlington, VA. The "farm" is entirely indoors and grows microgreens and lettuces organically in a small warehouse-like structure.

Emerging research shows that microgreens are more nutritionally dense than their full-grown counterparts. Unlike "sprouts" microgreens are grown in soil and are at least 14 days old before they are harvested. The goal of Area2Farms is to make fresh produce accessible to all communities and have an "Area2Farm" within a 10-mile radius of most communities.

Our tour included viewing their research garden and their main growing areas. The plants are grown in containers called "totes" housed on a conveyer system that simulates the 24-hour day cycle and strictly controls plant watering.

Our tour ended with tasting various microgreen plants including green pea microgreens that despite not having a visible green pea on them tasted like peas. We also tasted a "shamrock" plant that reminded you of eating a lemon.

It was fascinating to visit a "farm of the future," that is not subject to the weather conditions of traditional farms and can grow and harvest crops weekly in a significantly smaller space than traditional commercial farms. Hello, Church Family.

As we prepare for our Pastoral Election on **Saturday, September 13**, we sent test emails on **August 28** to all active members who registered for electronic ballots by August 19.

Those emails came from pulpitcommittee@firstmountzionbc.org with a subject like “**FMZBC Pastor Election - Electronic Ballot Acknowledgement.**”

We thank those of you who have registered by August 19 to receive an electronic ballot for acknowledging receipt of our email.

If you are an active member who registered to receive an electronic ballot by August 19 and have not had the opportunity to do so, please check your **Inbox**—and if you don’t see it, check **Spam/Junk** and **Promotions**. If you **did not receive** the test email, write to pulpitcommittee@firstmountzionbc.org with your **full name** and the **email address you plan to use for voting** so we can assist you.

For voting:

- **Electronic voters** may vote **from home or on-site** using our secure **Simply Voting** system. *Paper ballots will not be issued to electronic voters.*
- **All other active members** will receive a **paper ballot on-site** at the church.

One-Day voting (as approved August 2):

As briefed and voted on at the August 2 church meeting, all voting will take place **on one day**. Election Day is **Saturday, September 13**.

Purpose of Rounds & How They Work:

Rounds of voting may take place on Saturday, September 13 to ensure we can reach the required **75% affirmative** to select our next Pastor.

Each round begins with a new check-in to receive an updated ballot and a **quorum check**—we must reach and **maintain a 12% quorum** (in-person and virtual combined) through the **entire voting period**.

If no candidate reaches **75%** in a round, we will **proceed to the next round later the same day**, once we determine who advances to the new round and can prepare accordingly.

Please **stay available** and help us maintain quorum so the process can continue without delay.

In-person check-in begins at 7:00 AM on September 13. We invite you to spend time in our Election Day Prayer Room

Election Day Round Times:

- **Round 1:** Quorum Confirmation at **9:00 AM**; Voting begins at **10:00 AM**.
- **Round 2:** Quorum Confirmation at **1:00 PM**; Voting begins at **1:15 PM**.
- **Round 3:** Quorum Confirmation at **3:55 PM**; Voting begins at **4:05 PM**.
- **Round 4:** Quorum Confirmation at **6:55 PM**; Voting begins at **7:05 PM**.

Your **presence, participation, and prayers** are essential. Please plan to be **in place by 9:00 AM** on Saturday, September 13, so we can establish a quorum and proceed with the day without delay. Falling below quorum at any point during the voting period will **delay** the overall pastor selection process.

BIOGRAPHY OF WILLIAM STILL, FATHER OF THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD

William Still (1821–1902) was a leading abolitionist and civil rights activist, often called the “Father of the Underground Railroad.” He coined the term and, as a chief conductor in Pennsylvania, helped thousands of enslaved people escape and resettle in freedom. His landmark book, *The Underground Rail Road* (1872), documented more than 1,000 freedom seekers and became one of the most important works of African American abolitionist literature.

Early Life

Born free in New Jersey to Levin and Sidney (Charity) Still, who had both escaped slavery, William was the youngest of 18 children. With little formal education, he taught himself to read and write, skills that later fueled his activism. In 1844, he moved to Philadelphia, working with the Pennsylvania Anti-Slavery Society, where he quickly rose to leadership.

The Underground Railroad

Between 1844 and 1865, Still aided at least 60 people directly and recorded the stories of hundreds more. In one interview, he discovered he was helping his own brother, Peter, who had been sold years earlier. Still safeguarded his records until slavery was abolished in 1865. With the passage of the Fugitive Slave Act, he became chairman of Philadelphia’s Vigilance Committee, coordinating resistance efforts.

Civic Leadership

After the Civil War, Still pushed for broader civil rights. He fought to desegregate Philadelphia’s streetcars, publishing a pamphlet in 1867 that contributed to legislative victory. He also organized a YMCA for Black youth, supported Freedmen’s Aid, co-founded Berean Presbyterian Church, and opened schools in Philadelphia.

Family

In 1847 he married Letitia George. They had four children, including Caroline Still, one of the first African American women doctors, and William Wilberforce Still, a lawyer.

Later Years

Still’s 800-page *The Underground Rail Road* went through three editions and became the most circulated text on the subject. He showcased it at the 1876 Philadelphia Centennial Exposition, selling thousands of copies. He also prospered as a businessman, investing in real estate, coal, and retail, while funding book distribution through a network of agents.

Death and Legacy

William Still died in 1902. *The New York Times* called him “one of the best-educated members of his race.” His life remains a testament to perseverance, uplift, and the power of documenting truth for future generations.



PERCY JULIAN (1899-1975) Researcher | Chemist

Just as George Washington Carver demonstrated what could be done with the ordinary peanut, Dr. Percy Julian took the soybean, which was until his time just another bean, and extracted from it an ingredient to relieve inflammatory arthritis. Until the late thirties, Europe had a monopoly on the production of sterols, the basis of Dr. Julian's research. These sterols were extracted from the bile of animals at a cost of several hundred dollars per gram. Substituting sterols for the oil of the soybean, Dr. Julian reduced the cost of sterols to less than twenty cents per gram, thus making cortisone, a sterol derivative, available to people in need at a reasonable cost.

Born in Montgomery, Alabama, in 1898, the millionaire scientist graduated from DePauw University (Indiana) in 1920 as valedictorian of his class and Phi Beta Kappa orator. While at DePauw, he slept in the attic of a fraternity house, where he worked as a waiter to earn his room and board. Dr. Julian's gifted mind earned him scholarships to Harvard and the University of Vienna, where, with a grant from the General Education Board and the help of a wealthy college classmate, he completed his professional training and received his Ph.D. in 1931. The son of a railway clerk, Dr. Julian taught at Fisk, West Virginia State, Howard, and DePaul Universities.

After leaving the academic world, Dr. Julian became director of research for the Glidden Corporation in Chicago. He later established his own Julian Laboratories, where he developed soybean products, hormone preparations, and other pharmaceuticals.

In 1961, Dr. Julian merged his company with Smith, Kline, and French Pharmaceutical Company in an arrangement that paid him several million dollars. Dr. Julian was a resident of the Chicago suburb of Oak Park.

PAUL LAWRENCE DUNBAR (1872-1906) Poet | Novelist

In his brief 33-year life, Paul Laurence Dunbar wrote six volumes of poetry, four novels, and several volumes of short stories. Most of the critics of his day attributed the excellence of Dunbar's writing to the mix of European blood in his veins. As a result, Dunbar took advantage of every opportunity to emphasize his "unmixed" or "pure" African ancestry. Dunbar's work was cited as conclusive proof that literary excellence was not limited to those of European ancestry.

Despite Dunbar's superlative reputation, the author was discouraged by how his work was popularly received. Although two-thirds of Dunbar's poems were written in standard English that displays skillful manipulation of imagery, masterful rhyme and meter, and expert handling of serious philosophical thought, these are not the works that made him famous. Dunbar's public recognition came primarily from the rhythmic narrative and pleasing description of Black life that characterizes much of his dialect poetry. The white public praised the dialect poems, largely ignoring his more serious works, while he rejected them, and many Black critics were harsh in their judgment of Dunbar because of them.

Dunbar's parents, both formerly enslaved people, were the primary influences in his literary life. His father, Joshua Dunbar, was a skilled plasterer who earned his master additional income. His master taught Joshua reading and arithmetic to prevent those who purchased his services from cheating him.

Joshua escaped slavery and made his way to Canada. His reading skills allowed him to follow the course of the anti-slavery movement in the United States through Canadian newspapers. When he learned of the imminent Civil War, Joshua returned stateside to fight in the Union Army. After the war, he settled in Dayton, Ohio. In 1871, he married Matilda J. Burton Murphy, a widow 30 years his junior, with two boys. Paul was their only child.

Matilda had been a house slave for a white family in Kentucky. After the war, she moved to Dayton to be near her mother, who had been freed before the war. Joshua and Matilda were divorced five years after they married, and Joshua died six years later when Paul was 12 years old. Dunbar gives this account of his parents in a newspaper article published in March 1902. "My mother, who had no education except what she picked up herself, and who is generally conceded to be a very unusual woman, taught me to read when I was four years old. Both my father and herself were fond of books and used to read to me around the fire at night."

In 1892, at age 20, Dunbar's first collection of poetry, *Oak and Ivy*, was published. In 1895, he wrote and published another collection, *Majors and Minors*. William Dean Howell, a critic for *Harper's Weekly*, read and favorably reviewed the books and brought instant fame to Dunbar. Howell arranged for the publication of Dunbar's third volume, *Lyrics of a Lowly Life*, in 1896 and wrote the book's introduction. In the introduction, Howell described Dunbar as "the only man of pure African blood and of American civilization to feel the Negro life aesthetically and express it lyrically." At first, Dunbar felt honored by Howell's words, but later, he regarded them as a mixed blessing. He wrote to a friend, "Mr. Howell has done me irrevocable harm in the dictum he laid down regarding my dialect verse."

After *Lyrics of Life*, Dunbar published *Lyrics of the Hearthside* in 1899, followed by *Lyrics of Love and Laughter* in 1903 and *Lyrics of Sunshine and Shadow* in 1905. Paul Laurence Dunbar died of an incurable disease in 1906. Seven years later, all his poems were assembled into one volume, *The Complete Works of Paul Laurence Dunbar*. Dunbar's love of poetry is probably summed up in his poem entitled "A Choice":

*They please me not-these solemn songs
That hint of sermons covered up.
Tis true the world should heed its wrongs,
But in a poem let me sup,
Not simples brewed to cure or ease
Humanity's confessed disease,
But the spirit-wine on a singing line,
Or a dew-drop in a honey cup!*
(Complete Poems, p. 209)


MARJORIE S. JOYNER

(1896-1994)

Businesswoman | Humanitarian | Educator | Activist

Marjorie S. Joyner dedicated her life of 98 years to establishing pride and confidence in the Black community. On October 24, 1896, Joyner was born in Virginia. At a young age, she traveled to Chicago, where she committed to cosmetology, gaining the attention of Black beauty extraordinaire, Madam C.J. Walker. In 1916 she became the first Black graduate from A.B. Molar Beauty School in Chicago. The same year, she married Dr. Robert E. Joyner and opened her own salon. She made it her obligation to restore the unrealized potential that God has placed in all individuals. Joyner was unsatisfied with the length of time her hairstyles would last, which led her to develop the permanent wave machine. In 1922, she was the first Black woman to receive a patent for the wave machine. The device curled a person's hair and lasted for several days. It was a popular item and crossed cultural borders. Joyner signed the rights to her invention to Walker and became the Director of Walker's chain of 200 beauty schools and shops across the country. In 1945, she joined Mary Bethune McLeod, a legendary Black educator, to form the United Beauty School Owners and Teachers Association. The same year, to ensure the integrity and quality in future beauticians, she started the Alpha Chi Pi Omega Sorority and Fraternity. In 1973, at the age of 77, she was awarded a bachelor's degree in psychology from Bethune Cookman College in Daytona, Florida. Joyner extended her commitment beyond cosmetology during the Depression and worked on housing and employment programs. She continued work as a humanitarian and developed Black college funds. Joyner also chaired the Bud Billiken Parade, the largest African American parade in the country, and is the president of the Chicago Defender Charities Inc., a non-profit organization that raises scholarships. With the respect of many, she began traveling for speaking engagements. While traveling to an engagement, she was forced to ride in the baggage carriage because of her race. Joyner never allowed discrimination to slow her down and credited all her determination to God. Joyner later founded the Cosmopolitan Community Church in her basement, which grew beyond her expectations. In 1993, the Carter G. Woodson Library in Chicago paid tribute to her accomplishments. She has also been recognized by political figures such as President John F. Kennedy and Jimmy Carter. On December 27, 1994, Marjorie Stewart Joyner passed away. Thank God that her organization will continue to inspire generations for years to come.
